## Landslide Vote Re-elects Eisenhower As Only 7 States Go Democratic; Williams and Slate Win in Michigan

Adlai Stevenson conceded about 1 o'clock Wednesday morning that the presidential race was not his, as a landslide victory more overwhelming than the 1952 count, re-elected President Dwight D. Eisenhower for his second term.

Our area, being predominately Republican, favored Mr. Eisenhower in all neighboring townships, as expected.

In the state race, however, it was a different story, with Governor G. Mennen Williams receiving the voter approval by a wide margin for his fifth straight term. He also carried his entire slate with him.

Governor Williams received the election to his unprecedented fifth 2-year term without the help of local townships except Grattan, which favored him 304 to 239.

## Saturday Morning Set For Hearing Of Cascade Youths

Three Lowell High students, all from the Cascade area, will appear before Justice of the Peace Howard J. Rittenger at 10 o'clock Saturday to answer charges of misdemeanor stemming from a Halloween "prank" sometime Wednesday evening.

The boys are charged with letting out the air from the tires of a Lowell school bus, parked at the property of its driver, Vern Morse, instructor at Lowell. Mr. Morse parks the bus in a field about 300 yards from his newly-finished home just West of Cascade on U.S. 16.

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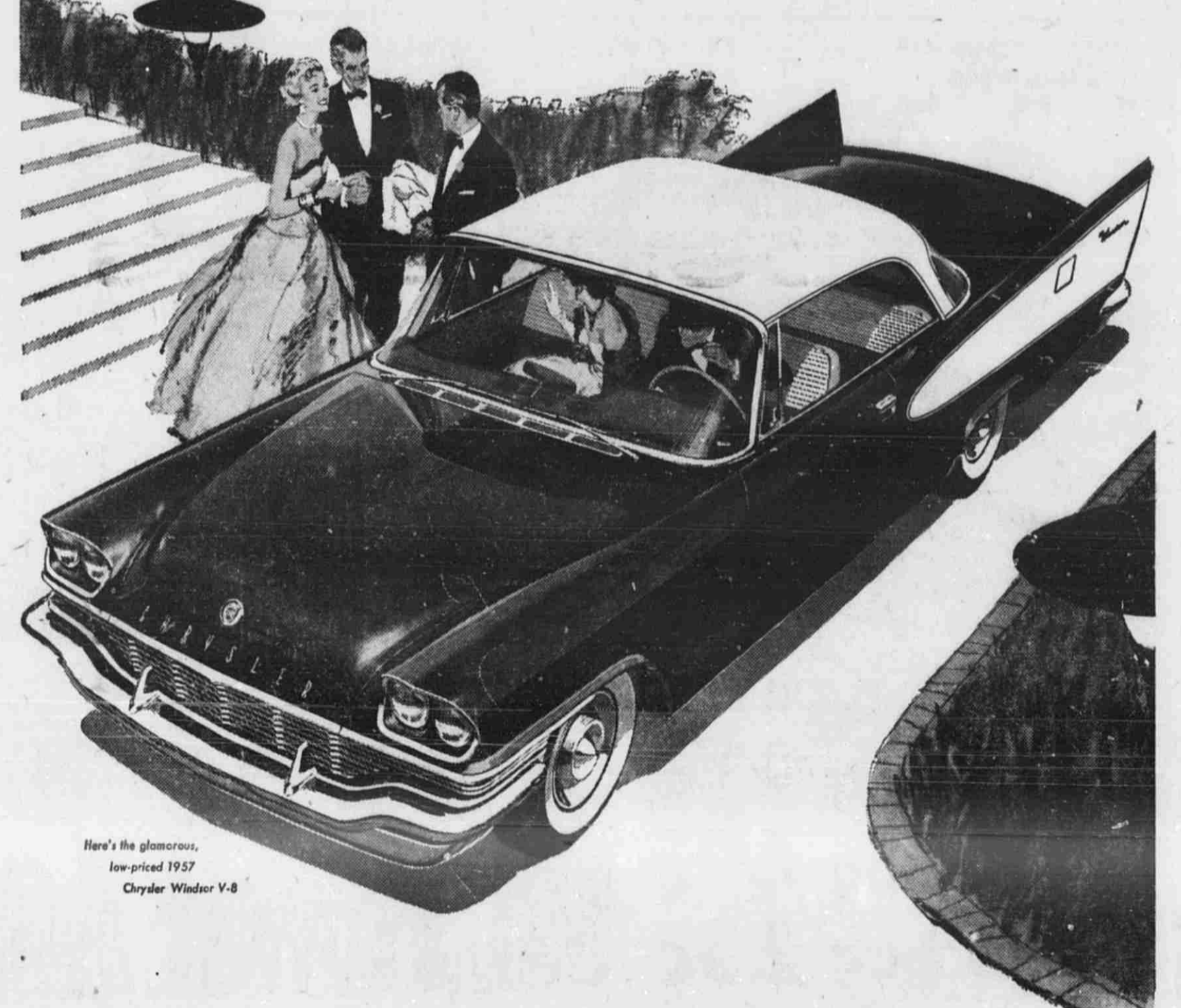
