**Want a Hobby? Try Sculpture**

Sculpture makes a grand hobby for people of all ages, declares Carleton W. Angell, who recently retired after 30 years as artist at the University of Michigan Museums.

"Most people who once start it leave it with reluctance. Seldom is there a person who finds it tedious," he maintains.

Professor Angell says, "One may learn to do seemingly ambitious things without too much difficulty. However, the best way for a beginner to start modeling is to start on something small and preferably something which may be put to some use."

He states, "Usually the beginner starts with some small object in the round; that is, a piece of sculpture which may be seen from all sides. Often I find it most convenient to start a beginner in so-called bas relief. (Bas-relief is sculpture in relief, as the sculpture on a coin.) Many students know how to draw, and bas relief is much like drawing, except that it is bolder and stronger in line. So this makes a good way to begin."

He continues, "From simple bas reliefs, beautiful tiles in burnt clay and colored cast cement find many useful places. For instance, in the garden walk, benches and terraces, set in the midst of brick or stone, they lend charm and added interest."

Professor Angell explains that from mere etching or drawing on a flat clay slab, the student can proceed to low relief and high relief, and "then it is only a short step to sculpture in the round."

According to Professor Angell, the pouring of plaster of Paris to make molds of bas relief, then taking copies of the bas relief from the molds, is fascinating business. "I have found many bas reliefs to make delightfully decorative pieces for the home when carved in pink or white alabaster. For example, a lamp base with its four sides carved in low relief or a lamp shield carved so thin as to be translucent are very pleasing to the eyes."

**a Dogs Life**

**CANINE POINTERS**

Probably everyone has seen a dog "frozen" into immobility, tail held rigidly with perhaps a front paw raised stiffly at an odd angle.

The hunter, in reading the dog's points, soon learns that the dog doesn't take time to position himself comfortably. He spots his game and simply freezes.

A good pointer stays steady when a gun is fired, staunch and intelligent. He is not easily flustered. He is also restrained, calm, and trained to wait for the hunter's commands. And he has a keen and well-developed instinct for hunting.

To teach a dog a basic step in pointing, a game bird can be tied to a small stake in high weeds or cover. With about 50 feet of rope attached to the dog's choke collar, let him work toward the bird, the dog being downwind. As the dog gets his first scent of the bird, a helper walks in and pulls up the bird's stake and it flushes and flies for a short distance. With the stake and about six feet of rope, the bird won't go far.

Check the dog vigorously on the check cord each time the bird flushes, and using the command "Whoa!" voice steady him at the same time. Eventually the dog will stand rigid on the spot until the command "fetch" is given.

Feeding Tip: Remember that a field dog requires good healthy food and lots of it. He should receive well-rounded, nourishing meals, such as provided in quality prepared dog foods, like Friskies.

Just before taking broiled chicken out of the oven, season and sprinkle with finely minced tarragon and serve with pan gravy. Tarragon is an anise-flavored leaf used in sauces, salads and chicken, egg and tomato dishes.
