

### Eleven Hundred Will Take Up Books, Pencils Lowell Public Schools to Open Sept. 3; Supt. Gumser Announces Schedules

Beginning on Tuesday, September 3rd, paper, books and pencils will largely replace swimming trunks, scooters, and the what-nots which have helped to make the summer months happy ones for those who must enter the school portals! Tanned skins will give way to tanned hides (?) and the unsupervised activities will be replaced, somewhat, by supervised physical activities.

Teachers, too, will have to change their perspectives and procedures, for they too have been doing as they pleased. Their efforts will now be directed to

pleasing others (?). All in all, a total of over eleven hundred different personalities will gather on Tuesday afternoon to start the year's festivities.

#### Teachers Breakfast

Much planning and many preliminary activities are a part of the opening of school—but the official inauguration of the new year begins with a complimentary breakfast tendered the teachers and other employees by the Board of Education on Tuesday morning. The affair is a get-acquainted occasion, which is followed by a conference period.

#### Bus Schedule

For a few days the school buses will follow the same routes as they did in June, but on Tuesday they will leave the school at 11:30 and students should plan accordingly. For the first time elementary children from the former Star and McCabe districts will be entering Lowell schools and these children should gather at these schools at about 12:00 o'clock. A route will be established later.

#### Schedule for Reporting

Local children except kindergartners from the west side, should report directly to their rooms at 2:00 p. m. The tots who reside on the west side and who will enter kindergarten should report at 1:00 o'clock. All students living outside the Lowell district are to report at 1:00 o'clock.

#### Grades

It is not necessary for children in grades kindergarten through eight to report before opening day at the hours mentioned above, if new to the system, these grade children should bring certificates of promotion, transfer or accumulative records if possible. Children in kindergarten through 3 are to report to the new Runciman Elementary building, those in grades 4 through 6 to the Intermediate building (next to the high school), and those 7 and 8 will be housed on the lower floor of the high school building.

#### High School

Most of the high school students have already made out their schedules for the year. However, those who will enter Lowell High School for the first time and who have not already arranged their program of studies, are asked to enroll on Friday or Saturday of this week.

The offices will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. on Friday and on Saturday from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. Elsewhere in this issue of the Ledger is to be found a detailed program of study and a bulletin relative to courses.

Parents and pupils should study the offerings and suggestions before conferring with school officials. On Tuesday all high school students are to report to the gymnasium in the Intermediate building.

#### Text Books

The book store will be open all day Friday and Saturday and pupils in grades 7-12 are urged to make purchases then. Texts will be rented to pupils in grades 1 through 6. Parents will be notified of charges.

## Report on Lowell Schools

The Lowell Board of Education has always believed that the schools should be operated by the citizens of the area in which the school is located. Although the trend in Michigan has been to form fewer but larger school districts, the Lowell Board has never felt that the one-room school should be forced out of existence, either by bribes or penalties.

A few years ago there were over 7,000 school districts in Michigan—today there are fewer than 3,000 districts and this number is decreasing very rapidly. Legislation has forced the closed district to unite with other districts, preferably high school districts. Existing legislation encourages the annexation of the primary district to a high school district. Legislation also encourages the transfer of property from the primary district to the larger district. The Board of Education has not in any way become a part of this movement.

On the other hand, if any districts which have been served by the Lowell Board desire, for one reason or another, to become a part of the Lowell system, such districts will gladly be given such an opportunity. It must be acknowledged, however, that as the district becomes larger and larger, the revenues from tuition become less and less, and the transportation costs, now largely borne by the state, will increase.

The danger ahead lies in the fact that as the larger centralized system is forced into a program of transportation, the state could easily force such districts to provide such service at local expense. The movement is on foot to set up legislation which will make it necessary for every child to belong to a high school district—which would mean that there would no longer be any school district with fewer than twelve grades.

The Lowell system is in excellent financial condition. The high school is accredited by the University of Michigan and the North Central Association for maximum periods—the highest recognition given to any high school in Michigan.

The instruction in the elementary and intermediate grades is also of the highest order. The physical plant and equipment are adequate for current requirements. It is likely that additional facilities will have to be provided within a year or two—but it is expected that such facilities will be furnished within the special five-mill levy now in effect.

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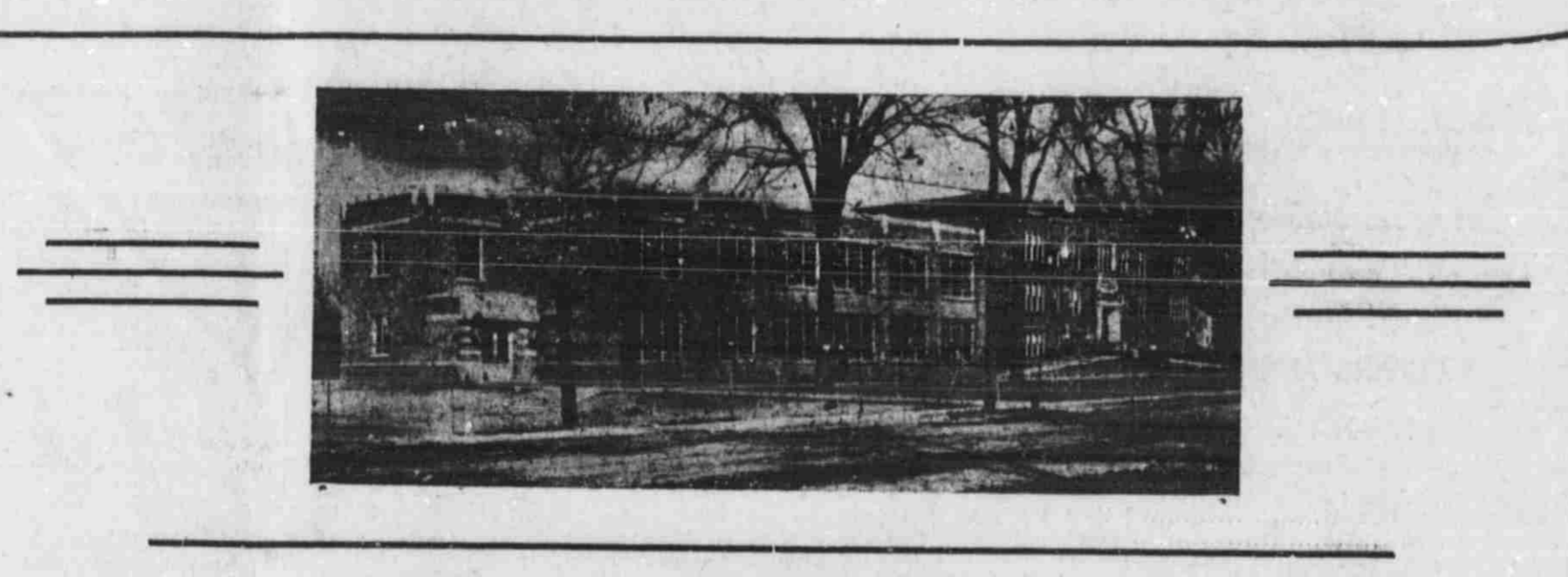
