## Happened About 7:30 Wednesday a. m. "Whitey" Schroder Seriously Hurt As Truck Goes Over Embankment

Wayne L. "Whitey" Schroder, 47, was seriously injured about 7:45 Wednesday morning when the telephone pick-up truck, which he was driving, went out of control on M-91 just north of Lowell, and slid over the steep river embankment.

"Whitey", who is an exchange repairman for Mich. Bell Telephone Co. and works out of Lowell, was alone, and there were no witnesses to the accident.

Kent County Sheriff's deputies Moreau and Visser are investigating the wreck, and stated to Police Chief Frank L. Stephens that the truck apparently went out

of control as "Whitey" was driving south on M-91, went off the right side, veered off across the roadway again hitting a guard rail on the left side, and plunged backwards over the steep embankment, stopping against a tree.

"Whitey" was pinned in the vehicle, but Roth's ambulance was summoned and rushed him to St. Mary's hospital where it was determined he broke both legs, fractured his right arm, and suffered numerous cracked ribs, according to a report received here from the Michigan Bell company doctor.

The hospital stated he was in serious condition, and would not allow him to be questioned by the Sheriff's department.

The accident occurred just south of the Hendricks farm, and apparently the truck had manipulated the right curve on the roadway and went out of control just beyond that point. The truck was a '55 model, and was used by the repairmen for service calls. It was completely demolished. "Whitey" lives on M-91 just a few miles north of Lowell.

## Woman Killed, Former Local Man Hurt, in Accidents

A former Lowell resident Leon G. Husted was hospitalized, and a Grand Rapids woman died as a result of two separate accidents in this area over the week-end.

The Grand Rapids woman died as a result of an accident on Lincoln Lake road Sunday afternoon, just a little south of the intersection of the Fallsburg park road.

Dead is Mrs. Frances Gerrett, 58, of Grand Rapids, who suffered head injuries when she was thrown out of a car which skidded out of control and overturned just about 3 miles north of Lowell. She died at the scene.

Mrs. Constance Tette, 33, of Grand Rapids, was driving the car, and Mr. Gerrett was also a passenger. They folks escaped serious injury.

It was determined by investigating officers from the sheriff's department that the pavement was wet, because of a slight afternoon shower. The accident occurred about 4 o'clock.

## Hurt Saturday

Mr. Husted, 26, now of 556 N. Price, Ionia, was injured in an accident Saturday morning at about 1:45. The mishap occurred on M-21 just 2 miles east of the Ionia county line.

Husted was taken to a Grand Rapids Osteopathic hospital, where it was ascertained he had broken his left arm, and sustained injuries to his right leg and shoulder. He was apparently treated and released.

According to Lowell officer Geo. Henderson, it was reported that Husted was passing another car, ran off the roadway, and hit a tree. Henderson investigated the accident for the Ionia county authorities.

## Public Schools Enroll 1,130 As Of September 14

As of the second Friday of school, September 14, the Lowell public schools had a total enrollment of 1,130, according to a statement from the office of Superintendent of Schools W. W. Gumsier.

A breakdown of this enrollment is: New Elementary Building: Kindergarten, 89; First grade 78; Second Grade 77; Third Grade 64; or a total in the new building of 308.

Second Elementary Building: Fourth Grade, 71; Fifth, 67; Sixth, 40, or a total of 178 students.

High School Building: Seventh grade, 61; Eighth grade, 74. This brings a total of 621 students in the grades, including kindergarten.

Also in the High School building, the top four grades are enrolled as follows: Freshmen, 164; Sophomores, 137; Juniors, 112; and Seniors 96; or a total of 509 in the high school.

## Will Route Traffic On Vergennes Street For Ada Bridge Work

Vergennes street, which runs from M21 just east of the present Ada bridge, to M91 just north of Lowell, has been selected as a detour route during construction of the approaches to the new bridge over the Grand River, which work is to be started this fall.

Traffic must be re-routed while a hill is cut down to allow the highway to make a wide, sweeping curve before coming to the new bridge site.

Vehicles will travel Vergennes st. to Lincoln Lake road, where traffic will be directed south into Lowell to Main st., then on the regular M21 route.

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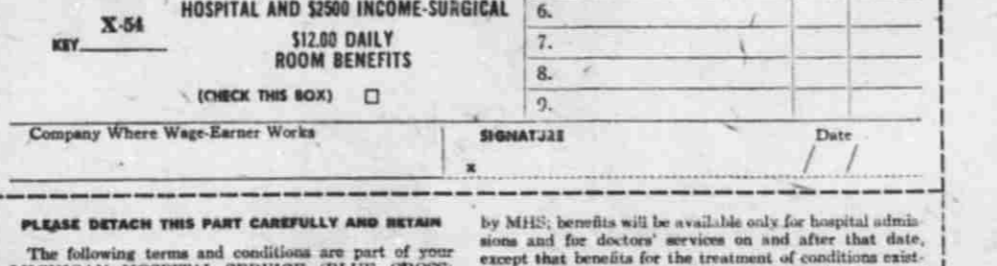

## Hungry Soils In Kent County

Kent County's soils have been lacking in plant food leaving plants

in a state of a reduced diet. According to Richard Reath, assistant county farm agent, more than 1,500 soil test-samples in recent months show that from two to two and one-half tons of lime are needed on each acre.

And, with this need for more lime, there is also shown a need for a 1-4-2 ratio of fertilizer. The 1-4-2 ratio means one part nitrogen, four parts phosphorus, and two parts potash.

More than 75 per cent of the soil sample tested show this need, he said.

Cost-research studies show that fertilizer is the best buy the farmer can make for his crop production.

Reath would like farmers to test their soils once in each crop rotation. Then get the fertility level up to needed level and adjust fertilizer program through rest of

rotation to a maintenance program. Maintenance approach then requires the farmer to put back only plant food that has been taken out by his harvested crops.

A minimum fertilizer level is needed by all crops, he said. And, in our heavy soils tests show that there are deficiencies of lime, phosphorus and nitrogen. In lighter, or sandy soils, need is for lime, nitrogen, phosphorus and potash.

Danger of running a too-low level of potash is that it needs an also low level of lime. The reverse is also true—showing the need for a balance in the fertility of soils.

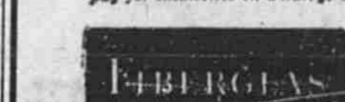

Richard Reath, assistant Kent County agent, stresses that soil testing is highly important to successful crop production. Some of the reasons are:

With corn, excessive potash levels in the row will reduce seed germination. This too-high level can cause a reduced intake of other plant foods.

It is evident each year that legume seedlings fail because of low levels of lime in the soil. When soils have a low level of lime, the available phosphorus in that same soil becomes lost to the plant. Where lime is lacking to the point of a soil with an acidity level of pH 5.8 most of the phosphorus is tied-up in an unavailable form.

And, acid soils adversely affect soil bacterial activity which converts unavailable plant food to an available form—puts it in condition so plant can absorb it.

Test Your Soil Now! Test your soil in the fall while you can still take samples before the ground is frozen. If you wait until spring, soils are too wet, and a soil test now helps you buy your fertilizer for your next growing season.

If your soil and topography is similar throughout the field, take a pint sample anywhere. Where there are differences in the soil and topography take a little from each part.

Mix these soils together from one field and bring a cupful of soil to the County Extension office for testing.

Be sure that your soil sample has been air dried before you bring it in.

Then in 7 to 10 days the results of your soil test will be mailed to you along with corrective fertilizer and lime recommendations.

In most counties there is a small charge for this laboratory service, Reath said.

M. S. U. swine specialists recommend feeding a mixed ration to pigs up to about 75 pounds in weight and then feeding a free choice ration to market weight.

## Find Sure Death For Quackgrass

New hope is offered farmers troubled by quackgrass—in the chemical called dalapon. It gives excellent results, says Richard Reath, assistant Kent county farm agent, citing Michigan State University research.

Best results are obtained where quackgrass is vigorously growing. If it's growth is not vigorous, it may pay to fertilize an established quackgrass sod before treating. This will help the quackgrass to reestablish a vigorous growth in time for treatment.

When quackgrass is eight to ten inches high, treat it to the killer chemical. Then two weeks after treatment, you can plow under the treated area—or plowing can be delayed until spring.

Rate of application will vary, Reath said. Try two different rates—10 and 15 pounds per acre. And,
