One of my customers heard that there were two spices that came from the same tree. Would 1 check? I did . . . and got a story. Spices grow in the tropics. Mace and Nut-meg arc the two spices obtained from the fruit of a tall evergreen tree. Most U.S. imports ome from Indonesia and the West Indies.

Nutmeg is the seed of this peach-like fruit, "CHRIS" "CHRIS" while mace forms a lacy pattern around its shell. Both products are separated and dried. Whole or groundnutmeg is used to flavor baked goods, puddings, sauces, vegetables, and beverages. It is also used in spice blends and in processed meats. Mace has a softer flavor than Nutmeg. It is used in pound cakes and seasonings for fish, sauces, and meat stuffings.
