

Warn Against Flood Danger from Debris Blocking Gates in High Water Time

Oscar Nelson, Superintendent of the King Milling Company, has warned village officials of the danger when the spring thaws come about March 1, that the debris from the Main Street fire would block the gates and cause serious flood damage to sections of the village. Village council members discussed the matter at the council meeting on Monday night and Village Attorney VanderVeen pointed out that it was the legal responsibility of the property owners to clear up the debris in the river.

Discussion at the council meeting was on the necessity of the village taking the action necessary to clear up the area. The cost of the project has been estimated from \$500 to \$2,000 depending on whether the job is done in winter or in the spring after the ice is gone. Another danger pointed out is in the sidewalk giving away along this area if the great weight of a crane and heavy trucks drive over this portion that is not part of the bridge.

Flood Dangers Real

Blocking of the gates by long timbers and sections of the buildings that may fall into the river when the ice goes out would cause serious flood damage in the area along Avery Street and south of Main Street, Mr. Nelson pointed out. In times of flood the King Milling Company must let water through both gates to prevent Flat River from overflowing its banks in the village. Debris clogging the gates would hold up the water and thus cause a flood in parts of the town.

There might be a way of keeping the gates clear when the break-up comes if there were enough men with the proper equipment available, Mr. Nelson revealed. This might be a way to prevent flood if it is impossible to clear up the fire wreckage because of the ice. Both plans are under discussion. There are about three or four weeks before the break-up is expected.

Building Plans Reviewed

The village clerk was instructed to write owners of property in the fire area, pointing out their responsibility and also notifying them that they should submit plans for reconstruction to the village building inspector, Theo. Bailey, well in advance of actual construction for official approval. Various restrictions discussed at the meeting include solid foundations, fire proof construction and no living quarters for buildings rebuilt in this area.

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Lowell Man in Crash Injuring Six Sunday Night

A report from the family, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Arehart on Wednesday morning revealed that his condition was not critical but still serious. Surgery was necessary on a bad break in his upper right leg and that was performed on Tuesday in the Ionia hospital where he was taken after the accident. He is also suffering from internal injuries and lacerations of the right brow and ear. The accident occurred, State Police reported, when Arehart, traveling west on M-21 was attempting to pass another vehicle, swerved back into his own

lane and lost control going back into the path of an east-bound car, the two crashed head on. Driver of the other car involved was Burton Lake, 33, R-1, Muir, who received a skull fracture and severe skull lacerations; he is in fair condition. More serious injuries were sustained by his wife, Irene, 35, who received a fractured forearm and fractures of the lower extremities; her condition is still critical. A son, Lawrence, 9, is still in the hospital but in good condition with only severe lacerations. Treated at the hospital after the accident but now released was a daughter of the Burtons, Sue Ann, 4, and Don Weeks, 20, of Saranac, who was riding with Arehart. Robert B. Starkey, 56, Dies Saturday

Robert B. Starkey, Lowell electrician, died Saturday evening after a lingering illness. Mr. Starkey was born in 1901 in Allegan County near Douglas. After he was married, he and his wife, Edith, moved to Lowell where they have lived for over 30 years.

Mr. Starkey was a member of the famed Red Arrow Division of the infantry during World War I and was stationed in Soissons, France. He belonged to the Disabled American Veterans and the Purple Heart Association. He also was the charter commander of the first VFW post, which later dissolved until after World War II. During recent years he belonged to the Kent County Sportsmen's League.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at the Roth Chapel with Rev. J. Marion DeVinney officiating. Graveside services were also held at Prospect Hill Cemetery in White Cloud, where he was buried.

Surviving are his wife, Eda; two sisters, Mrs. Maude Ridlington of Holland and Mrs. Rachel Churchill of Detroit.

Cecil Houghton, Guest Speaker, February 8

The Co-Eds of the Congregational church will have Cecil Houghton as their speaker Saturday, February 8. Mr. Houghton will tell of his experiences in Greenland and show slides of the country.

Born the son of a Congregational missionary in the Northwest Territory, Mr. Houghton grew up learning the Eskimo language along with his native English. Later serving with the army he was stationed in Greenland as head of an Arctic Research and Rescue Squad. The Eskimos call him "Sordo Kathadit," meaning "Like an Eskimo."

The experiences he had during his years in the Arctic Circle have been the subject of nearly 1500 lectures which Mr. Houghton has given before clubs and groups in the past few years.

Mr. Houghton will have with him his Husky dogs, Prince and Nannook, which he obtained from the Eskimos and also his sledge with which he has explored many frosty slopes around his home on Reeds Lake in Grand Rapids. Nannook, his white Siberian husky is descended from the most famous sledge dog of all history, "Balto," lead dog of the Nome "serum run" which saved the lives of 1,000 people in 1925.

His knowledge of sledge dogs enabled him to train more than 150 such dogs during his Greenland service.

Mrs. Paul Hilton Now 'Satisfactory' After Being Shot by Husband Thursday

Mrs. Paul D. Hilton, 51, was reported in satisfactory condition at Grand Rapids Osteopathic hospital Tuesday after being shot in the back by her husband, who moments later, committed suicide. Mrs. Hilton was arguing with her husband as she prepared to go to work for the evening. She told officers that the argument concerned his drinking. Mr. Hilton fired a .45-caliber automatic pistol

through his wife's back, then shot himself through the heart and died instantly.

Mrs. Hilton was able to crawl to the telephone and called Gerald Roth for the ambulance. She asked him to contact Dr. H. R. Meyers and the sheriff's department. She was taken to the hospital and underwent surgery.

The pair operated a fruit stand on US-16; residents will be familiar with their wingless airplane nearby. Mr. Hilton was a former Lowell township Justice of the Peace and member of the Township board. Police Chief Frank Stephens said he was told by Hilton's physician that he had been in ill health for the past year.

Besides his wife, Eunice, two daughters, Paula, 20, a graduate of Lowell High, and Margot, 23, survive him.

Funeral services were held Monday at Roth Chapel, Rev. Verdi L. Reusser officiating. Burial was made in Woodlawn cemetery.

Car Wheel Covers Stolen At Game

Two spinner wheel covers were taken from a car during the basketball game Friday night in the school parking lot. Lowell police reported that this has happened 14 times in the past two months but no suspects have been found in connection with it.

Police Chief Frank Stephens requested, "All persons who have spinner wheel covers on their cars are advised to mark them inside with a permanent marking so they may be identified with the owner in case they are stolen. These marks should be scratched inside the cover rather than using paint."
