The Lowell Municipal Utility had bad week when on Thursday the 13,000 volt line of Consumers Power Co, that feeds the Runciman Electric Eye Plant was shorted into a 7,200 volt line of the Munici-Showboat Queen and Miss Grand pal Utility that runs on the same pole line by a tree limb. The high voltage line fed back into the power plant and burned out the No.4 Diesel Generating unit that was operating at the time.

Roger Westenbroek, Superintendent of the Utility said that the first indication of trouble came at 8:30 Thursday, June 26, when surges of the high voltage started hitting the Lowell plant at irregular intervals. Line crews immediately started checking the lines but failed to find the limb blown busy ones at the Lowell Library across the two transmission lines generator about noon. 




