

# First Interlocutor Chair

The first chair used by veteran Showboat interlocutor C. H. Runciman at the first Showboat many years ago is still being used in

the Lowell Ledger office. The chair, recalls Don Mac Naughton-who has worked for the Ledger for over 25 years-was taken from the furniture company and belonged to Jerry Cook who then ran the factory. Mr. Cook was the father of George Cook, our local attorney, and Grand Rapids city attorney:

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



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
