Shanty tracks lead on to all the northern lakes. The depth of the tracks tells the reader of ice poles, tip ups, wigglers, decoys, coleman lanterns, ice spears, and much

Every month but one last year showed a reduction. The exception was June, with seven more than in the same month in 1956. December, one of the most dead-

ly months of the year, had a provisional saving of 18 lives, or 149 deaths in 1957 as compared with 158 in 1956,
