Calf Roping at Rodeo

Calf roping is the first of the five main Rodeo attractions and is a timed event. The horse used are well trained. Mostly used is the Quarter Horse as he is fast and strong and they have what is called "calf sense." A great deal of training is needed to prepare these horses for calf roping.

As soon as the rope settles on a calf, the horse seizes himself and the roper dismounts on a run for the tie which is three wraps and a "hooy."

Brahma and White Face calves are used—those that are range bred as they are tough and fast. If a calf is roped and knocked down, the roper must get him up and throw him again for the tie. A roper is disqualified if he breaks the barrier—that is if he breaks before the calf has crossed the score line. Calves are drawn by numbers out of a hat and that determines which calf each roper gets.

One judge, a flag man, barrier men and two timers are used in the calf roping event.

Don't forget the Lions Club Rodeo for the swimming pool fund July 3 and 4.
