Grades

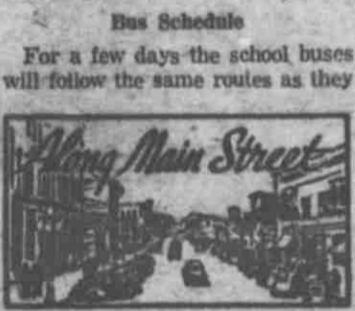

Announce Low Bidders For New Ada Bridge; Lincoln Lake Rd. Paving

Two Kent County highway improvement projects in the immediate locality.

Bids for two Kent county highway improvement projects in our immediate area were opened in Lansing last Wednesday morning, along with eight other state trunkline highway construction jobs.

The new Ada bridge, which is to be completed by November 30, 1957, received a low bid of \$670,550.20 from Brown Brothers of Lansing.

This re-inforced-concrete and steel structure will have seven rolled-iron spans totaling 480 feet in length, with two 27-foot-wide roadways separated by a 4-foot-wide median.

Freak Accident Hurts Alto Man

Ralph C. Colby, 23, of Alto, was seriously injured Monday noon in a freak accident at the Hobbs-Stahl gasoline station in Alto. Colby, who was on his lunch hour from work with the construction crew at the new Farmers State-Bank building, was helping the station owners erect a sign, using a Ramsay gun, which shoots nails into cement.

Apparently a nail from the gun deflected, ricocheting and hitting Colby in the forehead. Using Joe Stahl's car, they set out for Lowell, but the auto broke down in front of the Willis Hatch home on M 50. So they borrowed the Hatch car, and continued their trip here where they consulted a local doctor, and then Colby was rushed to Butterworth Hospital.

At the hospital it was discovered that the nail had pierced the forehead skull and that a small particle of bone was pressing against the brain. An operation was necessary, and a brain surgeon, Dr. Williams, was called.

The operation was performed Monday night, and was pronounced a success. It was necessary to remove a small particle of the brain, according to Colby's mother, Mrs. Charles Colby.

Barring any unforeseen complications, the injured man will probably be hospitalized only two weeks.

Mr. Colby also works for the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway in Grand Rapids doing the construction work on the bank during his free hours. He and his wife Judy and infant son live on 76th st.

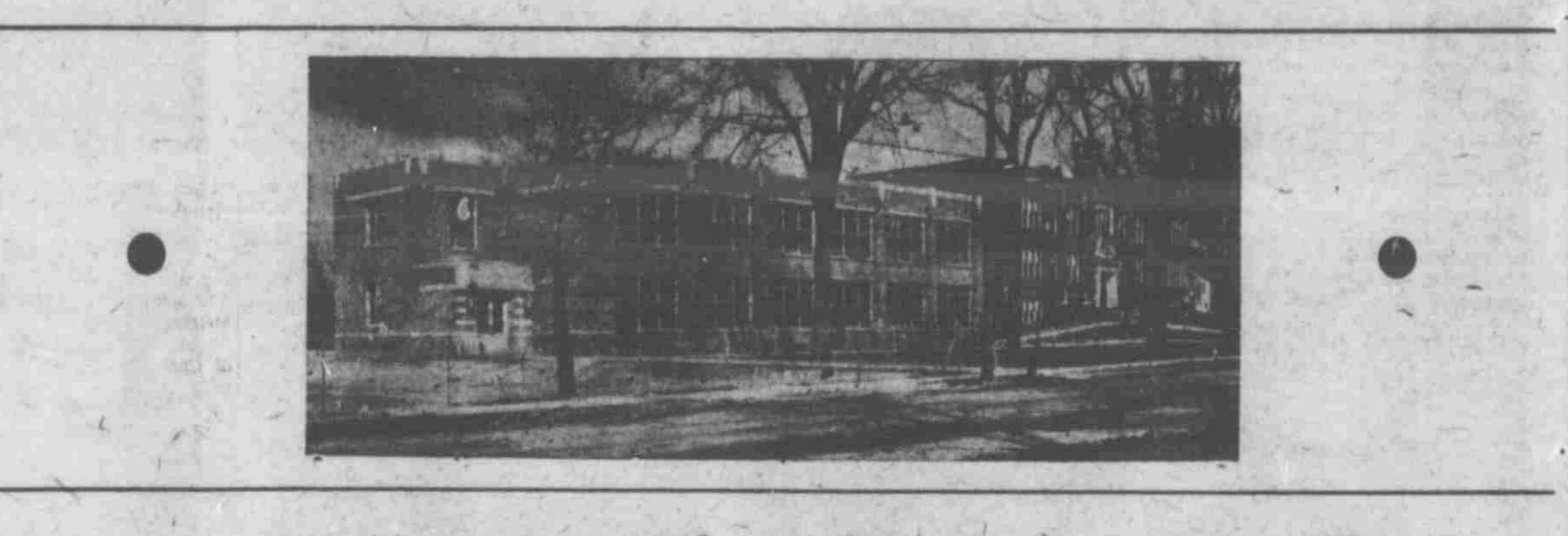
