will be furnished by the county and boards of Lowell Village, Vergennes Township and Lowell Township will each handle the votes of their citizens.

Everyone will be given the same ballot; one for the question where a yes or no vote will be all required; the second ballot will carry the names of the eighteen candidates for members of the charter commission. The polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m., and at the conclusion of the election the boards will first count the yes and no votes. If the vote in favor of the city is in the majority then the boards will count the ballots for members of the charter commission. If the vote is unfavorable the votes for charter commission will not be counted. The clerks were told by Mr. Donovan that the Lowell and Vergennes townships will be reimbursed for all election costs, if the city vote is successful by Lowell village; if unsuccessful by Kent County.

Last Day to Register

The last day for citizens to register to vote in this election on March 10 will be Monday, February 10. Citizens of Lowell will register with the village clerk whose office is open daily in the City Hall from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Citizens of the proposed to be annexed areas must register with their respective township clerks not later than February 10. A check by the clerks reveals that there will be about 75 voters eligible in Lowell Township and 75 in Vergennes Township. Registered voters in the village number in excess of 900.

The only restrictions will be the zoning ordinance which requires solid wall construction for foundations but this may prove to be no handicap and perhaps this entire area may be filled and give the buildings solid support.

Arrows Seek First Win; Play Host To Grandville Friday

This Friday, January 31 the Red Arrows, still seeking their first win, play host to the Grandville Bulldogs who are in second place in Valley standings. The last meeting of the two teams resulted in a lopsided Bulldog victory.

The Red Arrows have been steadily improving, however, and have obtained some "fresh blood" from Bob Perry's second team in the form of freshman Allen Seeley and sophomore Carroll Eekman. Another bright spot for the Arrows has been the scoring upsurge of senior Tony Stormzand with an average of 20.3 points per game in his last three games.

In their 70-60 loss to Wyoming Park, the Arrows took a 37-36 half-time lead behind the scoring of Stormzand and the floor-play of freshman Al Seeley. Stormzand pumped in 20 points in the first half, 14 of these in the first period. At the onset of the second half, however, the Vikings took a small lead and resisted a Lowell comeback in the late stages to walk away victorious.

For the Arrows, Stormzand meshed 22 points and Charlie Ryder scored eight. They were followed by Carroll Eekman with 7 and Al Seeley with five. Denny Howe tallied 15 in his final game for the Little Arrows, but his team absorbed a 56-36 defeat. Denny, a freshman, will be sorely missed by the Arrow seconds, and they wish him the best of luck at Alma.

The purpose of AFS is to further international understanding and friendship by the exchange of ideas and by the sharing of good times together.

Each town that brings a student "ambassador" to the U. S. may send one back in return. Jens Yde represents Denmark this year under the plan. This particular program has been going on here for the past two years sponsored by the Lowell Rotary Club.

Vergennes Twp. Board Clear Up Fire Service

To clear up the misunderstanding regarding the Lowell Fire Calls, the Vergennes Township Board would like to give a few facts and figures:

"1st. We have never had a written agreement with Lowell."

"2nd. At a special meeting with the Lowell Village Council September 30th we were informed that the trucks in Lowell were not adequate to make rural runs. At this meeting we did agree to pay Lowell for runs as far North as Fox's corners and on N. Washington St."

"3rd. Only two fire calls have been denied. One started in the Village of Lowell and spread to the property of Ed Marshall who lives in Vergennes. Therefore we do not feel obligated to pay a bill that originated inside the Village limits.

The second fire was in the North-west part of the township which is in an area far beyond the area agreed upon at the September 30th meeting."

Inasmuch as Vergennes township is assessed \$600 per year toward maintaining the County trucks we do not have the finance to pay for both. Our County trucks are available and equipped to fight fires where there are no fire hydrants. Both Ada and Grattan trucks are comparatively new.

They both are manned 24 hours a day. Both have direct lines for fire calls only. The numbers may be found in the front of your telephone books. We also have two auxiliary trucks to carry water.

"Due to these facts we feel that Vergennes residents would be better protected if they would use this equipment. Fire call stickers are available to post on your telephone from the township supervisor or clerk."

R. M. Wilcox, 95, Recalls Civil War



Reuben Monroe Wilcox will be celebrating his 95th birthday today with his relatives and friends in Lowell. Mr. Wilcox was born in Jemisonville, New York, in 1863. His father was a blacksmith and his mother died when he was very young. He can remember the time when his father fought in the Civil War; Mr. Wilcox was a young boy then.

In 1886 he was married to Mae Willett and they lived in Sheridan, Michigan, for several years before moving to Lowell at the turn of the century. His occupation was that of a house painter before farming. The farm, which his son, Winton, now lives on, was purchased in 1919.

They had eight children: Winton of Lowell; Mrs. Fred Roth of Vergennes; Mrs. Walt Fennell of Flint; Milton of Keene; and Harrison of Florida. Three of their boys, Reuben, Carl and Wallace, died. Mrs. Wilcox also passed away 23 years ago. He has 21 grandchildren and 40 great-grandchildren.

To Explain Importance Of Good Health Habits At Lowell Schools

"This year's conference assumes a special significance in view of the many scientific and economic changes of the past year," points out Dr. W. U. Armistead, dean of the M. S. U. College of Veterinary Medicine.

"The Russian development of satellites capable of carrying living passengers, the frightening lag in the training of United States scientists and engineers and the potency of hunger as a political weapon in countries on the Soviet fringe are typical of these changes," he added. "All of these forces, so prominent in the news of the past year, have served to re-emphasize the importance of sound veterinary medicine to our future comfort and safety."

The conference was held concurrently with the annual Alumni Day Reunion of the sponsoring College of Veterinary Medicine. More than 300 veterinarian graduates returned to the East Lansing campus for the two-day event.

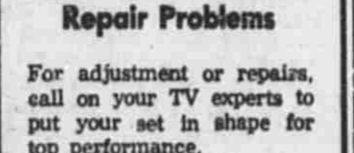
Two children were born to this union, Mrs. Milon (Barbara Jean) Porter of Greenville and Robert B. Cahoon of Largo, Florida.
