## Wm. R. McDonnell Severely Injured in Train-Car Crash

William McDonnell, 36, a local resident and a driver for the Associated Truck Lines, was severely injured early Tuesday when a car in which he was a passenger was in collision with a Pennsylvania railroad switch engine at Fulton St. crossing in Grand Rapids. He was taken to St. Mary's hospital where his condition is reported fair. He suffered lacerations of the nose and legs and other injuries.

Driver of the car was John B. Adams, 51, also an Associated driver was to have been presented a gold pin by the company for ten years service without an accident. Mr. Adams died in the hospital shortly after being admitted. His death brings the number of traffic fatalities in Kent County this year to 59.

Mr. McDonnell who resides on Grand River Dr., received his 10-year pin from the company about a year ago.

## 11 Miles of 4-Lane Divided Highway On US-16 to Be Started Next Year

US-16 southeast of Lowell will be a scene of great activity this coming year when 11 miles of new 4-lane divided highway, plus seven grade separations on the re-location of US-16 west of Portland in Ionia county, will be under construction. This is the new U. S. Interstate Route and includes:

Two point seven miles of 4-lane divided highway from Market road and the Grand River, at the south limits of Portland, west to Portland road, L. A. Davidson, Lansing, \$1,850,000. Also included in the project are four grade separations. One will carry the new highway over the Grand River and Market Road; two others will carry

ry Knox and Keefer roads over Portland Road.

The Grand River and Market Road structure will have two bridge decks separated by a 32½-foot-wide open median. Each roadway will be 30 feet wide and will have two 2½-foot-wide sidewalks. Length of the structure is 414 feet. The Knox Road grade separation will be 251 feet in length, have a 26-foot-wide roadway and two sidewalks. The Keefer Road separation will have four spans totaling 277½ feet and also will have a 26-foot-wide roadway and two sidewalks.

The grade separation over Portland Road will have two bridge decks, each supporting 42-foot-wide roadways. The 142-foot-long separation will have a 48½-foot-wide open median.

The other project on US-16 is for 8½ miles of new divided highway from near State Road (M-66), about eight miles west of Portland, west to Nash Highway, L. W. Edison, Grand Rapids, \$3,048,312.26. Included in this project are three grade separations located at Jordan Lake Road, Nash Highway and Morrison Lake Road. All three carry local traffic over the new divided highway. They are similar in construction, each about 239 feet long with 26-foot-wide roadways.

Completion date for the 2½-mile-long project is July 31, 1959 and the 8½-mile project is August 31, 1959.
