Army Announces New Enrollment Program

It is now possible for young men between the ages of 18 1/2 and 25 to enlist in the United States Army Reserve for a period of six years, serving six months in the active Army, and the remainder of the Army Reserve Training center located at Grand Rapids.

Major Young states the program is designed to strengthen the reserve components by assuring all men in the Army's military program will have a minimum of six months of basic and branch training, and be able to care for himself in combat.

The 5 1/2 years at home, with the local reserve unit, will allow the individual to continue his education, or make future business plans without being hampered by a future absence for military duty.

You Can't Stop a Gifted Child

"It's about as possible to stop a cannonball as to stop a gifted child when he's going somersault." He continues, "Other systems have been used for handling the problem of what to do with bright children. One system that everyone seems set on is keeping the bright children segregated in special classes with special teachers. This system just doesn't do any good."

According to the educator, "They learn things so quickly that they are frequently accused of not having a long attention span. They fit about many things at once. They finish the things they do and that they will never learn anything but because they don't practice it. In most instances, upon close examination, you'll find they have learned it a long time ago. No one knows how."

Commenting on how superior children should be educated in schools, Professor Ketchum says, "People must realize that every child is different from everyone else. The task of schools and parents is to bring out the best in every child, whether he is extra bright, retarded, or just normal." "The system used at the University School," Professor Ketchum says, "is to keep all the children in the same classes and to have enough different methods to find something there for every child."

"Bright children are sometimes overlooked because people don't realize they're bright. The reason is that bright children, in general, should be educated in special classes with special teachers. This system just doesn't do any good."

According to the educator, "In one experiment, a large group of superior children were divided into two contrasting groups. One group was put in special classes. The other group was not. At the end of several years the two groups were tested. Neither group knew more than the other well because they don't practice it. In most instances, upon close examination, you'll find they have learned it a long time ago. No one knows how."

Commenting on how superior children should be educated in schools, Professor Ketchum says, "People must realize that every child is different from everyone else. The task of schools and parents is to bring out the best in every child, whether he is extra bright, retarded, or just normal." 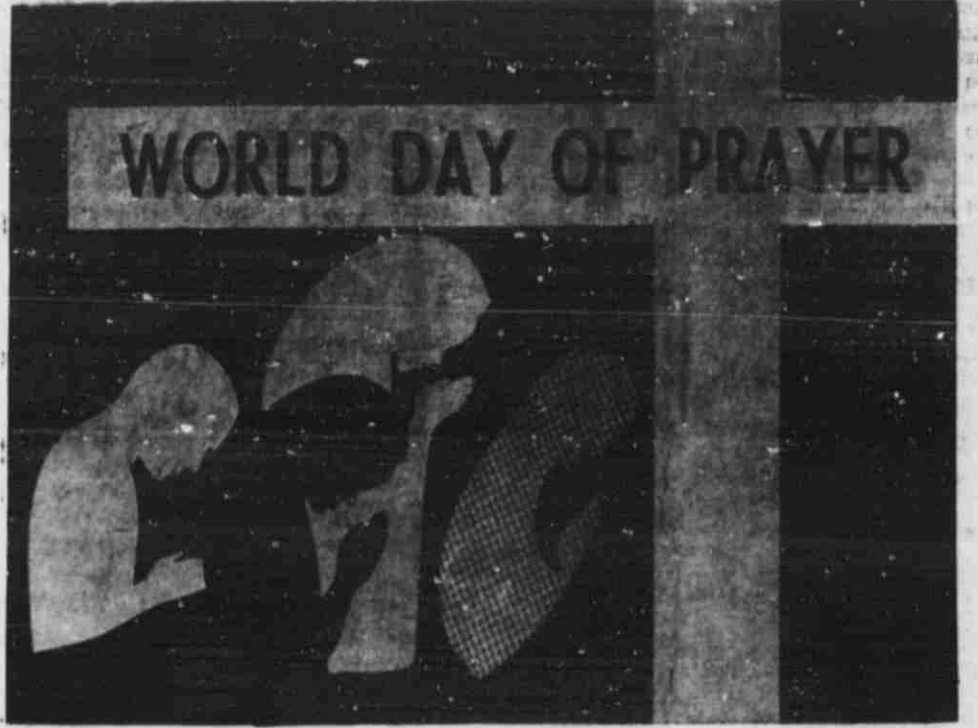
