Linda Helps Write First Letter From Area Teen - Agers Abroad

Linda Norwood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Norwood, 8725 Conservation rd., Ada was the co-author of a round robin letter from the Grand Rapids area Teen-agers Abroad, received recently in Lowell by the Don Mullens.

These EBOL (everybody on the list) letters are being written for the purpose of giving the home folks weekly reports on their activities, and will be written once each week for ten weeks, with each member of the group helping to keep us advised—two are co-authors each week.

Linda had the job of helping to write the first letter, which was received last week, and was distributed after being mimeographed in Grand Rapids.

She, and her pen partner Dave Shelby (whose address they did not divulge) complained rather broadly about their 22 hour train trip to Montreal, but their descriptive abilities are more complimentary as they boarded their ship.

"The food is extraordinary!" they explain, and go on to say "We sit at the second serving which is from 1:00 to 2:00 and 7:00 to 8:00, breakfast being from 7:00 to 8:30 (which very few of us make). We sit ten to a table with one waiter to serve us. We get five-course dinners and lunches. At 3:00 to 4:00 there is tea time, and at 10:00 p. m. sandwiches are served."

"You wouldn't think anybody could get lost in a place only 500 feet long, but when you really put your mind to it, it isn't hard (as we have proved many times)."

"The people aboard are fascinating. About half are American and the rest are German, French and English. One can learn so much by meeting them and talking to them. Various members of the group have met quite a range of people. For example, a cook from the Amazon, a doctor who spent four years in the Israel Army, a printer who is going back to Germany to see his son for the first time in twenty-one years, and an

Home Arts exhibitors at the Ionia Free Fair will have added opportunity to display their work and receive prizes, according to word received at the Free Fair office from the Michigan State Fair this week.

The Michigan State Fair announces it will award a special gold ribbon in each of several listed classes of endeavor. The winner of each ribbon is especially invited to exhibit the article on which the award is made at the 1957 Michigan State Fair at Detroit.

The gold ribbon accompanying a State Fair exhibit will designate the exhibit as a special State Fair display entitling the winner to free entry of the exhibit and a complimentary pass to the 1957 State Fair.

Classes include: Needlework, best bedspread or tablecloth, best crocheted article other than bedspread or tablecloth, best knitted article other than bedspread or tablecloth, best quilt, and best rug. In canning, best display of fruit—four jars, best display of vegetables—four jars, best display of meat—three jars, and best display of jelly—five glasses. In baking, best loaf of white bread and best cake.

4-H KEY AWARD

Michigan 4-H Key Club award will be introduced at county achievement days this fall. Ralph Kirch, Kent County 4-H club agent, explains that the key award is a new program to recognize 4-H members providing leadership in their clubs and counties.

The gold key, mounted on a necklace for girls and on a tie clasp for boys, is sponsored by the Cities Service Oil Company working with the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service.

Members eligible for the key award must have completed three years of club work with projects in two or more events. They must have taken in three district or state 4-H events, completed a junior leadership project, and be recommended by their local leader.

Keys are awarded on a quota basis for each county and members are rated on a point system for activities. When 4-H boys or girls earn 15 points, they're eligible to apply for the 4-H Key Club Award.
