## Winter Weather Means New Rules For Safety Patrol

Lowell's Safety Patrol has set new regulations to meet the extra hazards caused by winter weather, according to Jack Howe, their teacher-director.

These policies have been adopted by Lowell Patrolers and are being strictly followed by many other schools throughout Michigan. They will apply here all year around, no matter the weather.

Mr. Howe states that the patrols are placed in the immediate vicinity of schools, usually not over 2 or 3 blocks away. The reason for this is to maintain a proximity relationship with the school. If patrols are spread out too far from school, it decreases efficiency of the patrol. Further, the school is responsible for the child in and around school and to attempt to escort or protect the child to his door is impractical and unrealistic.

The real aim of safety patrols and safety education is to assist the child in becoming an independent safe walker. To provide protection at each corner for every child is not only a physical impossibility but it takes away from the child the chances he has to put into practice good safety habits taught to him by his parents and teachers.

Contractors were immediately called, and work began Thursday to support the 95-year-old structure. The hand-hewn beams and trusses had held the roof, ceiling and walls together for almost a hundred years!

Rev. Woon stated that "they held for 95 years and earned their rest." At any rate they are now replaced by steel which supports should be here today, (Thursday). By the early part of next week the work should be completed.

In the meantime, the building is being supported by posts in the sanctuary and although the church is being inconvenienced, services are being held as usual. There is no danger as supports are sufficient to take care of the situation until the final work is completed. The sagging wall is already back where it should be.

Rev. Woon explained that the church was constructed of wood frame construction, as was usual 95 years ago. Lowell Congregational church celebrated its centennial just a year ago this spring.

## Police Report Submitted for '56

The Lowell Police Department, in their annual report to the village council submitted Monday night, listed 947 calls and complaints answered and investigated.

Police Chief Frank Stephens reports a very busy year, but a more orderly one as far as his office is concerned, now that they have moved into their new quarters in the front of the City Hall, and have vacated the "kitchen."

Although 947 sounds like a lot of call, when compared to 1225 in 1955 it is not so remarkable. However, Frank stated he did not include petty and minor calls in this report, but just those which involved matters on which he could take some definite action.

Mr. Stephens reports the cruisers traveled 36,525 miles in their rounds, which is some 5 thousand more than last year, but when you see that they nabbed 297 for running violations—better known as "speeding" you can see the miles are justified. These cases make up a goodly portion of the matters taken before Justice Howard Rittenger's court, for which fines totalling \$4,283.50 were collected in 1956.

Up until October of last year, the driver's license fees taken in by Lowell amounted to \$379.50. \$12.00 was collected by the police department for dog impounding fees, and \$17.18 resulted from the sale of confiscated property. Parking violations brought in \$154.

## Auxiliary Force

The big news of the police department this year is the installation of the Auxiliary Police force, consisting of 16 men who have put in a total of 1,900 hours on the electric timer, tornado alerts, and in traffic control, besides helping out at the 4-H Fair, and at football games.

## Warn Children of Danger In Skating on River, Sliding on Roadways

The Village Council received a letter Monday night from W. W. Gumsier, requesting that some action be taken to protect the safety of youngsters by keeping them from skating on Flat River above Main st., and from sliding down hills in roadways.

The ice on Flat River is very dangerous, and it is pretty hard to stop a car in time to avoid hitting a child on a sled in a road.

Kids will be kids, and they do enjoy the winter snow. And there is just something about their make-up that resents being told continuously "not" to do certain things.

But, on the other hand, no one enjoys reading accounts of drownings, or of serious injuries, and the letter from Mr. Gumsier requested some action be taken to avoid any such tragic accidents.

The councilmen voted to instruct the police department to warn all children to keep off the river, and to stop them from sliding on streets in the village limits. Inasmuch as there are no streets in Lowell set aside for sliding in the winter time, children will have to find some other place to have their fun.

Parents are also urged to warn their children against taking a chance with their lives on the thin ice or on public streets.

## Last Week's Mystery Picture Identified as Centennial Farm



Can you identify this farm? The aerial view gives a different perspective to a group of buildings and a farm home, which you might drive by every day. If you do know whose place this is, and are the first to call the Ledger office, TW 7-9261, after 1 o'clock Thursday (today) you will receive a gift subscription to the Ledger. The owner of the farm is presented a framed photo of his farm, the one from which this picture was printed. Last week's mystery farm was quickly identified Thursday afternoon by Ben Lyons, Route 1. The Shirley Inmaa's live on the farm, located on Two Mile road, but the 100 acres are owned by John Platte of Grand Rapids. Mr. Platte states that the farm is part of a two-section area taken by his maternal grandfather, Hiram Ferrell, from government platting in 1842. Mr. Ferrell was working on the railroad being laid from Dearborn to Ann Arbor at the time this area was opened, so he had a Mr. Shepard homestead the place and hold it for him until 1844 when he came to this area to live. Mr. Platte recalls hearing that his grandfather received his grant from the land office in Marshall. There he was given a guide and a pony, to set out and find his land. The farm residence has 18 rooms and three stables up of three sections, two 20 x 30 wings and one built all at one time, and started in 1861. It is maways going up to the second floor. The house was 20 x 40. Fruits are the main crop of the farm.
