Question-I have heard that should Lowell become a city, that the assets of the township would be divided between the City and the Township. Is this true and is it fair to the citizens of the town-

Answer-It is true and it is definitely fair and equitable to all con-

When a new city is incorporated, the assets and liabilities of the township are divided with the city in the proportion that the City's assessed valuation bears to the total township assessed valuation.

Example-The total assessed valuation of Lowell township is slightly over \$4,000,000 and of this figure approximately \$2,500,000 is assessed in the Village proper. On this basis the new city would acquire 60% of the township assets upon separation from the township,

This is as it should be, for you the citizens of Lowell have paid 60% of the township taxes and it village building inspector, Theo. was with this money and other monies paid by the citizens of the township that the township was able to acquire its assets.

This is no different than if you and a friend of yours owned a business that was a partnership, and you decided to dissolve the partnership. If you put up 60% of the capital and your partner put up 40%, I am sure neither or you would think it unfair to split the assets in the same manner when you determined to dissolve the partnership.

What assets and how they are divided is determined by the Home Rule Act which is the law of the






