## Rev. McIver Will Bring Baccalaureate Message Ninety Senior Students of L. H. S. Will Close Their Happy High School Days Next Week — Congratulations!

The final week for ninety Lowell high school graduates will be inaugurated Sunday evening at 8:00 o'clock when Rev. M. Keith McIver, pastor of the First Baptist church, will speak to the text, "Remember Now Thy Creator" at the Baccalaureate services.

Other features of the services, which will be held in the Runciman building, will be a solo by Carol Denkema, and anthem by the high school choir, and the Processional by the band. Rev. J. Marion DeVinney, pastor of the Methodist church, will give the Invocation and Benediction.

The public is invited to the services and there will be no reserved seats.

### Commencement Thursday

As mentioned above, Dr. John Edward Tirrell, president of Grand Rapids Junior College, will deliver the address to the graduates at 8:00 o'clock on Thursday night in the Runciman auditorium.

Inasmuch as the seating space is limited, reserved seat tickets will be issued to members of the class, which will assure the holders of a seat until 7:45. About two hundred other seats will be available to the general public.

### Other Features

The Valetotory will be delivered by Barbara Court and the Salutatory will be given by Brenda Rankin. Lawrence Chesebro, Commander of the Clark-Ellis post of the American Legion, will award the Legion and Auxiliary honors to the outstanding graduates and eighth graders.

C. H. Runciman, president of the Board of Education, will award the diplomas and the high school band will play the Processional and one other number. Mr. Stephen Nisbet, principal of the high school, will announce the names of the honor students and those who have already received notices of scholarships. The traditional Spade is to be presented by Leonard Fase, president of the Senior Class, to Junior Class president, Daniel Himebaugh.

Mr. Tirrell is widely known in educational circles and he has had a background of training. He secured his A. B. degree from Hope college, his M. In 1956 Dr. Tirrell was designated as "One of the Five Outstanding Men in Michigan". It is safe to say that the graduates will hear an inspiring and helpful address.

Both Rockford and Lowell pitchers struck out ten men.

## Mrs. Kelly, 75, Former Resident, Burned Fatally

Mrs. Edward V. Kelly, a former Lowell resident, died Wednesday night (May 22) at St. Mary's hospital in Grand Rapids from burns suffered Tuesday at her farm home, 811 Crahan, N. E. Mrs. Kelly, who was 75, was the former Evelyn Murphy, and lived in Lowell many years ago. She attended school here, and also taught in the rural schools for a number of years.

In an accident at her home Tuesday, Mrs. Kelly's clothes apparently became ignited as she was standing before a fireplace. She received first, second and third degree burns all over most of her body.

Funeral services were held at St. Thomas church in Grand Rapids; interment in St. Andrew's cemetery.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Beatrice C. Kelly of Detroit; three sons, Robert E. Kelly of Grosse Point, Thomas of Grand Rapids; David P. of Midland; eight grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Edith McCarthy of Detroit, and Sister Mary Paula, OP, of Marywood in Grand Rapids.

## Will Consider Sewer Extensions On Three Streets

At a special meeting of the Village Council Monday evening, the possibility of extending the sewer lines on Washington, Jefferson and Center streets was considered.

Cards are to be mailed to the affected residents in these areas, to determine their reaction. If it is favorable, the department has about \$15,000 which would be available for such use.

If reaction is not favorable, this money may be used to improve the flow and pressure of the water system by putting in a water main at Amity street. This would, of course, not benefit as many townspeople, but the work is needed.

In the event of inclement weather, the Memorial Day program will be held in the All-Purpose room of the Runciman Elementary Building.

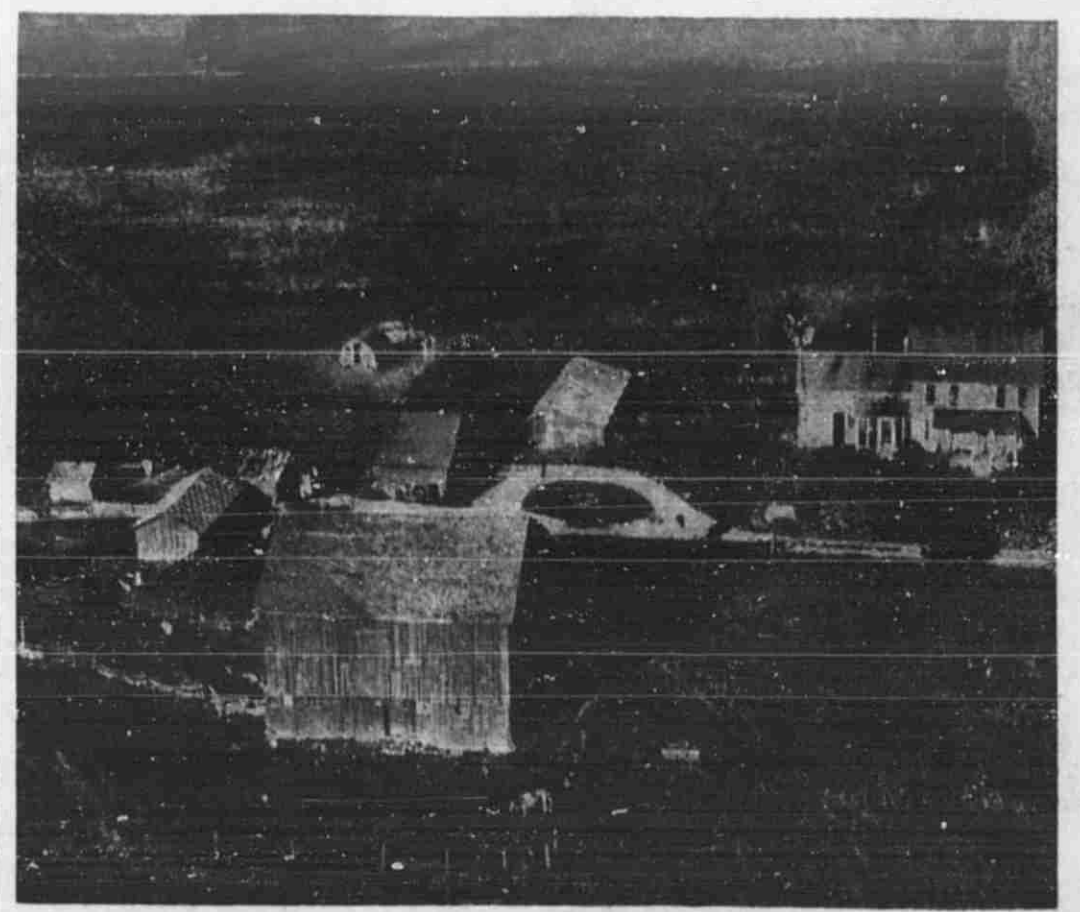
Women of the Moose
