Census Bureau Shows Kent Farmers Sold 16 Million in 1954

Kent County farmers sold over 16 million worth of their products during the year 1954, according to a Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

This count, made of 3,769 farms in Kent County, showed a total value of crops sold of \$7,999,760. Livestock of \$8,115,316 and forest products \$49,669, for a total of \$16,164,745.

Of the crops sold, \$2,298,603 represents field crops, \$1,050,410 vegetables, \$3,446,590 fruits and nuts, and \$1,204,157 horticultural specialties.

In the livestock category, \$4,842,024 constitutes the total of dairy products sold, \$1,377,434 poultry and poultry products, and \$1,895,858 livestock and livestock products.

Information on the value of farm products sold is presented by the Bureau for each county in a preliminary state report. Copies may be purchased from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., for a nominal charge of 10 cents each.

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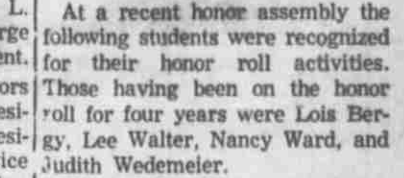
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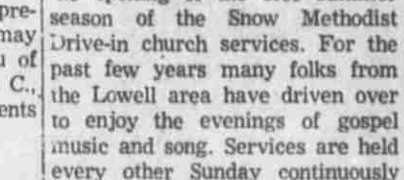

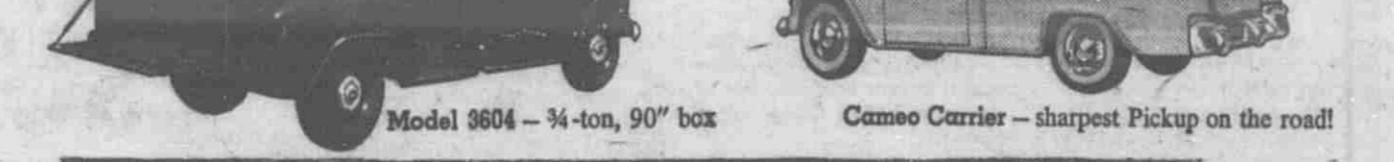
