

A driver whose mind is fuzz with alcohol will take far more time to see danger and stop his car-if, indeed he stops it at all

before hitting a train, an enbankment, or another car. Danger signals-such as a pedestrian suddenly stepping into the street, or an automoblie cutting recklessly out of its proper traffic lane-don't register automatically in a befuddled brain. There must be a dual process of regonition and transmission. This may only take few seconds, but these few are generally the difference bet






