C. M. Himebaugh passed away Tuesday night at 6 o'clock at Blodgett hospital in Grand Rapids where he had been taken following a slight heart attack on Friday. Mr. Himebaugh would have been 84 this coming Sunday.

A retired farmer, Mr. Himebaugh was the last surviving member of a family of eight born to Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Himebaugh. His birthplace was St. Joseph County.

He has been a member of the Methodist church since 1897. His marriage to Blanche Goldsmith of Vicksburg would have reached its sixtieth anniversary on May 18 this year.

The Himebaughs moved to the Lowell area in 1914, and had a farm on Bennett road. He retired several years ago, and Mr. and Mrs. Himebaugh moved to their Lowell residence on Chatham st.

"The need for funds this year is especially urgent in Lowell and Kent county because in addition to the costly care of polio victims from previous years and 1956, payment must be made for the huge shipments of Salk vaccine ordered by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis." Souter said.

Ten million dollars will be allocated from March of Dimes funds to supply vaccine for families who cannot afford to pay for it in 1957.

**To Distribute Cards**

One of the highlights of this year's Mothers' March will be the distribution of cards to help parents keep track of when their family's polio shots are due.

The card, which will be passed out at each home in the county, has space for both parents and their children and for a record when the first Salk shot was given each parent and child and date the second and third shots are due and when they are given.

Masons Conclude Centennial With Banquet, Program, Saturday Night

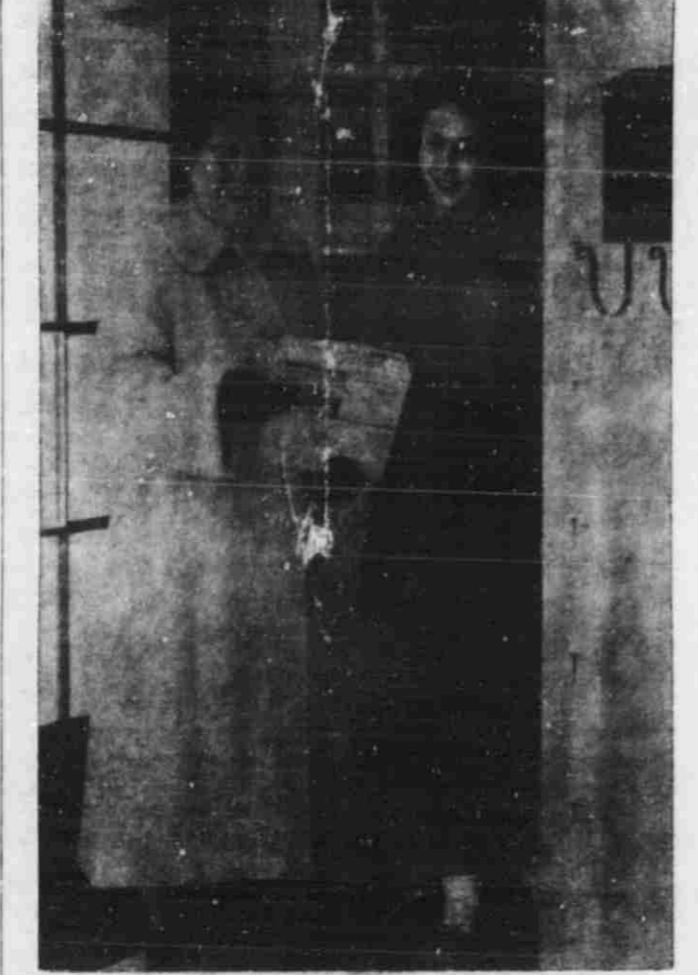

Milk with every lunch, of course, and it is also on sale at a nominal charge for youngster bringing a sack lunch from home.

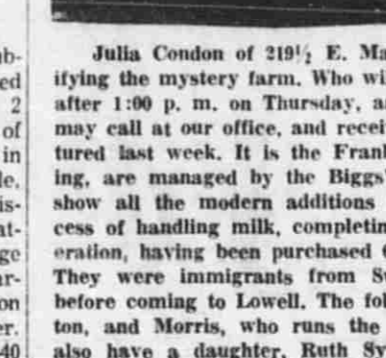
**LOWELL BREEDERS SELL BROWN SWISS BULLS**
