The upper opening completely penetrated the casing; the lower only chiseled through the outer layers, "The refrigeration units were checked Sunday," Bob stated, "and there was nothing unusual at that time." Apparently the breakin occurred sometime Sunday night or early Monday morning. Nearby residents neither heard nor saw any reason to become suspicious. However it was necessary to chisel through two layers of steel plus a fireproof material which must have involved time and made considerable noise. An accounting was under way Monday to determine the exact amount of missing money. Installation of a new safe as will begin as soon as possible.
