## Music...Laughs...Thrills Professionals and Local Talent Star As 1956 Showboat Thrills Throng

An American Beauty version of the Lowell Showboat greeted the opening night throngs when the 103rd performance of the gala annual program thrilled almost five thousand onlookers Monday evening.

The spectators in the stands had an opportunity to get a preview of the red, blue and silver decorations sooner than usual that night, as the boat lodged on a sand bar and the boat started to turn a little sooner than is usually planned. But Admiral Runciman, his helmsman Frank Stephens and the two visiting newsboys from Grand Rapids managed the wheel successfully, and the Robert E. Lee XXI pulled into port just minutes after darkness had settled over the riverbank.

No matter whether you are a novice to the Showboat, or an old timer who has seen performance after performance, it is always a thrill to see the gaily decorated boat tie in and dock, and slowly rise out of the water as the chorus members dance on the stage singing "Are You From Dixie".

And from this opening to the grand finale "The Robert E. Lee", the 1956 show is offering its audiences one of the best programs ever seen on Showboat. There is a lot of variety, with acts to please the young and old.

We in Lowell are always proud of the part our local endmen, chorus and veteran interlocutor C. H. Runciman play in entertaining the crowds, but visitors to our annual show get a big thrill out of the professional acts. And, from the glamorous and talented violin quartet, "Ving Merlin and his Violin Beauties" to the show-closers, The Four Step Brothers, the visiting stars fill our show with thrilling moments. We predict that by Saturday night they will be turning away customers at the gate.

**Some Shuffling**  
We called the Four Step Brothers "show-closers". This is a misstatement inasmuch as the audience likes them so well they don't want the show to close. The published program of the 1956 show put them just before Walt Gumsers' of-requested "Battle Hymn of the Republic" but they were switched from this spot to follow Walt's number, and they complete the show in fine style. ## King Mill Accepts First New Wheat

Calvin Pinckney of Keene township brought in the first load of wheat to King Milling Company Tuesday afternoon, which will be stored under the farm wheat program.

Mr. Pinckney's load, from his 24-acre field, tested 58 pounds to the bushel and had moisture content of 13.5 per cent. Wheat which is accepted for storage under the farm program must test below 14 per cent.

As of Wednesday morning more wheat was arriving, but because of the great amount of rain this summer the moisture content is running a little high.

Last year the loads started to arrive a bit earlier, with Orville Stahl of Clarksville delivering on July 11. His wheat tested 13.5 per cent moisture also, and tested 56 pounds to the bushel.

**By Popular Request**  
As we said, Mr. Gumsers has been requested so many times to repeat "The Battle Hymn of the Republic", and the 1956 show again features this popular number. Even before Mr. Runciman asked the audience to participate in a final chorus we noticed that some around us were already "participating".

Willy, West and McGinty, and their pantomime house-building routine of slap-stick comedy, may have some trouble reaching the folks who don't have the best center seats. But, if you do, they are a riot. It is a wonder that they can remember how to accomplish so many "mistakes", and you don't have to be a carpenter or brick layer to enjoy it.

There are about a railroad carload of props for this act however, and during the interlude of setting and re-setting the stage we would like to see a lot more of the local endmen. Chris Burch, with the help of his buddies Forrest Buck, Charlie Doyle, Bill Jones, Bernie Kropf and Walt Gumsers, does a balancing act to compete with the Antonettes, but we don't believe that Chris will be leaving town soon to go "on the road". He didn't fall in the river, but we had our fingers crossed.

The Antonettes, incidentally, are an acrobat team which flips each member of the quintet from one end of the stage to the other by jumping onto teeter boards, etc.

The act is filled with thrills, and the Monday night audience had to take an extra gulp or two when the "tired" entertainers had a few close calls. It seems the folks arrived just hours before Showboat performance, having driven for three days and nights from Florida—with little or no sleep.

**Something Different**  
Ving Merlin and his Violin Beauties are something entirely different for Showboat audiences. Mr. Merlin and his three very attractive companions not only play expert violin, but look very charming (the girls that is) while doing it. We don't mean Mr. Merlin isn't attractive—if you like the Liberace type you'll swoon. But, as the opening professional act, they provide excellent entertainment.

The Dorothy Dorben dancers are making their first appearance at the Lowell outdoor event, and have two very excellent routines. Also new to Showboat audiences is the band, directed by Bud Dinwiddie of Chicago. The band keeps pretty busy providing peppy background music for all the numbers, and by the end of the week we are sure the chorus line will have learned how to do their endmen dance at the finale. This is, of course, something they hadn't practiced for and their final-number hooped costumes make it a trifle awkward, but colorful.

**Steal The Show**  
We weren't intending to leave out Curry, Bird and LeRoy, not by a long shot. They literally steal the show.

This threesome begin their act with Mrs. Curry, introduced as Norma Jean Martin, a "pop" singer, who apparently is the "Bird" in the act. She has a little trouble with a shutter-happy member of the audience, LeRoy, who is already well known to the crowd as he has been busily getting in the way all during the pre-show water skiing exhibition and the first few acts.

When Mr. Curry finally is introduced he and his wife attempt some ballroom dancing, with quite a bit of "help" from LeRoy. This is the best comedy act Showboat has billed in many years.

**Rains Come Tuesday**  
The Tuesday night show just "made it" in time, as a few rain drops fell during the finale, at 10:45. It waited just long enough for people to clear away before the heavens tipped the buckets and "it poured". The guests Tuesday evening included War Veterans and Auxiliaries; and the special amateur was Sandra Gramer and Al Slayton, an excellent dance team from Flint.

Wednesday night the Lowell "suburb", Grand Rapids, was honored, and the amateur talent was provided in an act from that city, entitled "Frankie and Johnny". Many prominent Grand Rapids officials were on the boat as it cruised down Flat river for the third show of 1956.

Thursday, Mayors from all over the state are invited as special guests and the Business and Professional Women also have a special section for their federated club members.

Friday night State Officials will be honored, and the Governor is invited to "take over" the helm of the Robert E. Lee, XXI, for the final performance on Saturday.

## Transfers Cause Controversy Annexation Problems Arise in Gove and Thomas School Districts

When the electors of the Gove school district—Cascade No. 3—recently voted 69 to 2 to become a part of the Lowell school district, in accordance with an invitation extended by the Lowell Board, it apparently was the beginning of what has become a complex problem.

As soon as the area became a part of the local district several citizens requested that their property should be set over into the newly-formed Cascade Area School District. Accordingly, the County Board of Education has issued notices providing for a hearing on Monday, July 30, at 9:30 p. m. to be held in the Parkside School at Rockford.

## David Nead Enters Technical Training

On July 17 the electors of the Thomas district voted to sell the school property, and they also voted to request that the County Board of Education should transfer about half of their district to Lowell, an area consisting of all property east of Quigley avenue, plus the John Cox property. In so doing the electors neglected to vote to assume their proportionate share of the Lowell bonded indebtedness.

The County Board will conduct a hearing in their offices in the County Building Annex on Tuesday, July 31, at 12:45 p. m. to hear arguments for or against the proposal. Representatives of the Lowell Board will attend both hearings.

It is possible that the Lowell Board will object to the transfer of too much of the area of the former Gove district and it is also likely that the Lowell Board will request the electors of the Thomas District to vote a special millage to assume their proportionate share of the Lowell bonded indebtedness.

In either or both cases it is likely that an appeal will be made to the proper authorities in Lansing.

An outbreak of red measles—the two-week variety—has hit this town with a bang. In two days local doctors report over 30 cases have been discovered. This is the variety of the measles sickness which makes children quite ill, according to the doctors.

## "Cover Up" On Park Accident?

The Kent County Sheriff's department is apparently withholding information on the disposition of an alleged reckless driving charge against a man who tore up a good section of the beautiful entranceway to Fallsburg Park last Saturday evening.

According to Lowell Police Officer George DeGraw, also a county deputy, who was requested by the Sheriff's department to report on the matter, the car was driven by a Robert Lautenbach or Spautenbach, of Grand Rapids, who came out of the entranceway to the park (not the exit) with his 1956 Ford, got into some trouble, skidded 447 feet, tearing up the shoulder turf on the west side of the roadway and careening to the east side, smashing two posts, two trees and ramming a picnic table against a tree.

Roth ambulance was called to the scene and Wes Roth stated that on his way to the accident he met a car taking the injured man from the scene. DeGraw's report stated the driver suffered head injuries.

According to Frank Baker of the West Side Garage, which brought in the wrecked car, damages were about \$500.

We understand from Patrolman DeGraw that a deputy Art Ketchel was investigating the matter, and had interviewed Mr. (S.) Lautenbach. However, he has been unavailable for comment when ever we have tried to reach him.

Perhaps the Prosecuting Attorney's office should investigate the matter.

Doctors Thomas Hill and Orval McKay indicated that their cases seem to have all stemmed from a visit to the local theatre on either Tuesday or Wednesday, July 10 and 11, when the "Song of the South" was showing. Apparently a child coming down with the ailment was at the show these nights. Most of the children they have examined so far were at the theatre one or both of the above nights, they say.

So, if your child has any of the symptoms, and was at the show, that's probably it, according to the doctors.

Parents are reminded that although the illness cannot be prevented, shots of gamma globulin can be given to children who have been exposed to the disease, lessening the severity of the sickness. The red measles make children feel quite ill, and the shots would help them a great deal, the doctors say.

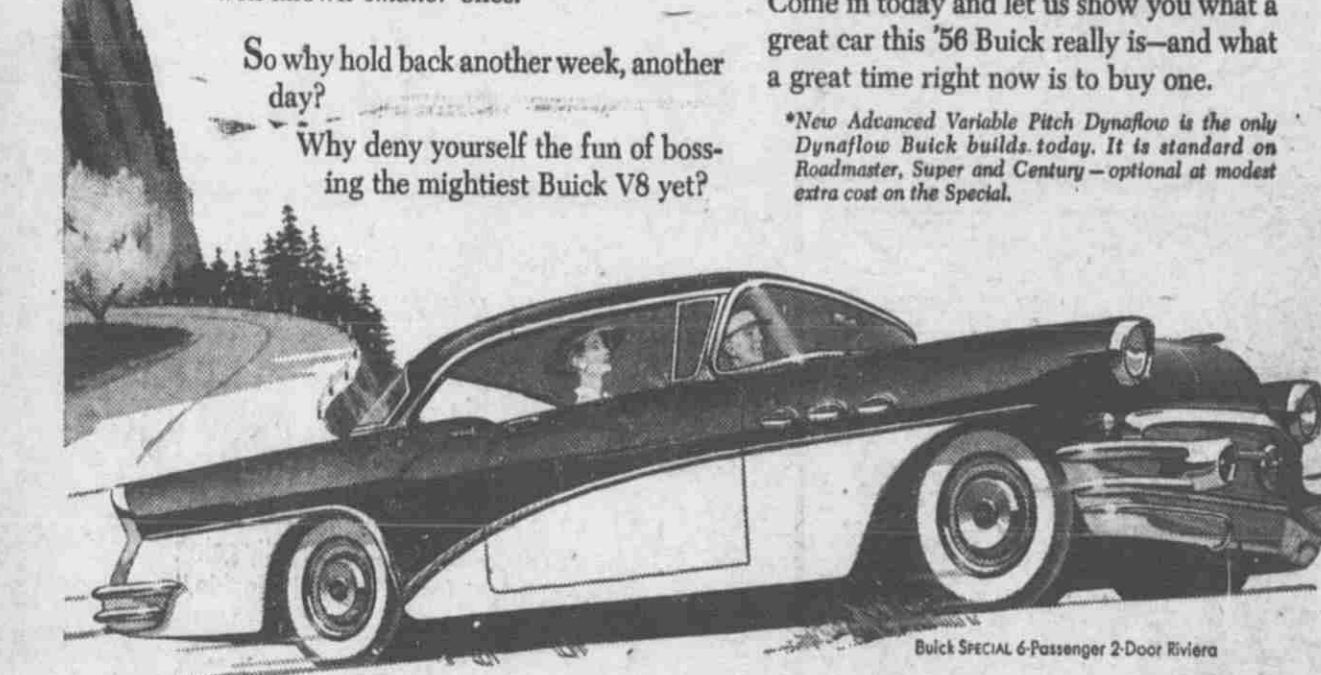
