Pans for frying food are used daily in many homes, so it pays to select good ones, says Eleanor Densmore, county home demonstration agent.

Because fry pans are used right over the heat and often without water, they must be of materials not easily damaged by high temperatures. For even browning of food, the material should be one that distributes heat well.


