First Fatal **New Ada Road**

The first fatal accident to occur on the four-lane road and bridge at Ada occurred on Saturday night about 11 p. m. when two Grand Rapids men were killed. The accident occurred near the intersection of the Ada turn-off when both cars met head on. One of the cars was in the wrong lane but there is some discussion as to which car was traveling in the wrong direc-

Witnesses interviewed Monday were of the opinion that the men killed were wrong; sheriff's deputies reported that Roy B. McKervery, 26 of Cheboygan, a student at Aquinas was traveling west on an east bound lane. In any event, it is agreed that the accident occurred on the east side of the highway.

Harold W. Frasher, 36, of Grand Rapids, driver of the car, was killed instantly in the crash, Riding with him was Glenn H. Bowman, 47, of Grand Rapids, who died enroute to the hospital of a skull fracture. McKervey suffered body cuts and a broken right arm, He was reported improving at Blodgett hospital, Tuesday.




