Fluorides Now Added to Lowell Water



Robert Steward, of Lowell's water department is pictured putting the daily dose of fluorides in the village water supply. Fluoridation of the water was voted two years ago and has been in effect for the past several months. Every day Steward must check the water supply and place the proper amount of this powerful compound in the stock tank which by a mechanical process a small portion of only one part of fluoride per million pounds of water is used in the water pumped from the wells. This equipment is located at each of the four village wells. Daily samples of water must be taken in the village and checked to be sure the equipment is putting exactly the right amount of fluorides in the water. Careful attention to details and exact measurements are necessary to insure just enough tooth saving fluorides in the water.

Lowell doctors report that small quantities of the Asian Flu vaccine are available for workers in essential fields and others who have physical difficulties that make flu shots advisable. First batches of vaccine doctors feel, should not be given to children since the flu is not very serious for them and they can be taken care of much easier than adults.

The shots which in tests are effective 70 per cent of the time are advised for adults in contact with large numbers of people, such as teachers, doctors, nurses, essential service industries. Persons wanting shots should contact their physician.

Red Arrows Have Strong Forward Wall

Head Coach Bud Howe began cracking the whip this week in the hope that he can get his 1957 Red Arrow football squad into high gear for the opening game with Ionia, September 20. He is impressed by the performances of several boys in early practices, and reports that the team spirit is very high and the boys eager.

Bill Miller, a shifty, speedy fullback, gives every indication that he will be able to fill the shoes of Perry VanderVeen, last year's fullback. Mart Snider, a transfer from Ionia, has been looking good at the end spot. Stan Wingeer will see double duty by alternating at fullback and tackle.

Rapidly improving Tony Stormzand has been showing well at quarterback and is figuring heavily in Howe's plans. Rugged Dick Connors appears ready to go both ways; as an offensive guard or center, and as a defensive linebacker. Tom Kauffman will probably be another two-way man, playing both offensive and defensive end. Ken Spooner, a transfer halfback from Otisville, has been looking good also.

Danish Exchange student, Jens Yde, a big boy at six feet, two inches, and 202 pounds, although never having played football before, is an eager learner and is already making a good showing in the line. Bill Mathews and Jim Adriance, a couple of 200-plus pounders, are fine prospects and will add beef to the Arrows defensive line.

Junior Chuck Ryder appears set at one of the halfback slots, with George Henderson, Don Dawson, Tom Kutchev and Frank Poisal battling it out for the other halfback position. Lloyd Rosenberger will see duty as a defensive halfback.

With a forward wall that may well average over 180 pounds, the Arrows are expected to rely mainly on a strong ground game, although the potentially dangerous passing arms of Ryder and Stormzand, and receivers Kauffman, Dawson, DeVries and Snider present a formidable air attack.

Barring injuries Coach Howe expects to be able to whip Ionia this year after three straight losses to the Bulldogs in the last three seasons.
