No Hold-up On Bridge Construction

Large dump trucks began late last week to haul an estimated 30,000 yards of fill dirt from a large hill behind the Ada Christian Reformed church to the west side of Grand River where the new M-18 bridge will meet the four-lane bridge approach. At this point also the sand is being used to fill the former mouth of the old Thorapike River channel which is now completely closed. The large crane in the bottom photo is transferring a load of ready-mix concrete from a truck into the first of the three piers of the new bridge on the east side of the river. Each pier will contain 250 cubic yards of concrete. Twenty-five feet in height, the piers range from a three-foot thickness at the top, to four feet at the bottom. Thousands of pounds of reinforcing rods give strength to the bridge supports.

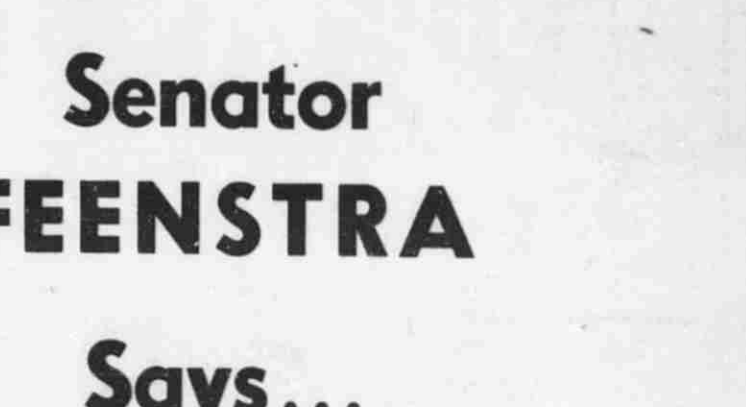

Butter No Longer A Surplus Item
The Department of Agriculture announced on October 31st that the last of the butter surplus held in government storerooms was gone. This halt in yearly mounting butter surplus resulted from a vigorous butter disposal program by the Department of Agriculture in a variety of outlets.
This drop came after a high of 20 million pounds of butter was held by the government on September 30, 1954. In two years under policies of Secretary Benson in the Department of Agriculture this surplus was completely eliminated despite the fact that butter production in the last year increased 6 per cent.
This year Uncle Sam's butter surplus had increased to 10 million pounds. The industry can enter the full field without these price-depressing supplies overhauling the market, says our United States Congressman Gerald R. Ford, Jr., in his weekly news report for this paper.

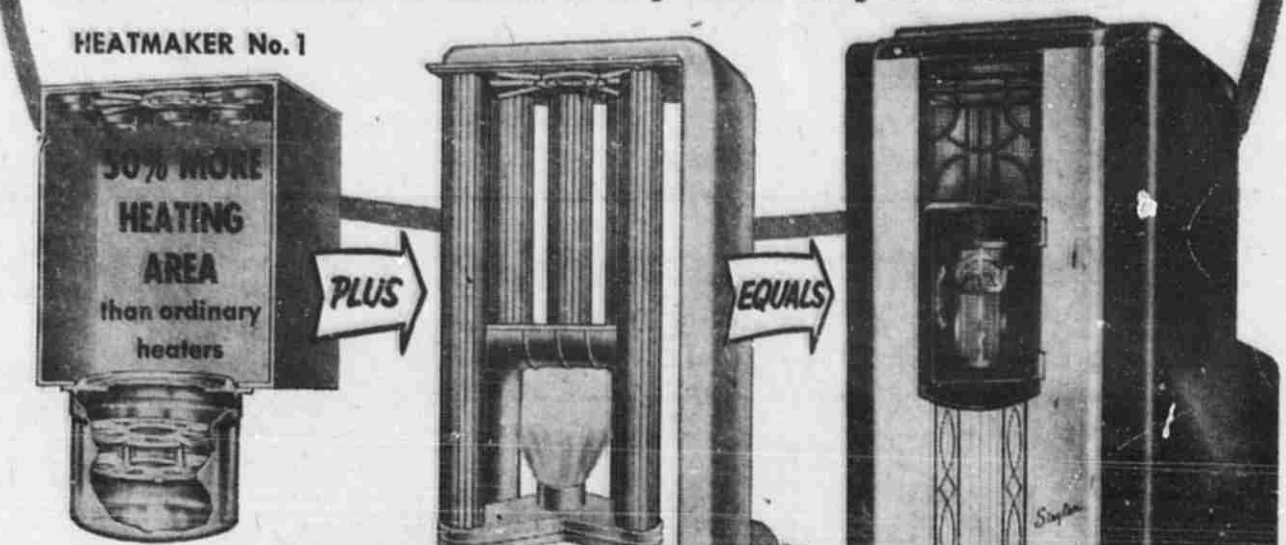

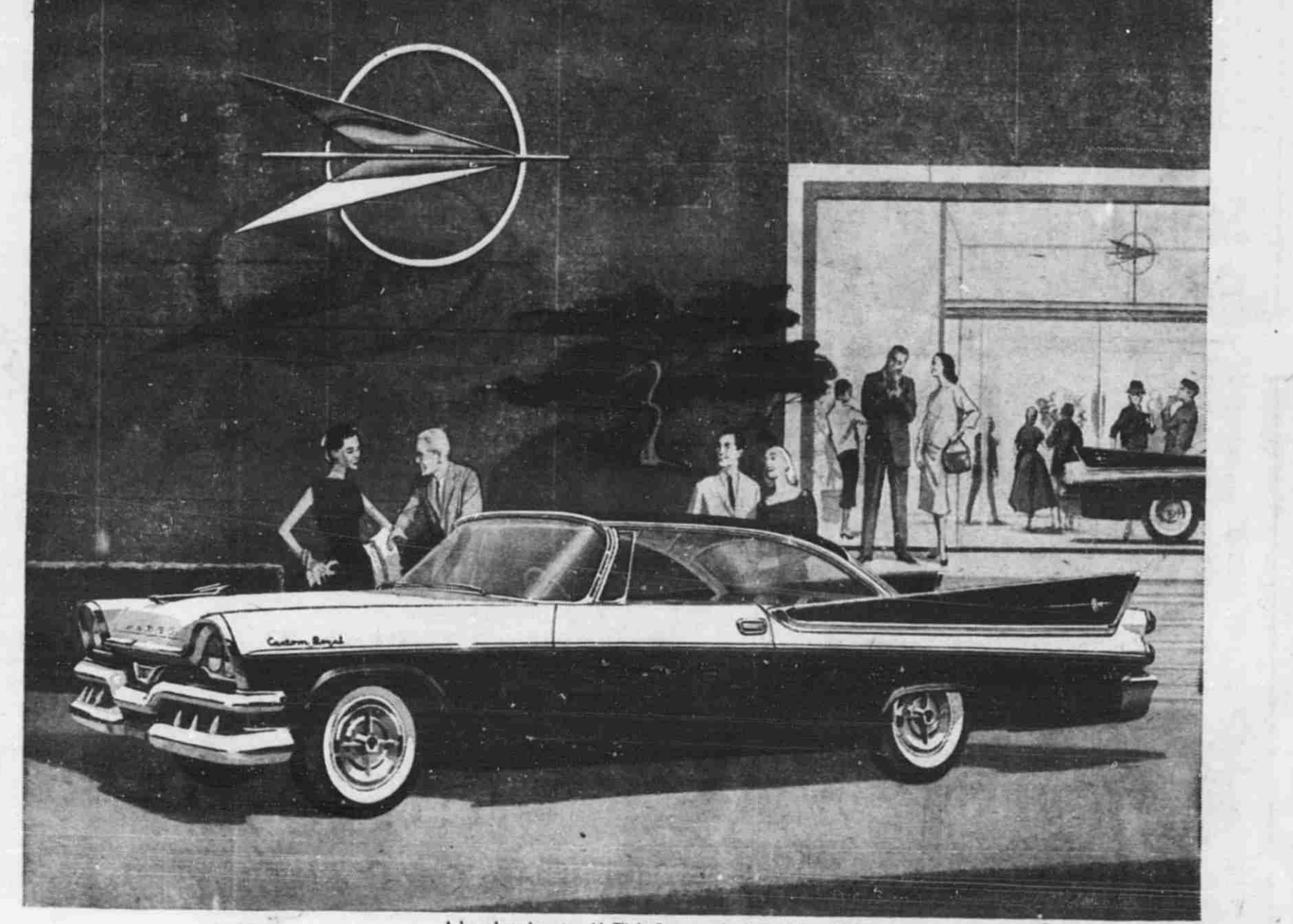

The new shaft for both iron and woods is made of a combination of phenolic resins and fiberglass cloth around a steel core. This construction is to help curb vibrations set up during a swing. A conventional shaft has a pronounced S-shaped curve at the time of impact with the ball; with this plastic shaft, vibration or "snaking" is said to be kept to a minimum. One champion golfer professional estimates the new shaft can bring the average golfer about 20 feet closer to the pin due to increased accuracy and thus reduce a weekend golfer's score by five or more strokes.

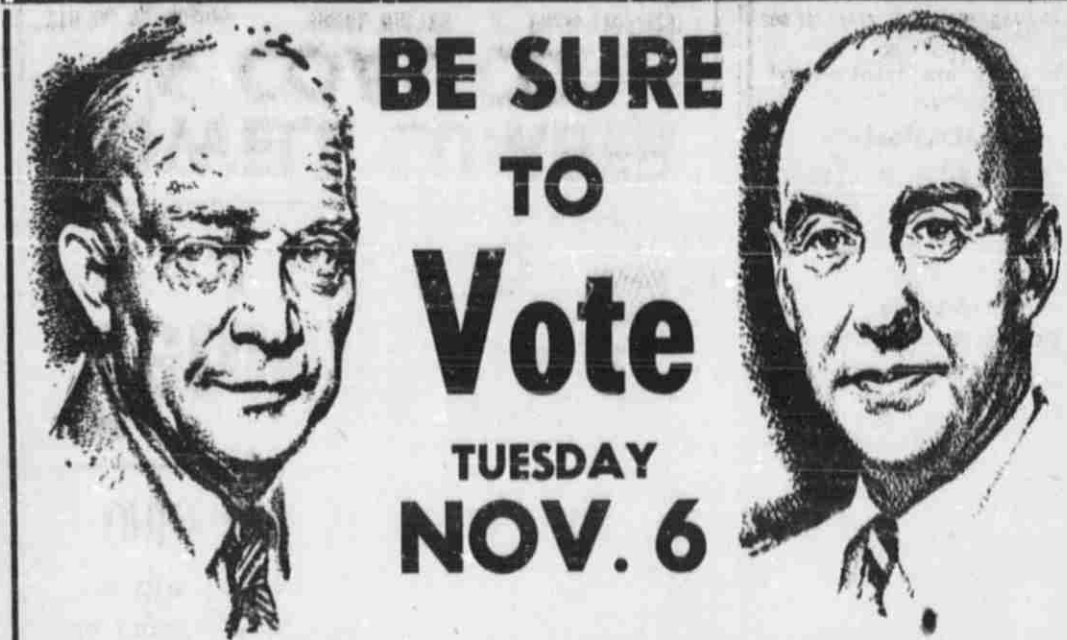

- 1/2 Teaspoon Ginger
- 1/2 Teaspoon Cinnamon
- 1 Cup Shortening
- 1 Cup Sugar
- 1 Cup Molasses
- 2 Eggs
- 1/2 Cup Buttermilk or Sour Milk

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, ginger and cinnamon. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add molasses and eggs. Mix well. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk or sour milk. Mix until smooth. Chill dough. Roll out 1/4 inch thick on floured board or pastry cloth. Cut with floured cookie cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheets in moderate oven (375° F.) 12 to 15 minutes.

NOTE: Dough may be dropped by teaspoonfuls on ungreased baking sheets. This method yields a slightly chewy cookie. Makes about 6 dozen 3-inch cookies.
