

## Toot! Toot! 1956 Showboat Gathers Steam Tenth Annual Talent Night Will Be Saturday, July 14; 15 Acts Already In

Plans for the Tenth Annual Talent Night to be held on July 14 at 8 p. m. in the Showboat stadium, are now underway, according to C. H. Runciman, Showboat interlocutor and chairman for the event.

Mr. Runciman reports that about fifteen acts have already registered with him, and each day's mail brings more applications. He stresses, however, that early registration is desirable, as the number of acts will be limited to fifty this year. Mr. Runciman also advised that music and dance teachers enter only those

pupils who are likely winners. This will enable the Amateur Night audience to witness a greater variety of talent.

### Amateur Night Growing

A check back into the Ledger files indicates that the annual search for amateur talent to play featured spots in the Showboat program has been a growing project. In 1949 only twenty-five acts were expected. And then there was last year! The number of amateurs desiring a "claim to fame" was so large that officials decided to present the acts in two evening shows, a week apart. This year, however, the one-night plan is being re-adopted. Dave Clark Jr., local American Legion commander, expressed the opinion that one night would probably be more successful and profitable than two.

"The popcorn business will be better, too," he said.

Working jointly with the American Legion is the Lowell Board of Trade, headed this year by Jerald Roth. Proceeds from the sale of tickets will be divided between the two organizations. Admission price is 60 cents.

### Wide-Spread Talent

Talent for Amateur Night comes from all over the state. Last year's winners came from Portland, Alton, Ithaca, Grand Rapids, Lansing and Freeport. This year even more wide-spread interest is anticipated. Performers entering the contest should write a letter to C. H. Runciman, Lowell, Michigan, listing correct names and addresses, and ages of all members in the act, and the type of act to be presented. Contestants will appear on the program in the order in which the applications are received.

Others serving with Chairman Runciman on the Amateur Night committee are Walter Gumsier, Jack Howe, Ed Kiel, Theron Richmond, Cary Stiff Jr., and Dan Walker.

After graduating from the two-year medical school at Dartmouth in 1954, Dr. Stiff attended the University of Michigan Medical School where he was recently elected to Alpha Omega Alpha, the honorary medical society, in recognition of his outstanding record.

On June 29, Dr. Stiff will report to Presbyterian Hospital in Philadelphia where he will begin his year-long internship.

## Are You Registered for Annual School Election?

In another column of this paper will be found the official notice for the registration of electors who are not now qualified but who wish to qualify for the right of franchise in fourth class school district Number One, Township of Lowell.

A school elector, who lives in the district, qualifies or loses the right to vote as he qualifies or loses the right in the township.

Each year the secretary of the township notifies the secretary of the Board of Education to add or subtract from the list of voters maintained by the school district, and sends duplicate registration cards for those who have registered since the last election.

The law, however, provides that the secretary of the Board of Education must announce the place of registration for those who wish to qualify for school elections. It is to be noted that voters who are now qualified in the township are qualified in the school district also.

The annual school election day is Monday, July 9. You must be properly registered by June 29.

Mrs. Minnie Hawk has been re-appointed to her third term as Woman's Building chairman for the Department of Michigan, Women's Relief Corps.

Supt. W. W. Gumsier has filed nominating petitions to enter the race for state representative from Kent county district No. 2, which includes the southern two tiers of townships. The primaries will be held on August 7.

In talking the matter over with the local Board of Education, it was agreed that it would not be necessary for Mr. Gumsier to resign his position as superintendent. If defeated at the primaries his contract will automatically remain in force. If he should happen to become the nominee, then the Board will wait to see what happens at the November election.

If nominated and elected, it is possible that Mr. Gumsier would still be connected with the local system in a capacity to be decided by the Board of Education.

The last resident of Lowell to be a member of the State Legislature was D. G. Look who completed his term in 1934. Harry Briggs ran for state representative in the late 1930's on the Democratic ticket, but was defeated.

The implications and ensuing problems will be complex even to the point of providing extra facilities for more pupils, but there is a definite trend toward centralized school systems which will make it possible for every pupil to belong to a high school district.

The Law States  
Every closed primary district in Michigan must reopen within the next twelve months or must become a part of another district. The law provides that such districts can express a preference as

## Beagle Club Plans Annual Picnic

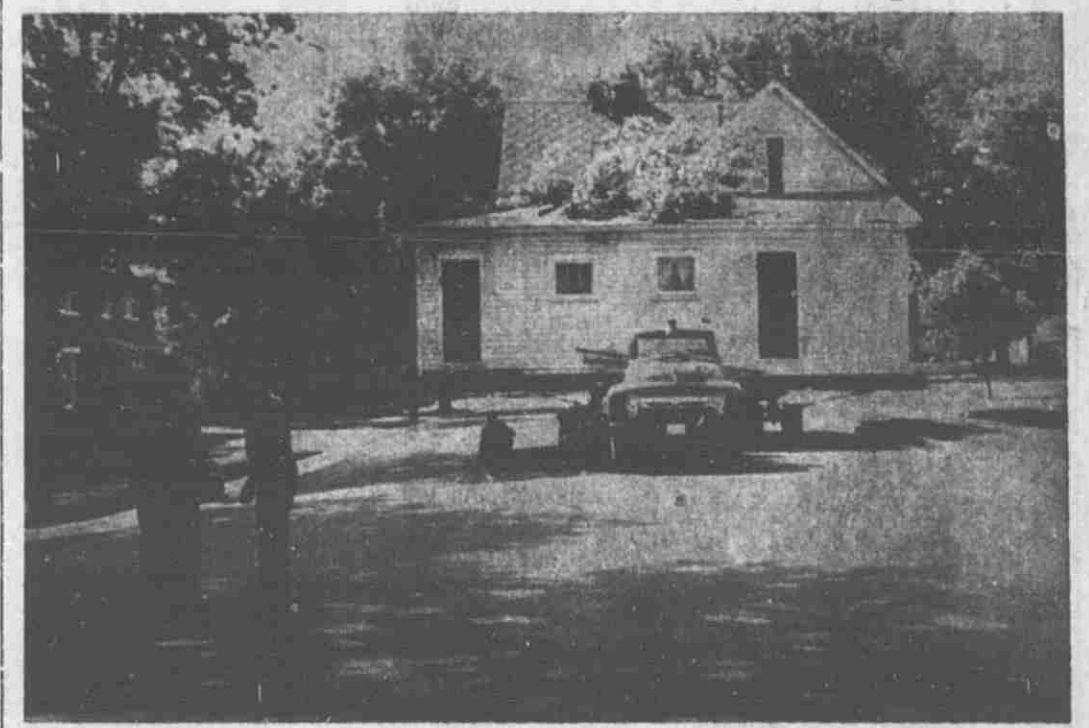

**Lowell Council Proceedings**

Regular Session, Monday evening, June 4, 1956.  
 The meeting was called to order by President Peter Speersta at 8:20 p.m.  
 Roll Call: Trustees Jones, Thompson, Bolems, Munroe, Fonger, Battistella.  
 Absent: None.  
 11 to present: Superintendent Thomas Moore, Attorney Vanderhoeven.

The minutes of the regular session of May 21 and of the special session of May 28 were read and approved as amended.  
 Police Chief Speersta's reports of activities for the period of May 6 through June 2 were read.  
 The clerk reported two building permits issued since last regular meeting:

Richard Martin 961 Vergennes rd remodeling, Albert Dahms 50 Vergennes rd, airtex front of house.  
 Communications were read as follows:  
 1. From wife of Watervliet's mayor re seats for Showboat.  
 2. From Williams Works re the well testing program.  
 Village Attorney Vanderhoeven read a letter from the Staff Attorney of the Michigan Municipal League which is in part, as follows: "Section 5.1346, Michigan Statutes Amendment relating to General Law Villages is practically identical with M. S. A. Section 5.1303 dealing with 4th Class Cities. The sections clearly prohibit the making of the improvement prior to the levy of the special assessment. This prohibition is implicit in Section 5.1302 at villages which is a counter part of Section 5.1329 applicable to 4th Class Cities."  
 "The language of the General Law Village Act and the 4th Class City Act on this point is so clear that, to the best of my knowledge, no Court decisions have been rendered on the point. However, there is no question in my mind but that the failure to levy the assessment before the improvement is commenced is jurisdictional and makes it impossible for the Council to levy a special assessment to defray the cost of the paving after the paving has been commenced. Even proper notice and advertisement on the proposed improvement is jurisdictional."

Guests at Council Meeting included: Alderman representing to interest Council Members in the purchase of an emergency auxiliary lighting plant—a portable generating unit along with flood lighting equipment.  
 Mr. Moore repeated the need for cooperation of Main Street storekeepers in keeping the street clean after being swept by the Street Department. Asked Council's opinion re employees' and the Municipal Plant in an advisory capacity. Tabled pending information from Michigan Municipal League re procedure.

2. The need for immediate action on electric rates, if any is to be taken.  
 3. Installation of a catch basin which will alleviate the unsanitary flooded condition on Grand Drive.

 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Common Council of the Village of Lowell hereby requests the Michigan Consolidated Gas Company to consider bringing natural gas to the Village and its environs.  
 Yes, 6. Nays, 0.

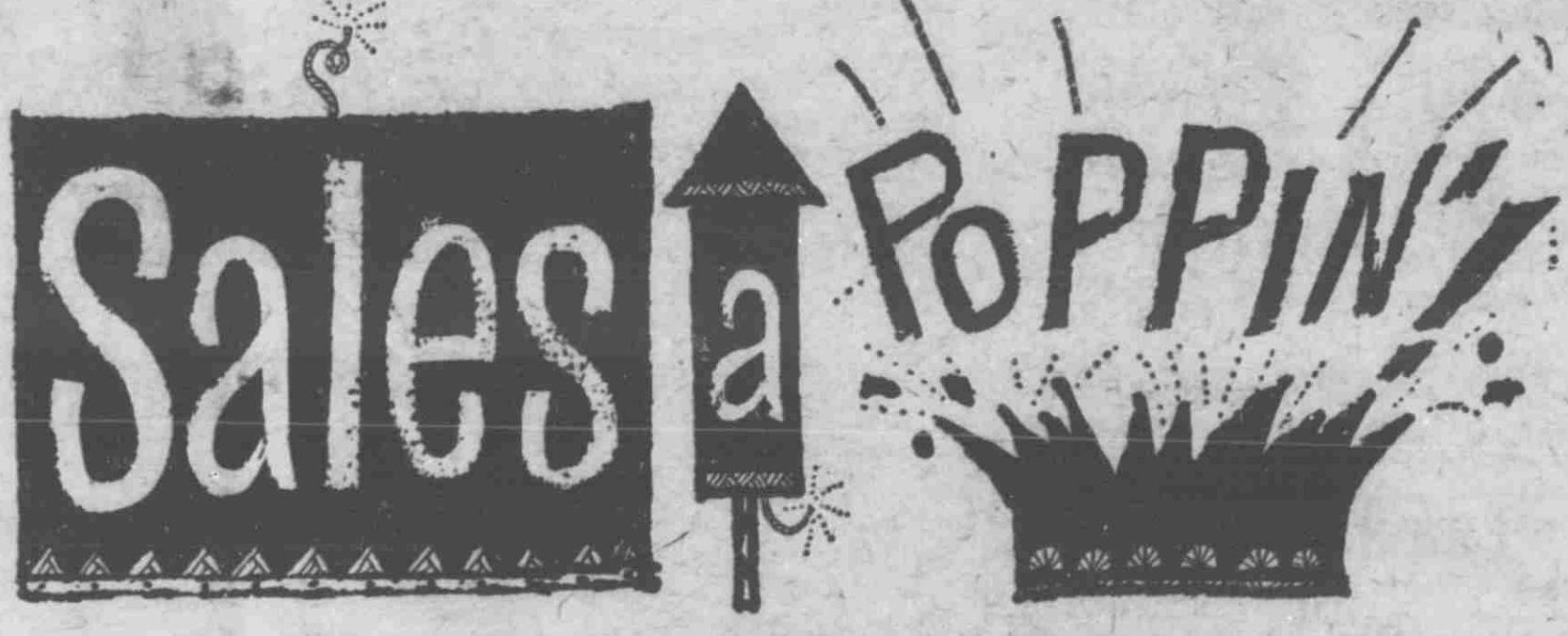

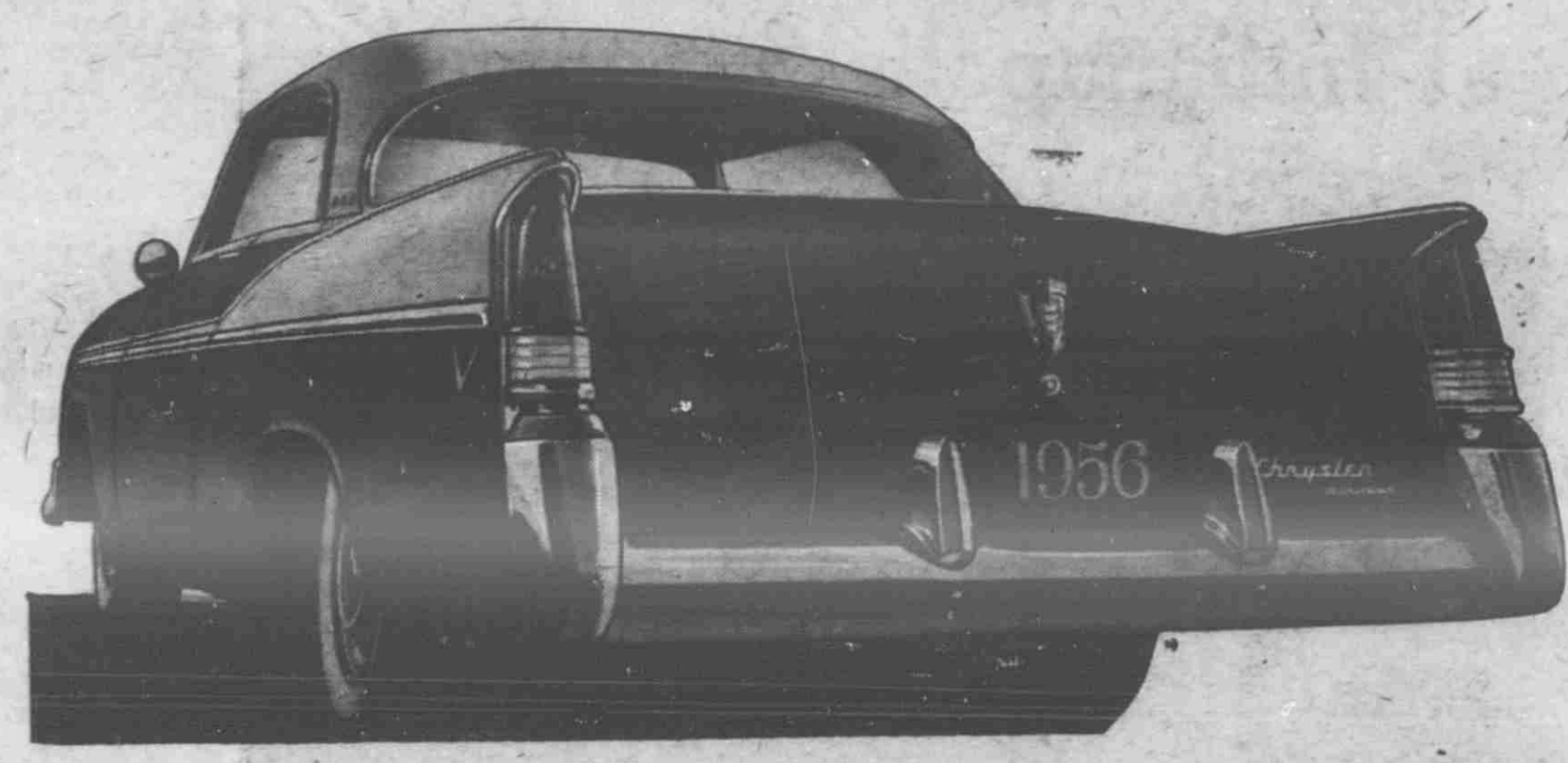

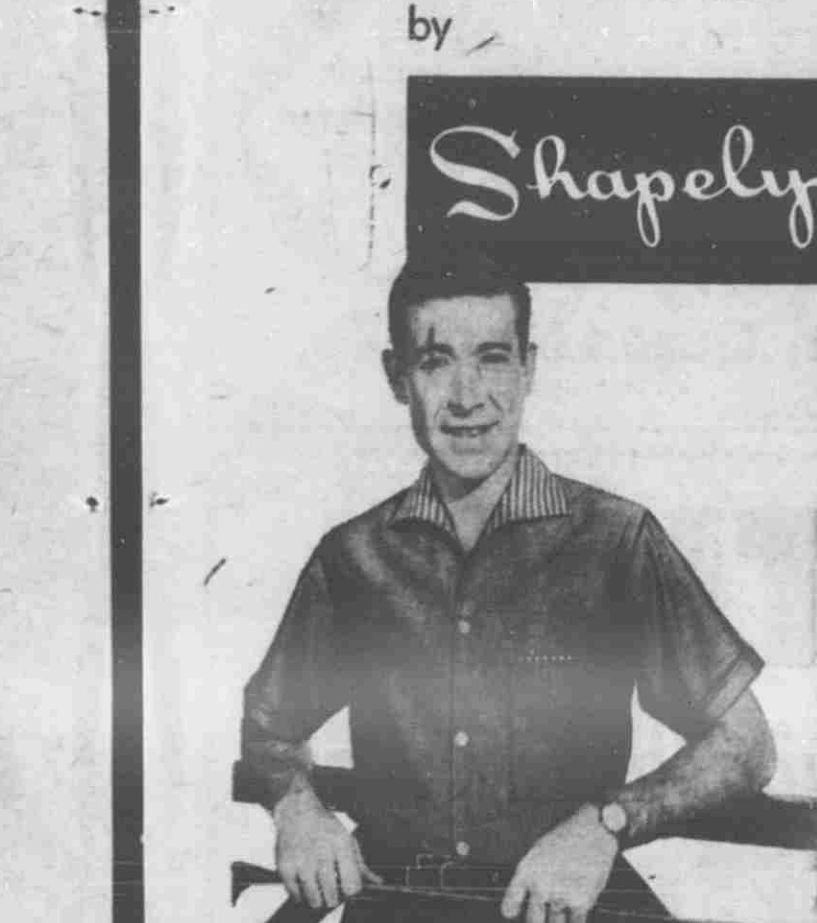

# WHISTLE TOOTS

Tonight (Thursday) the 1956 edition of the Lowell Showboat steams full speed ahead into the waters of preparation. The launching of the Showboat chorus, skippered by Musical Director Orval Jessup, will take place in the Lowell High School gym at 8 o'clock sharp. All gulls and buoys (high school age to infinity) who like to warble in the bath tub or shower are urged to attend this meeting. As we said in last week's Ledger, the only qualifications are that you must like to sing, not just in the bath tub, but for six nights before six thousand people as part of a hundred-member chorus.

The Showboat chorus has always proven enjoyable to all who have sung in it in the past. The rehearsals are always enlivened by the antics-in-preparation of the endmen who consider it equally as important to entertain the chorus as the audience.

And, of course, a yearly event is Interlocutor C. H. Runciman's treat to an ice cream soda at one of the local drug stores. The press is invariably around to take pictures of the chorus rehearsing, and often one of the nearby radio stations records several of the numbers.

By the time the morning rehearsal with the band on the Monday Showboat rolls around, the chorus has been transformed into a bevy of beautiful Southern belles leaning on the arms of dignified Kentucky colonels. That evening, and for the five following evenings, cold cream and number four grease paint is applied by local experts to each singer. Then, after either walking through town or riding the school bus to the Riverside levee (in The Deep South, in case you-all was wonderin' where 'twas), the chorus members clamber aboard the good ship Robert E. Lee, someone blows the whistle, the band plays "Anchors Aweigh", and the paddle wheel begins churning a frothy wake that follows the Showboat all the way to the Lowell dock.

For six nights the chorus members are onstage for the entire show, which contrary to the opinion of those who aren't "in the know" always is found to be entertaining and different. It is fun to get to know the professionals personally, obtain their autographs on a program, and watch as they lose their outward aloofness and settle down to enjoy their week of warm Lowell hospitality. The observant chorus member quickly learns to notice the better audience response when a comedian changes a word or two in his routine; he holds his breath as the acrobats exhibit their skill and his smile of relief almost equals the performers in radiance when the girl has finished her backward triple somersault and landed squarely on the shoulders of her partner; he applauds at the end of each act, not mechanically, but as a sincere expression of satisfaction and appreciation for a professional job well done.

For everyone connected with the show, there is a tinge of sadness when the Saturday night ends with the refrain of "Waitin' For the Robert E. Lee." Another year has disappeared into the pages of history. But for the chorus member the Saturday night dance and the annual dinner remain. And, of course, there's next year....

Anyone who is singing with the Showboat chorus should plan to be at the first meeting in order to sign the "guest list". This insures that your name will be in the program and spelled right, if you write legibly.

The Showboat board of directors met last Thursday evening in Elmer Schaefer's office for their weekly meeting. From now on, the meetings will convene Sunday mornings at 8 o'clock. In order to make sure that everyone is there on time, Norm Borgerson threatens to make the last arrival pay for the coffee.

Pianist for the Showboat chorus rehearsals this will be Don Mullen. Though absent from this post last year, Don has played for many years, and his version of "Here Comes The Showboat" does much to pep up the chorus in the early stages of rehearsal.

This year Endman Walter Gummer will again offer his fine rendition of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." With his fine voice Walt had never ceased to put this number across, if the hundreds of glistering eyes in the audience are any indication.

Three other endmen have tentatively picked their songs. Bucky will sing about "Carolina in the Mornin'." Bernie Kropf will render "On the Sunny Side of the Street," and new endman Charlie Doyle will be "Alabama Bound."

### Don't Lug Bugs In Picnic Hamper

Too many folks lug "bugs" around in their picnic hamper, and the result, according to state health authorities, is an upswing of food-borne poisoning during summer months.

The "bugs"—in this case microscopic bacteria—can grow and develop their poisons when ever you fail to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold, said Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of the department's disease control division.

Dr. Leeder also warned that foods such as creamy salads or custard-filled pastries aren't recommended as picnic fare because they serve as ideal culture media for the obnoxious germs.

The health department spokesman added a caution against storing picnic meals in car trunks or under boat seats, "because unless the food is in an ice chest, both locations give germs the warmth they need to grow, multiply, manufacture their poisons and spoil the fun of a family outing."

### Ear Implants To Change Method Of Cattle Feeding

The "go" sign recently given by the Pure Food and Drug Administration to ear implants of still-bestrol is expected to change method of use for this cattle feeding hormone.

Ear implants will give excellent results according to research in various states, says William Rupp, Jr., Kent county farm agent.

An ear implant is the technique where the hormone in the form of a pellet is inserted into the ear much the way a vitamin shot is given to humans.

And, when stockmen change their method to ear implants they will find costs are lower.

It will be possible to make ear implants with large enough dose to influence a 180-day feeding period.

This will cost about 15 cents compared with 90 cents where still-bestrol is added to feed for that long a time, Rupp said.

Another handy advantage is that you can be selective about which animals will get the treatment. For example, you can feed steers and heifers in the same feedlot without need to separate them.

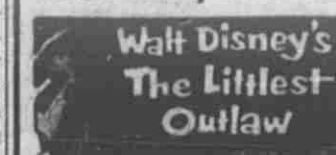
