



Will Open Village Dump Council Hears Many Miscellaneous Matters at Regular Meeting Monday

At the council meeting on Monday night George Boyenga requested information regarding the use of lots he owns on Munroe street opposite the cemetery.

The village attorney was asked to rule on whether the cemetery road was a private or public highway.

Clem Grindle was given permission to go ahead of the garbage truck and salvage materials placed at the curb.

To Open Dump

Mr. Grindle also agreed to police the village dump south of the 4th grounds and open this dump to village residents on Monday.



Lowell has a "U-Turn" ordinance which prohibits any such turn being made on Main st., from Hudson to Washington sts., inclusive. According to Police Chief Frank L. Stephens the law enforcement officers have been having a great deal of difficulty in keeping up with offenders of this ordinance. Such turns are a traffic bottleneck and a hazard.

Also, Chief Stephens wished to remind automobile drivers that no parking is allowed in the traffic lanes on Main st., at the traffic light, corner of Hudson and Main. From Hudson West to Vergennes st., on the south side of the highway, and East 200 feet from the intersection on the north side no parking is allowed.

The officers have been ticketing quite a few drivers for these two offenses, and remind residents of the fact that they will be continuing to ticket motorists who do not adhere to these regulations.

P. O. Gets Dough — Closed Saturday No Mo?

George Hale, Lowell Postmaster, has received no official notice about opening the Post Office this Saturday, and getting back to the usual hours—but from the city morning papers we read that such a notice is forthcoming, and that mail service here will go back to like it was a week ago.

Although we notified our readers last week that the box holders would not be able to receive their mail Saturday, April 13, a special delivery order Saturday morning changed this situation, and box mail was released.

Three store buildings, covering about 65 feet of store front width, will be made into one unit, with a double and single door providing two separate entrances to the store.

Jay Boelens, chairman of the sewer and water committee said that steps are being taken to set up a sewer and water main project for this summer. It will probably be necessary to bond for enough money to make up a worth while project, he told the council.

William Jones, finance chairman, told the council that the Grand Rapids Horse Show would like to use the park on June 13, 14, and 15 for their annual show. This year it will be necessary for them to use the baseball diamond instead of the football field. They agreed to repair all damage.

Another program has been scheduled for July 30th when the Holstein Show will be held here.

Stopped Chimney Falls Flat With Smoke

When Dick Rutherford arrived at the Rutherford canning company about 9 o'clock Saturday morning to "open up", he found the plant filled with acrid oil smoke and quickly called the Lowell Fire Department.

The smoke was so thick in the building that firemen were, at first unable to find the trouble. However, it was discovered that the furnace had evidently exploded, filling the place with smoke and soot.

Mr. Rutherford states the chimney apparently became stopped up sometime Friday night or Saturday morning, so that the furnace smoke was forced back into the fire pot, and eventually "popped open" the furnace door, letting the exhaust flow throughout the plant.

Damage was confined to smoke and soot—as of Monday morning they were still working on cleaning up the place.



