

Giant earth movers begin the task of making a new channel for the Thornapple River. The new M-21 bridge will begin where the present river empties into the Grand. Approximately 1,800 feet long, the new course for the river involves the movement of thousands of cubic yards of earth. As the earth is removed it is dumped next to the old stream and a giant bulldozer is gradually narrowing the river. Average depth of the channel will be 8 feet. In three sections of the new river bed water is beginning to seep to the surface.
