### Lowell Council Proceedings

Special Session, Monday, May 28

Council was called to order by President Speerstra at 8:30 p.m.

Roll Call: Trustees Fonger, Battistella, Jones, Thompson.

Present: Trustees Boelen, Munroe, 6.

President Bridges gave a few of the highlights of his town, as follows:

Waterlet is located at the intersection of M-140 and US12, about seven miles from Lake Michigan. The population is approximately 1600. The mayor's salary is \$100 per year, each of six commissioners, \$25.00. There is a Fifth Class City. Their fire protection is handled by a 7-man board; it covers the city and the township. Their township is small—not a full-sized one. Bainsbridge Township pays Waterlet \$125.00, plus \$3.00 per man-power hour, for each fire department call. Two other townships reimburse with Waterlet in furnishing additional fire protection, if required.

The principal industry of Waterlet is the Waterlet Paper Co., employing about 425 people. Only ten per cent of this number, however, are residents of the town. Electric Power is furnished the town by the Indiana-Michigan Gas Company, a subsidiary of American Gas. Waterlet has a complete sewer system, owns its water utility, has two deep wells, a sewage disposal.

The Street Department is supervised by the 6-man Commission but he would strongly recommend a full time Street Superintendent. They have a complete paving project, with only a couple of streets yet to be completed.

The 1955 budget for Waterlet was \$72,800; for 1956 it is \$88,000. Their millage is set at .16; the assessed valuation is \$2,614,000, about 60 per cent of which is residential.

Mayor Bridges advised that Special Assessments were put on park, gutter and concrete on both US12 and M140 and that of the Village's share, 50 per cent was paid by the property owners.

On motion of Trustee Fonger, Council adjourned at 11:55 a.m.

### Treated Oat Seed Poses Problem for Michigan Farmer

Because the cold spring will prevent growers from planting oats, their treated oat seed will be used for special attention.

William Rupp, Jr., Kent County farm agent, claims it is potatoes that should not be fed to livestock. Growers have two choices of what to do with the seed—discard it, or store it for planting next year, he said.

If it is good seed, it'll pay to store it. But, remember that it will lose some of its germinating percentage by the time you make your next planting.

And, because of this drop in germination, have-it re-checked before planting, he said.

Good oat seed normally has 90 per cent, or better, germination. It tests show it to fall below this, increase your planting rate to take up the slack.

When you store oat seed that has been treated, dump it out of the sacks. In an area where it cannot become mixed with feed grain, you'll be liable under the law if you do for any damage resulting.

Another point growers should be considering is newly passed Michigan seed staining law. Rupp said.

It requires that all treated seed be dyed with an easily recognized color. It applies to small grains, corn, peas, and beans that have been treated with poisonous or injurious material. That treatment is now allowed—it must be done by slurry or liquid methods, Rupp said.

Two-thirds of the country's livestock is produced west of the Mississippi River, and two-thirds of the meat supply is eaten east of it.
