Although Glendon was born in Pinckney, he moved to Lowell when quite small, and attended school here; in 1939 he received his bachelor of arts degree from the University of Michigan, and later his master's.

Just recently he received the doctor of philosophy degree at M. S. U. He has done advertising work at Detroit, has toured South America writing for 26 Michigan newspapers, he has been at Michigan State since 1951.

In 1943 Swarthout published a novel "Willow Run" a story of the bomber plant, and has authored several short stories, one which appeared during the past year in *Colliers*.

Since no ordinance prohibits this construction, the village will have to take no action to allow a major oil company to construct a new station.

## Dr. Quick Gives Botany Collection To University

Dr. B. E. Quick, a retired professor of biology and botany—and a Lowell native—has presented his outstanding collection of botanical and biology specimens to the University of Michigan Museum.

Last Monday Mr. VanHought, head curator of the Flowering Plant Exhibitions at the Museum, and his assistant, called at Dr. Quick's home and spent hours examining and packing the specimens, which they stated were in excellent condition.

Mr. Quick, who is 70 years of age, stated he desired to give his collections to the university inasmuch as he feared that they could not be cared for in his home in the proper manner, and—if any value—should be where they could be seen by persons interested in botany and biology.

Among his donations were collections of plants and insects which he made when a high school student here in Lowell, under the instruction of Mrs. Herbert Chamberlain, now of Rural route Saranac.

Nothing from Kent  
The curator was especially pleased to obtain Dr. Quick's specimens inasmuch as their museum has "almost nothing from Kent county."

Mr. Quick, who obtained his doctor of philosophy in botany and biology from the University of Michigan in 1916, was a graduate of the University in 1908. He then became a professor of botany at Iowa Wesleyan College, later going to Southwestern College in Kansas, DePaul University in Green-castle, Indiana and Westminster College in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Quick retired at the age of 58, because of ill health, and returned to Lowell, purchasing the home on the property where his grandfather, E. R. Cray, had formerly lived. Dr. Quick is busily packing these days, preparing to leave for California, where he will visit his cousins in Los Angeles, during the winter months.

Many Trips Taken  
Some of the specimens collected by Mr. Quick were from his two trips to Puerto Rico, and also his visits to several of the western states. Mr. Quick stated to the Ledger that he has collected specimens from every state in the union except Oregon.

It is also interesting to note that the gentlemen from the University Museum also were given some collections at Aquinas College, Grand Rapids while in this area, these being the Emma J. Cole collections. Strangely enough Miss Cole was Dr. Quick's mother's botany instructor in a Grand Rapids high school many years ago.

## More Books . . . Better Service Lowell Village and Township to Join Library Service with Kent County

At the council meeting on Monday night, G. R. Thompson, chairman of village library committee was given authority to complete negotiations with the township of Lowell to split the cost of joining the Kent County Library organization. This plan has been under study for several months and has now reached the final stages.

The library for many years has been operated jointly by the village and the school, with librarian costs shared. The village has furnished the building; light and heat

has been paid from fees received by the library; Lowell Township has operated a library in the township building.

In joining the Kent County Library organization Lowell will have access to many more books in the county. Special services are available such as a Saturday morning children's hour to interest the young patrons in taking advantage of library facilities. A selection of movie films are available for use in the home or for group programs.

The village and township will be obliged to provide a building, light, heat and telephone, this yearly cost is estimated at \$1,500 shared on a 60-40 basis with the township. The county would provide the librarian and the books.

Miss Ruthertford, the present librarian, would be employed by the county instead of the village. Hours of the library would be adjusted as the need arises, the village and township would be obligated to continue this arrangement for a year, if at the end of this trial period they wish to go back to the old library it would be agreeable with the county.

The school is providing their own library facilities for students and has employed a full-time librarian.

1. Fishing shall be lawful during the statutory trout season.
2. Fishing shall be limited to the period from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset.
3. Artificial flies only may be used.
