





School districts, too, in Michigan are separate and distinct from local governmental boundaries. There would be no change in the size, composition, or organization of the school district in the community. The new city would merely replace the township as the agent of the school district in the collection of taxes. School taxes would, therefore, be collected by the township treasurer.
