Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING, REGULATING AND LICENSING PEDDLERS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF LOWELL.

SECTION 1. Permit and License Required. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business of peddling as defined in Section 2 of this ordinance within the corporate limits of the Village of Lowell without first obtaining a permit and license therefor as provided herein.

SECTION 2. Definitions. (a) The word "peddle" as used herein shall include the singular and the plural and also mean and include any person, partnership, association, club, co-partnership or society, or any other organization.

(b) The word "peddler" as used herein shall include any person, whether a resident of the Village of Lowell or not, traveling by foot, wagon, automobile vehicle, or any other type of conveyance, from place to place, from house to house, from street to street, carrying, conveying or transporting goods, wares, tickets, merchandise, meats, fish, vegetables, fruits, garden truck, farm products or provisions, offering and exposing the same for retail sale, or making sales and delivering articles to purchasers, or who, without traveling from place to place, shall sell or offer the same for sale from a wagon, automobile vehicle, railroad car, or other vehicle or conveyance, and further provided that one who solicits orders and as a separate transaction makes delivery to purchasers as a part of a scheme or design to evade the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a peddler subject to the provisions of this ordinance. One selling or hawking from a temporary location within the Village limits shall also be deemed to be a peddler. The word "peddler" shall include the words "hawker" and "huckster".

SECTION 3. Application. Applicants for permit and license under this ordinance shall file with the Village Clerk a sworn application in writing (in duplicate) on a form

which shall be filled out by the applicant and submitted to the Village Clerk, which shall give the following information:

(a) Name and description of the applicant.

(b) Address (legal and local).

(c) A brief description of the nature of the business and the goods to be sold and in the case of products of farm or orchard, whether produced or grown by the applicant.

(d) If employed, the name and address of the employer, together with credentials establishing the exact relationship.

(e) The length of time for which the right to do business is desired.

(f) If a vehicle is to be used, a description of the same, together with license number or other means of identification.

(g) A statement as to whether or not the applicant has been convicted of any crime, misdemeanor, ordinance, the nature of the offense and the punishment or penalty assessed therefor.

(h) At the time of filing the application, a fee of \$5.00 shall be paid to the Village Clerk to cover the cost of investigation.

SECTION 4. Investigation and License. (a) Upon receipt of such application, the original shall be referred to the Chief of Police, who shall cause such investigation of the applicant's business and moral character to be made as he deems necessary for the protection of the public good.

(b) If as a result of such investigation, the applicant's character of business responsibility is found to be unsatisfactory, the Chief of Police shall endorse on such application his disapproval and his reasons for the same, and return the said application to the Village Clerk, who shall notify the applicant that his application is disapproved and that no permit and license will be issued.

(c) If as a result of such investigation, the character and business responsibility of the applicant are found to be satisfactory, the Chief of Police shall endorse on the application his approval, and the permit and license shall be issued.

SECTION 5. License. (a) The permit and license shall be issued for a period of not more than thirty calendar days and not more than one calendar year shall be treated as a year.

SECTION 6. License Fees and Badges. The Village Clerk shall issue to each licensee at the time of delivery of his license a badge for each individual licensed under this ordinance. The badge shall bear the words "Licensed Peddler" and the period for which the license is issued.

SECTION 7. Transfer. No license or badge issued under the provisions of this ordinance shall be transferred to another person at his behalf, shall be sold, made any copy, or used in any way other than that for which it was issued.

SECTION 8. Loss, Misuse and Renewal. No peddler, nor any person at his behalf, shall lose, misuse or attempt to lose, or attempt to lose, his license or badge by any means other than that for which it was issued.

SECTION 9. Renewal. Licensees shall apply for renewal of their license and badge at least five (5) days prior to the date set for hearing.

SECTION 10. Appeal. Any person aggrieved by the action of the Chief of Police or the Village Clerk in the denial of an application for permit or license as provided in Section 4 of this ordinance, or in the decision with reference to the revocation of a license as provided in Section 11 of this ordinance, shall have the right of appeal to the Council of the Village of Lowell. Such appeal shall be taken by filing with the Council, within fourteen (14) days after notice of the action complained of has been mailed to such person's known address, a written statement setting forth fully the grounds for the appeal. The Council shall set the time for a hearing on such appeal and notice of such hearing shall be given to the applicant in the same manner as provided in Section 11 of this ordinance for notice of hearing on revocation. The decision and order of the Council on such appeal shall be final and conclusive.

SECTION 11. Revocation of License. All annual licenses issued under the provisions of this ordinance shall expire on the 31st of December in the year in which issued. Other than annual licenses shall expire on the date specified in the license.

SECTION 12. Penalties. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or by imprisonment not to exceed 30 days or both such fine and imprisonment. The provisions of this ordinance shall be severable and if any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses and phrases of this ordinance but they shall remain in effect, it being the legislative intent that this ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any part.

SECTION 13. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 14. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law. Made and passed by the Council of the Village of Lowell, State of Michigan, at a regular meeting held on the 2 day of June, 1958.

Frequent, Close Mowing Hurts Lawn

The turf on many lawns is ruined by too frequent and too close mowing, say turf specialists at Michigan State University.

This is especially true of shady lawns, where the competition of trees for water and plant food is great, and on open lawns which are injured by drought in summer.

Better turf will result if such lawns are mowed less often. Maintain such lawn grasses as Merion and Kentucky bluegrass and red fescue at a height of 1 1/2 to 2 inches in open, sunny areas. Keep red fescue and rough bluegrass grown in shade at 2 to 2 1/2 inches.

Keep your lawn mowed as recommended until about June 15, then put the lawn mower away. Bring it out only if summer conditions are so favorable that the grass is likely to become unattractive.

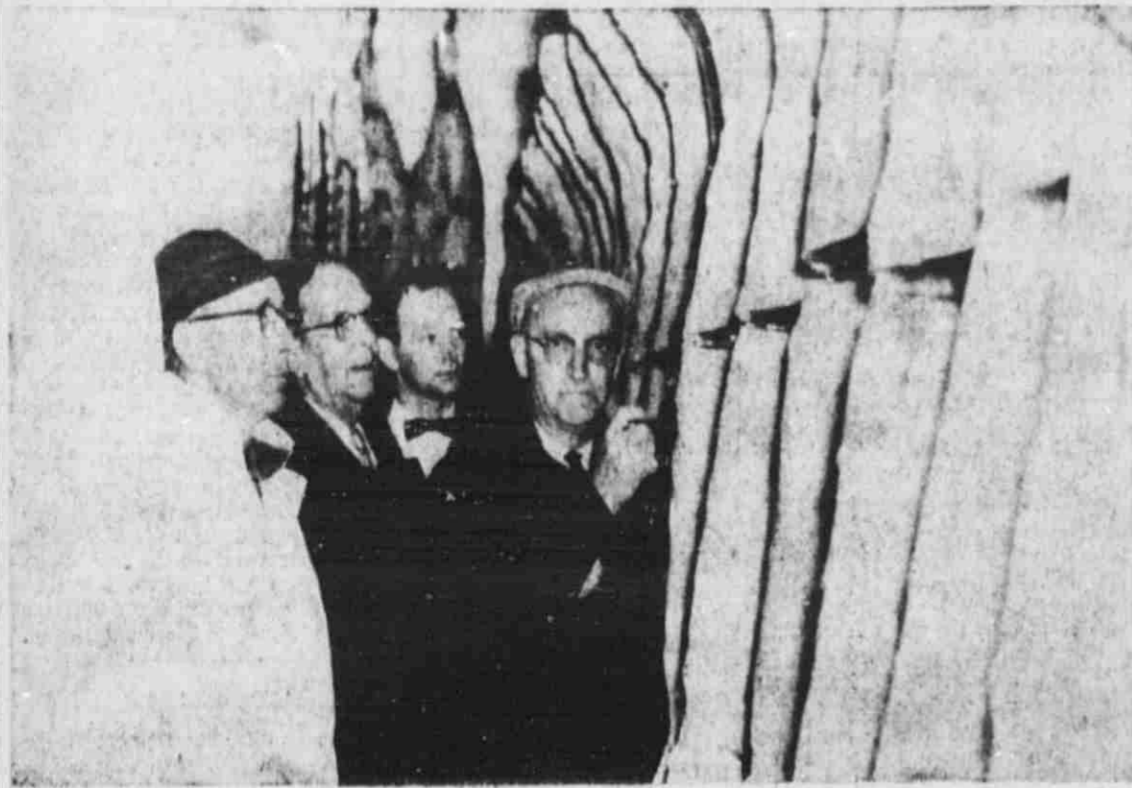
