Only Contest in Village Primary Vote Is For Three Vacancies on Council

Little interest is being shown in the village primary to be held Monday, February 17. The only contest is for positions on the village council where all three present incumbents are not seeking re-election. Contesting on the Peoples Ticket for a place on the annual ballot for the village council are George Dey, sr., Charles Doyle, Ron Fish and Carl Smith.

Three of the four will be nominated to run in the village election March 10.
There is no contest for the other village offices where William Jones, jr., is seeking the village president's office; incumbent Laura Shepard, village clerk and Theo Bailey, assessor, are candidates for re-election.

Report Success of Church Campaign

The twenty-seven teams of callers who went out Sunday afternoon in the interest of the Methodist Church and Church School Expansion Campaign, reported enthusiastic and cordial receptions everywhere.

Gerald Rollins, Campaign Chairman, reported that sufficient cash and pledges had come in by 5:30 Sunday afternoon to reach the minimum goal of \$15,000. Late afternoon and evening calls raised the total beyond the \$20,000 mark. Returns are still coming in and it is expected that the final total will be considerably higher.

While no official account has been taken, Mr. Rollins reports that there is general agreement that the money which is received after the indebtedness is liquidated and the organ expansion is completed, will be used to establish a building fund which will be held until the time arrives when the additional building, which is badly needed, can be built.

Report on School Testing Program

Under the direction of W. W. Gurnsey the Lowell School has one of the more comprehensive testing systems of the state.
Due to the large number of rural students which enter at the 8th and 9th grade levels, the bulk of the testing is done after these grades. However, this year a general ability test was given to grades one through six.
An approximate testing schedule is:

- Seventh grade: A general ability test.
 - Eighth grade: A very thorough battery containing ability, achievement and interest. (Specifically to do a better job of assisting wise choices of classes).
 - Ninth grade: 1. General ability test (for those who have not had one). 2. Problem check list. 3. Student history form. 4. Interest inventory.
 - Tenth grade: Special battery over 7 ability areas (this is required for C-plus and above students. Costs \$1.00).
 - Twelfth grade: 1. General ability test, an interest test and a consultation with the Michigan Employment Service (for those students who are not going to college and who have not decided upon a vocation). 2. Scholarship Qualifying test (costs \$1.00) for those who wish to try to win a scholarship.
- These tests are on file with other information material such as health, grades, student history, teachers appraisals, absences. They represent a fairly accurate picture of a student. Any parent or employer has access to an interpretation of this file from the Principal, Superintendent, or Guidance Counselors.
