## Lowell's Share \$7,306 Of Motor Vehicle Fund

The Michigan State Highway Department has released \$7,306.59 from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund for use by Lowell on its roads and streets. This represents Lowell's share of 19 per cent of the funds collected during the first quarter of 1956 by state gasoline, weight and diesel fuel taxes, set aside for the use of incorporated villages and cities.

This fund was established by Act 51, of 1951, and the above figure does not take into consideration additional revenues provided for by the recent Act 87, increasing the gas tax from 4 1/2 to 6 cents. This distribution will be announced later.

Lowell's allowance compares to others in this area, as follows: Freeport \$2,861.94; Ionia \$16,155.79; Lake Odessa \$6,023.15; Belding \$14,655.65; Clarksville \$1,785.08; Saranac \$3,818.04.

Kent County received \$990,885.92 and Ionia County \$200,946.98 as their share of the 37 per cent of the fund allotted to counties for expenditure on county roads. The total funds collected by this Act during the first three months of 1956 amounted to \$66,581,399.58.

## "Dunkers" Double For Salad, Snack

Finger salads can be served right with the main course of the meal or served as snack foods. For finger salads you need an ample supply of crisp raw relishes and a variety of dressings, explains Roberta Hersey, foods and nutrition specialist at Michigan State University. When serving them as a salad course of a meal, use individual salad plates. Place a mound of dressing on each one and surround it with one or more kinds of relishes. Each person dips his own.

Miss Hersey suggests some cheese dressings as being especially tasty with raw vegetables. Some are: cream cheese thinned with mayonnaise and seasoned with chopped pickle; cream cheese mixed with blue cheese and thinned with cream; cottage cheese mixed with sour cream and then seasoned; sour cream, as it is or seasoned; cottage cheese thinned with cream and seasoned with garlic or onion salt. Another suggestion is mayonnaise or salad dressing mixed with curry, dill, catchup or horseradish.

Raw relishes, without any dressing, can double as a salad, too. For crisp raw vegetables try small romaine or lettuce leaves; carrot or celery sticks; small chunks of lettuce or Chinese cabbage; watercress sprigs; cucumber sticks or slices; scallions, radishes, green-pepper strips or rings; thick tomato wedges; or tiny cauliflowerrets.

## Showboat Construction Underway; Improvements to Cost Over \$4,500

Lowell Showboat bleachers construction and boat renovation got under way Tuesday in preparation for the annual summer spectacle which will be presented July 23 through 28.

Victor S. Tidd, chairman of the construction committee, said that \$4,500 would be spent in erecting seats, installing a more modern

spotlight system, painting the boat and other necessary repairs. Tidd added that all 200 of the 50-gallon oil drums which support the 90 foot boat will be inspected and replaced as necessary. The contract for the construction has been let to the C. J. Place Co., of Lowell.

Tidd explained that he and his assistants are carefully inspecting the permanent and temporary seats to insure 100 per cent safety for the tens of thousands who will flock to the show. The stadium has capacity of 6,000.

Tidd and crew are working against a July 14 deadline. That evening thousands will fill the stands for the annual Talent Night contest, forerunner to the main show. More than fifty acts are expected to compete for a chance to appear on Showboat. Six winners will be selected, one appearing each night.

## July 1 Starts New Curbs on Bang's Disease

Further assistance to the Federal-State program to eradicate Brucellosis (Bang's disease) in Michigan's dairy and beef cattle herds will be implemented July 1 when two new policies of the Michigan commission of agriculture become effective.

One policy is a preventive measure forbidding removal from home premises of any animal from a quarantined herd except to slaughter under permit. The other deals with branding cattle that react to Brucellosis tests.

Brucellosis is a disease that causes abortion in cattle. It is highly contagious and has cost American cattle owners millions of dollars over the years. Under certain conditions it is transmissible to man in the form of undulant fever.

The first commission policy would affect forthcoming fairs or exhibitions in a few instances. The commission ruled that after July 1 no cattle from any herd under quarantine in the state can be removed for exhibition or sale.

In instances where quarantined herds are found under subsequent tests to be Brucellosis-free the quarantine will be lifted but such tests cannot be made at less than 30 days from the time the infected animals were removed from the herd.

The second policy deals with branding. After July 1 any animal reacting positively to Brucellosis test will carry a 2-inch branded "B" on its left jaw. This will apply to any animal, whether it be tested under the program by Federal or State veterinarians or by private test by a local veterinary practitioner.

Under the accelerated program under way in Michigan every county has had at least one milk survey, which is the initial step toward eradication. Some counties have given the second milk test.

## Lowell No. 5 Votes July 3 Foxes Corners School District Favors Annexation to Lowell 28-3

An overwhelming vote of 28 to 3 Monday evening decided that the Vergennes School District No. 10 will become annexed to the Lowell Township Fourth Class School District No. 1. According to A. E. Ward, treasurer of the Vergennes school district, this vote represents the wishes of all the legal voters in that district.

The property owners also voted on another question: Whether or not the school district should assume the proportional responsibilities for the bonded indebtedness of the Lowell School District by so joining it, and this was also favored by a good margin, 26-3.

Now, these persons will be able to send their children to Lowell Schools without paying extra tuition and transportation charges, and their properties will be assessed and taxed by the Lowell School district. They will also have a voice in all Lowell School elections.

Within ten days of the date of the election the School Board of the Foxes Corners School must make a certified statement about the election to the Lowell School Board, and within 15 days they must turn over all their assets to the Lowell School District, and thus cease to exist.

The annexation actually has already taken place, however, according to Lowell Superintendent W. W. Gumsier, who states that the law provides the annexation reverts back to the date of the election, June 25.

One interesting point about this annexation is that the school building at Foxes corners is now the property of the Lowell district, but the land on which it stands reverts back to the original owners who leased it to the old school district for 99 years for "educational purposes only". Mr. Gumsier states the building will probably be torn down, and the furnishings sold.

**Lowell No. 5 to Vote**  
Lowell School District No. 5 will vote Tuesday, July 3, at the home of Gerald Mullen, Pratt Lake road, between the hours of 7 and 9 o'clock in the evening. They will also vote on the same two proposals on which the Vergennes group did. Lowell No. 5 is a closed school district.

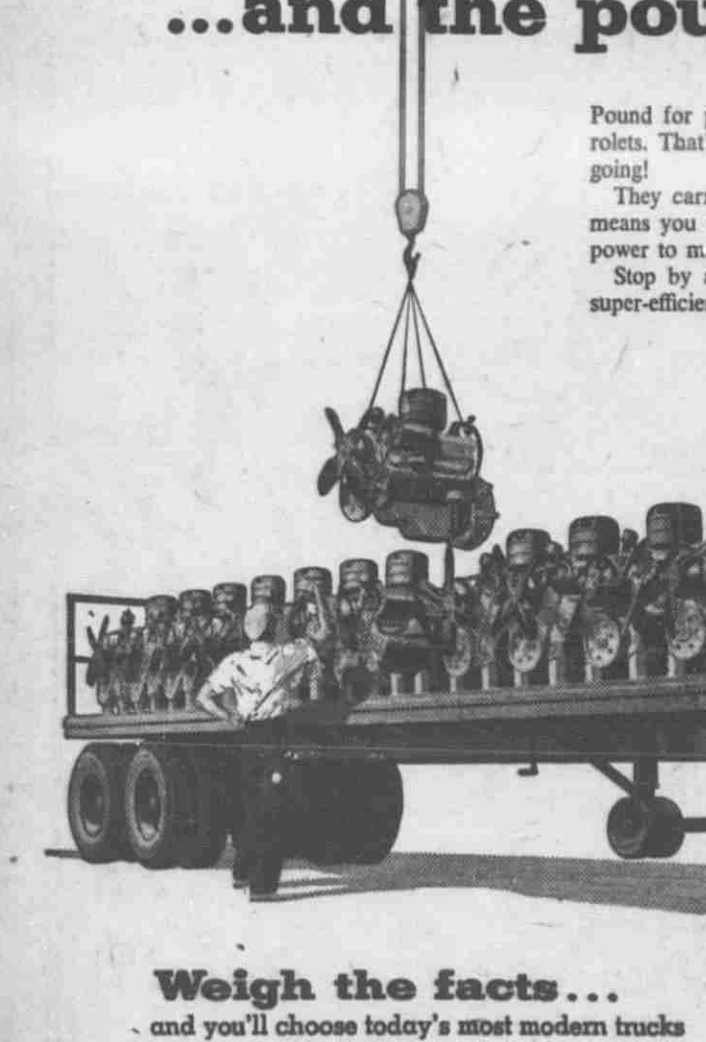

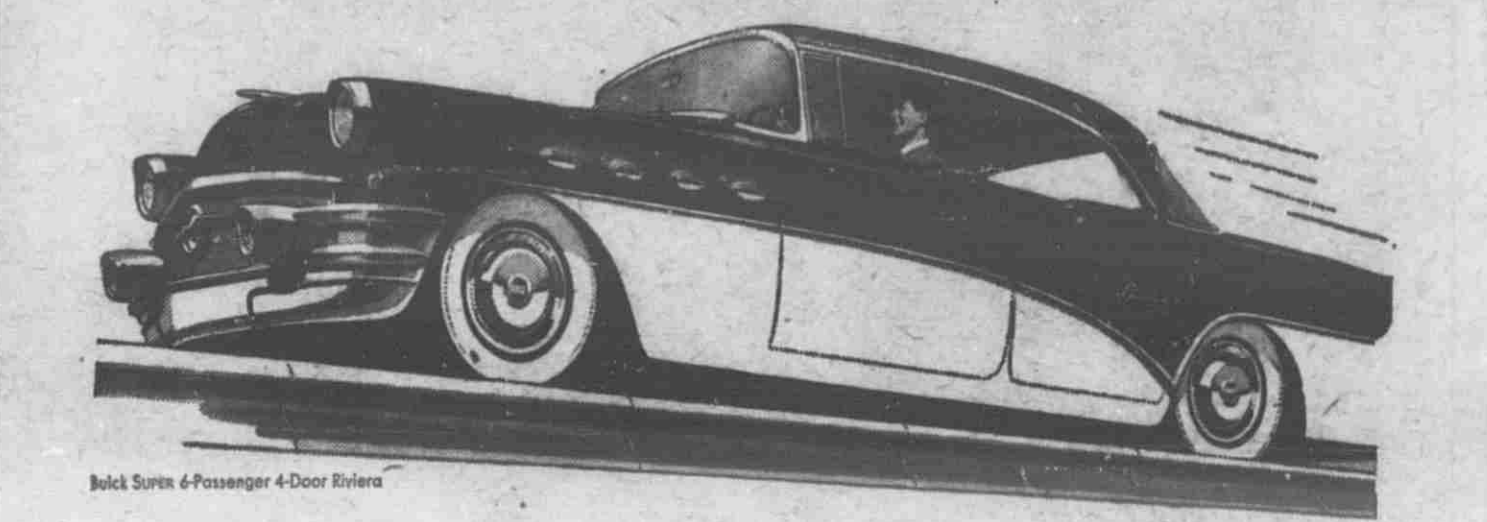

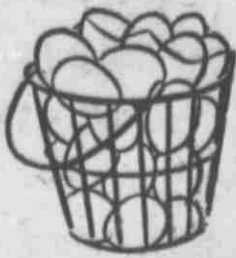

### Taking Care of Kids Most Fun For Moms

Looking after the children seems to be the favorite household chore of young mothers of pre-school children. In fact, more than half of the 100 Lansing women interviewed in a recent survey preferred taking care of their youngsters to shopping, cleaning, cooking, washing dishes, washing clothes and ironing.

Conducted by the home management department at Michigan State University, the study was begun last year to seek out some of the causes of mental fatigue of these mothers of young children. Researchers conducting the study, which is not yet completed, feel that there might be some connection between a homemaker's fatigue and her having to do a task she dislikes.

About one-tenth of the women questioned like cleaning and straightening the house best; few like shopping and washing and ironing clothes; and none of them preferred washing dishes.

The most disliked chore was ironing clothes, cites Dr. Elizabeth Wiegand, researcher carrying on the study. This is maybe because ironing is a task which often can wait and so it seems unending.

### Editorial We Outlawed Fireworks — But Cars?

In 1905 there were 456 fireworks deaths in the United States. Last year there was only one. Quite a record of progress.

Back in 1903 a rather ridiculous looking machine was just sputtering into being. Last year that machine—evolving from the ungainly horseless carriage into the sleek and powerful modern automobile—claimed 407 lives during the 4th of July holiday.

Thus the net gain in our efforts to avoid holiday self-destruction seems to be about zero. Yet there is a lesson to be learned here.

Fireworks deaths on the Fourth have been almost eliminated because thinking persons revolted at such senseless killing, and state by state the sale and use of dangerous fireworks were prohibited.

**Outlaw Misuse**  
No one, of course, is advocating

that the sale or use of automobiles be banned. But we strongly urge the outlawing of their misuse.

Most people want to use their cars safely. But in every society there is always a minority of reckless and irresponsible drivers who turn a deaf ear to all appeals for prudent and commonsense behavior.

It is for this group that the National Safety Council and the International Association of Chiefs of Police have jointly recommended a rigid law enforcement policy by all police agencies during the 4th of July celebration.

We strongly support this recommendation. A traffic accident emergency faces this country, with a new all-time high death toll in prospect. It is time to stop temporizing with this problem. The 4th of July holiday is a good time to start getting tough.
