Low Bid \$445,682.02 For Ada Bridge Approach

Herial-Devo Company of Grand Rapids was low bidder on the 1.091 miles of relocation on M-21 at Ada, for the approach to the new bridge over the Grand River.

The bids were opened in Lansing on January 9, and the Grand Rapids company's bid was for \$445,682.02.

The work to be done consists of grading and drainage structures, and a dual 22-foot-wide concrete pavement from Ada drive southeast to the existing M-21. The completion date for the road project is August 15.

Work on the bridge is far ahead of its scheduled completion date of November 3. The last of the six 90 by 24 foot piers for the bridge is almost completed.

The low-bidding firm is the same one which did the highway widening work on Main st. and Hudson in the summer of 1955.

Start Saving Your Pennies! Lowell and Alto Banks Declare Dividends, Raise Interest Rates

Annual meetings of the stockholders of the State Savings Bank and the Farmers State Bank of Alto were held this week, followed by Board meetings in both banks—both resulting in the raising of interest rates on savings, certificates of deposits, and the declaring of dividends.

According to Harry Day, Executive Vice President, the State Savings Bank of Lowell has increased its capital stock from \$150,000 to \$200,000 by the transfer of \$50,000 from the surplus fund to their capital stock account.

The bank will also pay 2 per cent interest on all savings accounts which have been on deposit for six months following March 1, 1957. Certificates of Deposit purchased from this date on will earn 3 per cent interest if held for one year.

At their annual director's meeting Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock the Farmers State Bank in Alto voted to pay 2 per cent interest on savings accounts for funds with the bank as of December 1, 1956. Their time certificates will earn 3 per cent effective January 1, 1957, according to Leona Wieland, one of the directors.

The Alto bank shareholders voted Tuesday morning to declare a stock dividend, and increased the capital stock of the bank from \$35,000 to \$52,500.

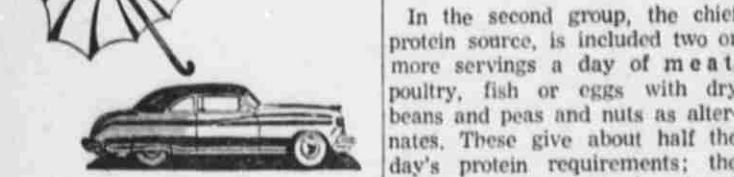

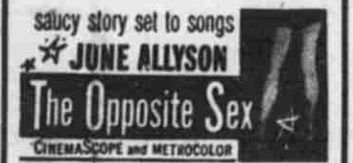

Giving Children Shots? Don't Forget Pooch — He's Important Too!

When scheduling vaccinations and immunizations for members of your family don't forget the family canine pet, the Michigan Department of Health advised today.

This is the best time of year to have your dog vaccinated against rabies, the health department said, because rabies spreads most rapidly in dogs in the "dog days" of February, March and April.

Some counties in Michigan require anti-rabies vaccination before dogs can be licensed. Compulsory vaccination plus elimination of strays have resulted in a sharp drop in rabies in recent years, but the disease will make a comeback as soon as dog vaccinations start to lag, the health department said.

Last year 23 confirmed cases of rabies in animals were reported to the state health department. The last case of rabies in a human in Michigan occurred in 1948. Having your dog vaccinated may save your own life as well as his, the health department said. Rabies is always fatal in humans as well as in animals.

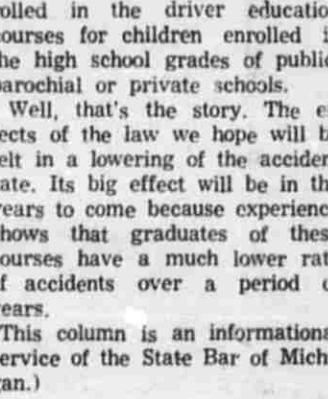

Deadline Jan. 31 To Obtain Aid For Bean Crops

January 31, 1957 is the last day that growers can place Michigan Pea Beans or Michigan Kidney Beans under the Government support program. A grower can elect to take a loan or place the Beans under purchase agreement.

By taking a loan, the grower receives his cash immediately. The current loan basis is about 23 cents per cwt. more than the cash market for Pea Beans and 20c more on Red Kidney Beans. Should the bean market advance between now and February 28th, the grower can redeem the beans and resell them on the open market if it should prove to his advantage to do so.

The current loan on Pea Beans will net the grower \$6.33 cwt. and on Dark Red Kidneys \$7.00, basis CHP grade.

Currently, there appears to be about 1,100,000 bags of Beans under support. This quantity will have to be increased by 500,000 bags to insure a firm market for the balance of the crop year.

Will Study Survey Re Financing of Public Parks

The state Conservation Commission, meeting January 10-11 in Lansing, plans to study a recently-published survey which indicates the public is willing to finance state parks through direct user fees.

The survey, conducted during the past summer by Michigan State University's bureau of business research, showed 85 per cent of the park visitors questioned selected some type of use fee as the answer to park finance problems.

At present, state parks are financed by legislative appropriation of general state funds.

In the addition to the 85 per cent in favor of a user fee, another seven per cent suggested fees only for certain services. Only eight per cent opposed any fee for park use.

Of the 85 per cent, 36 per cent favored a daily admission charge, 27 per cent favored a car sticker good for one year at all parks, and 22 per cent favored either the daily or annual fee without preference.

A \$2 annual charge was most often selected by those favoring the car sticker proposal.

Other facts revealed by the survey included:
Michigan's state parks serve mainly Michigan residents—about 84 per cent of the total park visitors.

The average park user makes four visits per year and visits an average of 2.2 parks.

Parks attendance is growing while parks are not adequate for present use. More than half of the users found three parks inadequate; another 30-50 per cent reported eight other parks inadequate. Objections seldom were to quality or upkeep of facilities, but referred to shortage of facilities in relation to attendance.

Dr. David J. Luck, who headed the MSU survey, said the findings were based on personal interviews and voluntary questionnaires at various parks throughout the state.
