Police on Wednesday were investigating the fire at the Leon McCarty apartment on South Washington Street where McCarty says he was struck while in bed near midnight Tuesday by two young men who robbed him of \$8 to \$10 and then set a fire in a closet.

McCarty, who lives alone in the apartment in the rear of the Christian Science Building, told the police that the same young men broke in and bothered him about two weeks ago, but he did not report it to the authorities. Tuesday night they broke in again and struck him while in bed, and after obtaining the few dollars in his clothes, they started a fire in a clothes closet and left, McCarty, 76, who is crippled, managed to get across the street to the Grummet residence at 402 Kent Street and summoned help. Damage to the apartment, mainly smoke and water, was estimated by Fire Chief Frank Baker at \$1,000. Mr. McCarty was taken to the home of his sister, Mrs. M. N. Henry.

Investigating the fire is State Fire Marshall Barton from the Rockford Post of the State Police and the robbery is being investigated by Detective Robert Hill of the Sheriff's Department and Police Chief Frank Stephens.

to each youngster between 5 and 19 on these census rolls. The announcement was made by Kenneth L. McKee, manager for the company in Lowell.

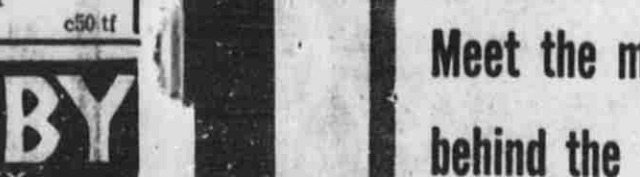
