## Washington St. Approves, 9 Out of 10 Council Orders New Sewer, Water Main Construction in Village

The Lowell Village Council Monday night, after the appearance of Charles White representing residents of Washington street and Lawrence Court who is building a new home on Jefferson, voted to ask bids for the construction of sewer main extensions on these two streets.

They also will take bids on the construction of a one block of water main from Highway to Hunt Street on Vergennes Road.

### Residents Approve

At a previous meeting it was agreed to build this new sewer if enough residents expressed a desire to hook up to the new mains. Return cards were mailed to residents of both streets; Mr. White brought in 9 cards out of 10 residents on Washington expressing a desire to hook up to the new sewer.



### Recreation Board

The Recreation Board will hold an organization meeting on June 25 a Tuesday, and President Speerstra appointed William Jones and Byrne McMahon to represent the village on the board. This proposed recreation board is to handle the Fair Grounds and Athletic Fields will be composed of representatives from the 4-H, from the school, and from the village.

## "Balk" Explained to Junior Pitchers



Vern Morse, coach of the Red Arrows second team, explains the pitchers' "Balk" to his five top-knotch pitchers. Morse, on the left, is working with Richard Stepek of Cascade, who had a "balk" called on him a week ago Monday in a game with Wyoming Park, while attempting to nab a runner off first. If a hurler bluffs a pitch to first or home plate, the runner is allowed to move ahead one base. Other pitchers looking on, left to right, are Fred Wissman of So. Lowell, Jim Lawrence and Bob Videaan of Ada, and Dave Burkhead of Cascade. All these boys are fine ball players says Morse. Besides being good pitchers, and helping the Little Arrows come through the past season with only one loss, they each play other regular positions on the team: Stepek is a shortstop, Wissman is such a good catcher he doesn't get a chance to pitch very often, Lawrence is a first baseman, Videaan plays third, and Burkhead is an auxiliary player in all posts on the ball field except catcher.

## Submits 18-Page Report Civic Planning Group Recommends Lowell Become Home-Rule City

In a report presented to the Lowell Village Council on Monday night the Civic Planning Committee—appointed in March to investigate the advisability of Lowell becoming a home rule city—recommended unanimously that Lowell should take action to become a city as soon as possible.

This committee consisting of Elmer Schaefer, Gurney Hahn, Earl Evans, Albert Horman, Frank McMahon, Bruce Walter, George Day and Walter Gunner have held meetings almost every week since March and have had representatives here from other cities and from the Michigan Municipal League.

The committee, in a 18 page report, listed all their findings and their unanimous decision.

## 4:32.8 in Mile; Breaks Hall's Record Carigon Wins First in "Champion" Meet Memorial Day at Kalamazoo

Bob Carigon, the Arrows' outstanding distance runner for over three years, closed his high school career last Thursday, Memorial Day, by capturing first place in the Kalamazoo Chamber of Commerce "Champion of Champions" track meet featuring the top performers in each event in the state.

In winning the mile event, Bob established a new Lowell High School mark of 4:32.8. The old record of 4:34.3 was set by Bob Hall in 1950 and tied by Carigon in this year's conference meet.

Running next to last nearly all the way, Bob turned on the speed on the final lap, gained on the field, caught leader Wally Schaffer of Ludington on the stretch, took the lead with about 10 yards remaining, and won by a step and a half.

### Defeated Once

Bob has been defeated only once in his senior year of running. That defeat was by Wally Schaffer in the cross-country regionals last fall. Bob has been undefeated in track competition this spring.

### Quite a Record!

A list of the running marks Bob holds include the school mile (4:32.8), school and conference 440 (52.5), conference mile (4:34.3), school and conference crosscountry (9:56.0), regional mile (4:40.5), YMCA Valley crosscountry, Hastings crosscountry, and John Bos Relays 880 (2:06.7). He is also a member of record setting teams in the school medley relay (2:37), and the John Bos Relays and school mile relay (3:38.6).

After graduation Bob expects to run in one or two additional invitational meets, perhaps against college competition. As for next fall and further schooling, Bob states that his top college choices are Central Michigan College in Mt. Pleasant and William Jennings Bryan University in Tennessee. Whatever his choice, we are sure he will become a success.

**On a Rural Route? Mail Box Improvement Time Set For June 3-16**  
Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield called attention today to the Annual Rural Mail Box Improvement Program to be started June 3.

Where boxes are improperly erected or in unserviceable condition, patrons will be encouraged to provide suitable receptacles, erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility, presenting the most appearance, and affording protection to the mail.

Box owners will be urged to inscribe their names clearly on that side of the box which is clearly visible to the carrier as he approaches, if they have not already done so.

Postmasters and rural carriers will enlist the cooperation of patrons to group boxes together at one site along the road wherever practicable.

Box holders will be asked to make sure boxes are located on the proper side of the road.
