

Start Crackdown **On Underweight** Trucking Slips

Up to date weight slips will have by law-enforcement officers. to be submitted with all applications for 1957 license plates for rucking equipment, according to Secretary of State, James M. Hare. The license plates are those that will have to be secured prior to November 15, 1956. This is the first time in many years that an effort has been made to check the weights of trucks and related equipment against the amounts declared by owners when they pay their license fees.

"Our truck license fees are on a graduated scale. The heavier a truck the more the owner must pay for license plates. I'm sure that only a small minority of truckers understates the weights, but our Investigations Division ha found enough that we expect t eing several additional hundred thousand dollars into the state coffers this year," says Hare.

"This year we hope to be able to eatch up with many understatements of weight by our require ment for an up-to-date weight slip. Our investigators are not nume ous enough to make all the checks that should be made. "We have found that some truck wners originally declared the eights of their equipment strip-

ed down and then added consider able weight. An up-to-date weight slip should catch us up, at least starting in 1957, with the revenue we were losing through this sub-"However, the requirement for a weight slip won't catch another

kind of cheating. This is the use of the same plates for more than one piece of equipment. I'm afraid at we will only eliminate this iolation through the activities of our Investigations Division. "The trucking industry is mad up, in its great majority, of public
