# Trick or Treat?



## BE READY With Homemade Cookies!

**RAISIN ROCKS**

2 1/2 cups sifted Enriched King Flake Flour	2 tablespoons Shortening
1 teaspoon Soda	1/2 cup Sugar
1/2 teaspoon Salt	1 Egg
1 teaspoon Cinnamon	1/2 cup Buttermilk or Sour Milk
1/2 cup Molasses	1/2 cup Raisins
1/2 teaspoon Cloves	1 cup Raisins
1/2 teaspoon Nutmeg	1/2 cup Chopped Nuts



Sift together flour, soda, salt, cinnamon, cloves, and nutmeg. Cream together shortening and sugar. Add egg. Beat well. Combine butter-milk or sour milk and molasses. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Add raisins and nuts. Drop by teaspoons on greased baking sheets. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) about 10 minutes. Makes about 6 dozen 2-inch cookies.

### Won't Happen Here! Tuition Students Excluded From Grand Ledge; Rural Areas Aroused

The exclusion of rural tuition students by Grand Ledge High school has aroused the rural areas of Michigan to the need for people to organize to protect their right to control their children's education.

The next meeting of the newly-organized Michigan Rural Schools Association to fight for this right will be at Eagle town hall, Friday, November 2, at 8:00 p. m.

Grand Ledge is only one of several schools that have set a policy of not taking out-of-district tuition students. These schools want rural districts to consolidate with high school districts.

**Department Studies Rainbow Trout Problem**

Conservation Department director Gerald E. Eddy is studying Michigan's rainbow trout situation, including the possibility that there may be no special spring rainbow fishing season.

Sea lamprey depredations have cut rainbow populations in recent years. The annual two-week special spring season, preceding the regular trout fishing season, has been attractive to many anglers in the northern peninsula, but hasn't meant much in the U. P. where spring runs usually come in later, warmer weather.

The Department director is authorized to designate which waters, if any, are open to special rainbow fishing in spring and fall. Closing the season is considered one possibility for helping the beleaguered rainbow.

The situation was discussed briefly at the October meeting of the Conservation Commission.
