Perhaps a square foot of floor space per eight-week old broiler isn't enough. Especially if it approaches or passes three pounds weight. Better quality birds may be just as important as greater quantity.

More Water . . . More Eggs

Your birds must get plenty of water if they are to produce lots of eggs. Provide a minimum of one eight-gallon waterer or its equivalent for every 100 layers. One automatic fountein should be sufficient for every 200 to 250 layers. Waterers must be readily accessible... don't make your birds walk far to get

Get rid of the males as soon as hatching

Watch for coccidiosis. Keep the litter dry and drain puddles. Provide plenty of feeding and watering equipment for growing pullets.

Cult all non-producing and out-of-condition birds.

If hen's appetites fall off, encourage them to eat. Try wet mash and green feed.

According to a survey made in New Jersey a few years ago, the annual loss from egg breakage on a 2000-hen average was between 250 and 3550. Breakage per 1000 eggs produced was 25 in the nests, 14 during collection, and 20 during packing. That's a terrific loss. How does it compare with your farm? More frequent gathering, not filling baskets over two-thirds full, and avoiding bumping baskets will reduce number of cracks and broken eggs.

Brollers

Poultry specialists at the University of Maryland say that broilers should be sold at 10 to 11 weeks of age. This is the most profitable age, they say, be-cause the dollar return, above out-of-pocket costs, reaches its highest at that time.




