By injecting his own ideas and preferences, Premier Bulganin (of Russia) took sides in the campaign. He currently endorsed Adlai Stevenson's position on the issue, if he did not endorse Mr. Stevenson. But any American is entitled to the opinion that he did.

"The President's reply to Bulganin was an equally well-deserved rebuke to Mr. "The latter invited Russian interest by raising, in the heat of a political campaign, an issue which is so closely related to the defense of this Country that it has no proper place in politics.

"Bulganin took advantage of the opening which Mr. Stevenson provided him; it was as improper as if the Communist leader had offered his advice to the Democratic aspirant about any other phase of United State defense policy, including the size of the Air Force.

"It can hardly be thought that Bulganin's preferences in regard to H-bomb tests would not conform to Russia's interest. "What Bulganin said in his letter, in effect, was that he would prefer to do business with Mr. Stevenson on the bomb issue, rather than with President Eisenhower.

"The implication of this should not be lost on the American voter. Twice before, at Yalta and Potsdam, the Russians dealt with heads of Democratic Administrations on matters which shaped the course of history to the Reds' advantage. They have not done so well with the Eisenhower Administration. It is understandable that Administration. ### **Enjoy the Election Returns with Coffee and Homemade Spiced Molasses Cookies**

1/2 Cup Buttermilk or Sour

1 Cup Shortening

1 Cup Sugar

2 Eggs

1 Cup Molasses

- 31/2 Cups Sifted King Flake Self Rising Enriched Flour
- 1/2 Teaspoon Baking Powder
- 2 Teaspoons Soda 11/2 Teaspoons Salt
- 1/2 Teaspoon Ginger
- 1/2 Teaspoon Cinnamon

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, ginger and cinnamon. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy, Add molasses and eggs. Mix well. Addflour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk or sour milk. Mix until smooth, Chill dough. Roll out 1/4 inch thick on floured board or pastry cloth. Cut with floured cookie cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheets in moderate oven (375° F.) 12 to 15 minutes.

NOTE: Dough may be dropped by teaspoonfuls on ungreased baking sheets. This method yields a slightly chewy cookie. Makes about 6 dozen 3-inch cookies.
