Fords Now Come In Two Sizes

For the first time in its 35-year history, Ford Motor Company will produce two sizes of Ford cars, according to Jay Boelens, manager of the C. H. Runciman Motor Sales. The 19 new models unveiled by Ford dealers Wednesday morning have the highest performance engines ever offered in the low price field.

Boelens said the 1957 Fords "represent the biggest change in the modern history of the Ford car."

The new Ford line divides into two basic sizes, Fairlane and Custom, plus the station wagon series, each with its own body and chassis. In addition, the Fairlane series has been expanded to offer "Fairlane 500" models, which feature extra luxury features.

The 1957 Fairlane and Fairlane 500 sedans are nine inches longer and four inches lower than last year's comparable models. Custom and Custom 300 sedans are more than three inches longer and nearly three and one-half inches lower than the 1956 models. Station wagons are three and one-half inches longer and nearly six inches longer. Fairlane and Fairlane 500's are built on a 118-inch wheelbase. Station wagons, Customs and Custom 300's have a 116-inch wheelbase.

"There has been no sacrifice of headroom inside the car, in spite of their reduced height," according to Boelens. "The new frame extends to the sides of the car, and this permits the floor to be lowered inside the frame rails.

"The design and styling are new from the ground up. Every dimension is changed. Wheels, frame, rear axle, drive shaft, engines, and every inch of sheet metal in every body style are definite departures from past models," he explained.

Mrs. Gertrude Read, 89 Dies Tuesday Night at Vergennes Twp. Home

Mrs. Gertrude L. Read, 89, passed away at her Vergennes township home Tuesday night about 10:30, following a week's illness. Although Mrs. Read had been in failing health, she had been able to be up and about until about three weeks ago when she suffered a fall at her home.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Roth chapel with the Rev. H. S. Ellis officiating; interment is to be in Apon cemetery.

The deceased was born December 16, 1867, in England, and came to Vergennes township at the age of 20. She lived the remainder of her life in this area. Married January 1, 1888, to Thomas W. Read, they lived 56 years in the home where she died. Mr. Read, a butcher for many years, preceded her in death June 26, 1946.

They had four children, only two of which survive: A daughter, Mrs. Emma Titus, of Pennyan, New York, and a son, Charlie Read of Lapeer.

Mrs. Read also leaves 8 grandchildren, 21 great-grandchildren and 3 great-great-grandchildren.

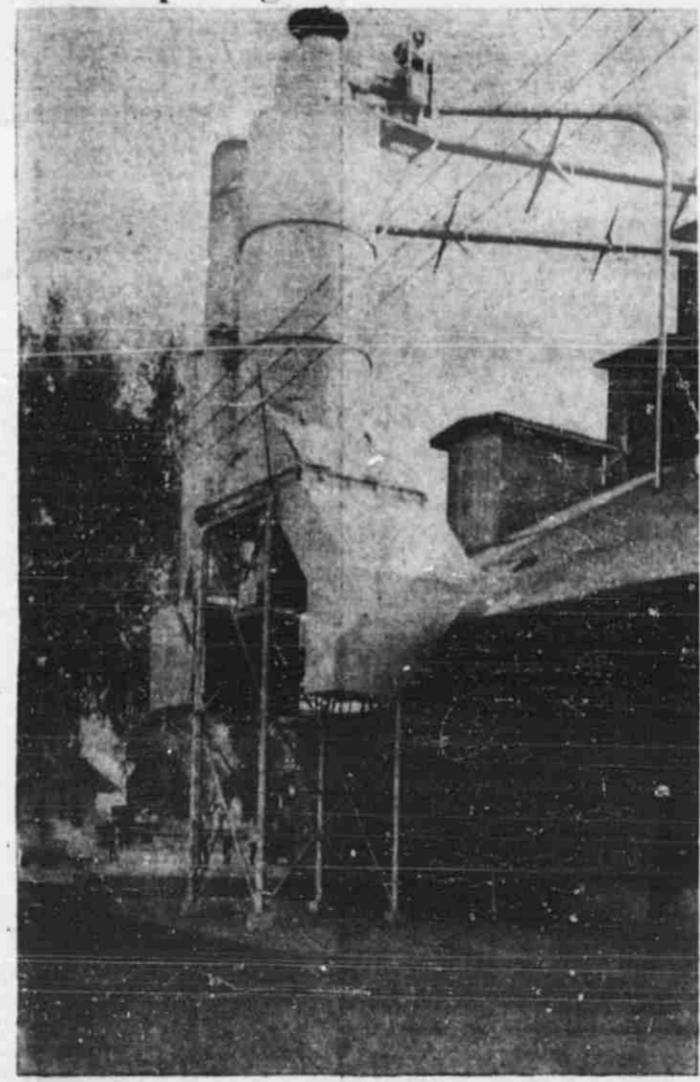
Featured in this year's parade will be the Great Lakes Chorus of Grand Rapids, past international champions, and a wonderful singing group.

Five persons were injured Friday evening about 9:45, in the heavy traffic just following the East-Lowell football game here at Recreation park.

The accident was a three-car pile up just by the Massey-Harris building on M-91, at Ottawa Ave.

The first car, driven by Jesse D. Holcomb, 50, of Grand Rapids, had stopped because of the heavy traffic; the second car, driven by John J. Orth of Grand Rapids, also stopped; but a third vehicle, driven by Stewart Thomet, 16, of Ada, failed to brake in time, and hit the Orth car, which in turn crashed into the Holcomb auto.

Raise Reward for Window Smashers Council Votes Hydro Improvements To Make Plant Semi-Automatic

At their regular meeting Monday evening, the members of the Lowell Village Council voted unanimously to follow the advice of J. Bryan Sims, consulting engineer, at the special meeting last Monday evening and authorize the Kirkhof Electric Company to go ahead with the installation of new switchgear at the Hydro Plant at Whites Bridge and other necessary improvements according to their low bid which the village approved last spring.

The work to be done will consist of a semi-automatic control, which is a water-float control, plus much-needed new switchgear equipment—to cost \$30,000.

Dinner to Benefit Miller Family

Donald's father told us Monday that the youngster's head and his hands are still in bandages. But his eye sight, which was at first feared would be impaired, is now normal.

The dinner will be served from 5:30 to 8 o'clock next Monday. The Sanitary Market, King Milling Co. and Highland Hill dairy will donate much of the food, to help make the proceeds of this dinner run to a higher amount.

Tickets, which may be obtained at either Sanitary Market or the Hill Shoe Store, will cost 75 cents for adults, and 35 cents for children under 12.

BUCK SHOT

By Buck Gotschall

The Archery club is planning a deer hunting and camping trip to the north woods in late October. One can imagine the fear that is shooting through the heart of the wily white-tail as he envisions many students in hot pursuit. (1 archer per 25 gets his deer). If the town so desires the club will hold a venison fry. Please do not invite guests, however, as we doubt if we would get enough venison to feed more than 2 thousand.

In 1937, Michigan claimed 200 bow and arrow hunters. Last year there were about 35,000. The bow and arrow seems to be about 25-thousand years old. Archery is used in hunting, field shooting, target shooting, flight shooting for distance, archery golf, and in fishing for non-game fish. The record for distance is held by a Turk at 972 yards.

There has never been a fatal shooting accident among bow hunters from Michigan or Wisconsin. Wisconsin also has a pheasant season for archers.

The average deer is shot at 30 yards by arrow. The average hunting bow is 55 pounds, although this weight is decreasing with the developing of faster bows. The longest known lethal shot was in Utah at 173 yards.

The biggest deer for an archer was shot in Allegan county. It weighed 263 pounds. The biggest bear weighed an approximate 632 pounds.

Although there is little shocking power in the arrow it has an astonishing penetrating power. Many times arrows will pass completely through a deer, sometimes lengthwise.
