

David M. Skidmore, father of George, purchased the farm from Bradford Canfield and wife in 1856. David Skidmore was born May 1, 1828, in Livingston County, New York, and moved to Kent county with his parents in 1846.

At the time he purchased the farm, David's property included 170 acres but purchases of vari-

In 1887 a right-of-way for the railroad was granted by Skidmore.

Another son, George, the present owner of the centennial farm, was a locomotive engineer for the Pere Marquette railroad for 25 years. Plat Alto Village

It wasn't until 1890 that the village of Alto was platted, frem property which had been sold off the Skidmore tract.

David Skidmore operated a general store in Alto village for several years, as well as maintaining his farm. He was also the village

He was a veteran of the Civil 1863 with the First Michigan Engineers and Mechanics, and went out as a second lieutenant. He was promoted to first lieutenant later. and served with General Sherman in his memorable march to the sea, through Georgia.

Pictured is the second home on the Skidmore farm, The first home, constructed when the farm was first settled in 1856, burned to the ground (no one recalls the exact year), but the brick structure shown above was placed on the original home's foundation. It too burned, in 1891, and the fire was started by a threshing rig, owned by David Skidmore, and which was in operation near the house. David Skidmore died a day after the fire; he had rushed in the flaming building to rescue his wife, whom he thought was inside; he inhaled smoke, and the injury was fatal.
