Coons was chosen vice chairman, Dr. Thomas Hill, secretary; and Frank Stephens, treasurer; will remain in their respective offices. The school board elects their own officers, Francis Campau, recently-elected trustee, formally assumed his duties Monday.

Rollins Active With Town Youth
For many years, President Rollins has shown wide interest in the youth of Lowell. He and his wife, Eleanor, have been active in the Methodist Church and have taught Sunday School classes for many years. For about four years, he headed the Youth Fellowship there. Mr. Rollins has been on the School Board and a member of the Lowell Rotary Club both, for about 12 years.

He and his family welcomed Elke Gildhoff, exchange student from Germany, who stayed in their home two years ago. He has been chairman of the Rotary's exchange student program which sponsored foreign students here for the past two years. His interest has helped the program to expand. Mr. Rollins has also helped with the Boy Scouts in Lowell, and is presently treasurer of the organization.

A native of Lowell, he was graduated from Lowell High School and served with the Army in World War II. He and his wife have two children, Beth Ann and Dick, who both attend Lowell Schools.

Postal Increase Effective Friday

Lowell Postmaster George Hale said today he expects plenty of stamps and postal cards to be on hand for sale August 1, to meet new postage rates which become effective then.

Mr. Hale explained the Post Office Department has been issuing new stamps, stamped envelopes and postal cards to post offices for several weeks in anticipation of the new rate changes.

Large additional supplies of the regular 4 cent stamp, bearing the likeness of Abraham Lincoln, are being received here to meet the new first-class letter rate of 4 cents an ounce. In addition, issues of special stamps and commemorative stamps will be available at the local post office in 4 cent denominations.

A new "Champion of Liberty" stamp, honoring Simon Bolivar, the late great South American liberator, will be on sale at the local post office on July 25, in 4 cent

Attic Fire Causes About \$3,000 Loss

An estimated \$3,000 damages resulted from water and smoke in an attic fire at the home of Edward A. Adriance at 120 Smith Street, Sunday about 4 p. m. Although actually undetermined, the blaze was believed to have been caused by faulty electrical wiring.

Neighbors helped carry out nearly all the furniture before the fire spread to the downstairs area. ("There is no upstairs in the house.") Mr. Adriance reported that they had some trouble in contacting the Lowell Fire Department, who finally showed up with a fire truck. Meanwhile Mr. Adriance had connected a garden hose.

Water and smoke contributed to most of the damages and only about \$7-800 was directly caused by fire.

Expect Showboat Receipts Lower

Showboat receipts for this year are expected to be lower than in 1957 and it is believed that the gross amount will not exceed \$30,000, compared with \$35,006 last year. Expenses in 1957 totaled \$27,578.84 and a total of \$7,428 profit was made.

The final tabulation of expenses and earnings will not be made until the Showboat directors meet in September.

At that time, the directors will decide what distribution will be made with the proceeds. From last year's profits and some cash on hand from 1956, \$9,500 was distributed—to the swimming pool fund, Board of Trade and American Legion, \$3,000 each; to the Boy Scouts, \$500.

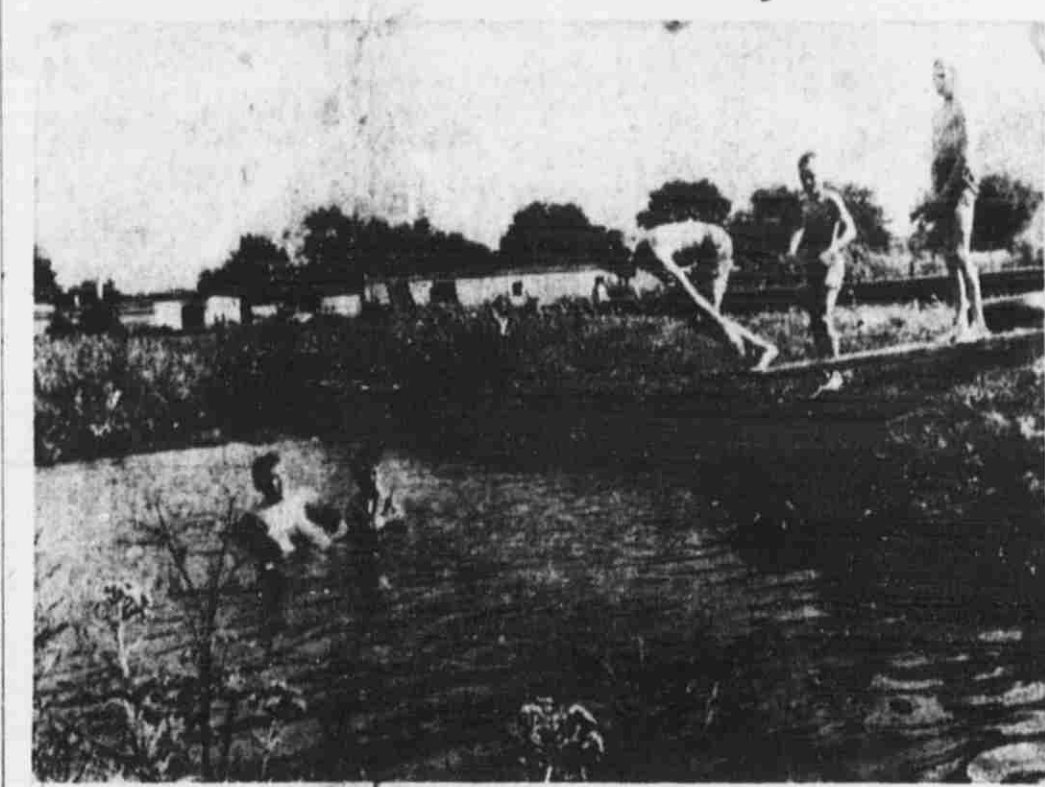
Peter Simmerer May Return Home

With no safe swimming place in the village, several boys from the west side of town, including those pictured above: Buzz and Pat McMahon, Ricky Maloney, Pat McCormick and Paul Manigold, have built a swimming hole on Cherry Creek along the C&O railroad tracks. The creek was dammed up by filling bags with sand and stones from the creek bottom, that has formed a pool about three feet deep. The clear cool spring water of Cherry Creek keeps the pool bubbling over the dam and creates a good safe place for these children to swim. Diving is limited to making short shallow plunges across the creek from a board that is given its spring by being placed across an old tire. This proves that the boys of today are capable of creating their own swimming hole, like their fathers and grandfathers before them. The "ole swimmin' hole" in the creek or river has long been a tradition in Lowell.

Lowell Will Vote on Welfare Proposal; Political Candidates, on Tuesday

Lowell voters will elect candidates for county, state and national offices in the August 5 primary. Those who win in the primary on each party's ticket, will seek election in November.

The big issues of the primary are the two welfare proposals which will be voted upon. Both deal with a county tax increase designed to meet the need for welfare relief funds in Kent County.

The two proposals, if adopted, would authorize the County Board of Supervisors to increase the tax rate from 15 mills by 1.5 mills for one year. In this way, the \$1.4 million would be raised for welfare needs.

Unemployment is the main cause for the proposed increase as so many have used up their unemployment benefits and have turned to the Welfare Board for help.

Proposal No. 1 would increase the property taxes by one and one-half mills. This can only be voted on by qualified electors who are property owners as well as taxpayers. Proposal No. 2 would authorize the Kent County Supervisors to levy this tax. All taxpayers who are qualified electors may vote on this. Both must pass in order to provide the extra funds for the Welfare Board.

Because of the interest of a group of high school students, Lowell will again have an exchange student, Nicola Francesco Negro, a 16-year-old Italian boy, has been selected by the American Field Service to stay with the Cary P. Stiff family in Ada.

Frank, as he wishes to be called, will leave from Rotterdam on August 25, and is expected to be in Lowell a short time after that. He will stay with Mr. and Mrs. Cary P. Stiff and Martha in Ada.

The exchange student comes from Bari, Italy, near the Mediterranean Sea. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Settimio Negro; he has two brothers and two sisters. Frank's mother and father are both chemists.

Mathematics, science and English are his particular interests; the latter he has studied for two years. He also knows a little French. He attends the Scientific Lyceum (high school) and comes very highly recommended by his teachers.

Outside of his school work, Frank participates in swimming, fencing and cycling activities. He wrote, "I like to spend my free time listening to music and reading books." Frank also enjoys performing in theatrical performances. As for the future, he plans to take a university degree in medicine.

As most Italians, Frank is Roman Catholic, but the American Field Service has found that, in hundreds of cases where Catholic students have been placed in Protestant homes, there has never been any difficulty whatever.

In September Frank will meet his American family, Mr. and Mrs. Cary Stiff. His "sister", Martha, by that time will probably have returned from Finland, where she is Lowell's foreign exchange student. He will enroll in Lowell at Lowell High School next fall.

Donald Kelly, Lowell school manual arts instructor, and Steven Nisbet, principal, are the co-chairmen of the exchange student program here. Mr. Nisbet said that the Lowell Rotary Club which sponsored exchange students, Elke Gildhoff from Germany and Jens Yde from Denmark, had done a fine job. However, because of the student interest, the school was happy to take over the program. The finances have been borrowed and will be replaced by donations and next year's school magazine sales.

Frank Negro will be the fifth exchange student in connection with Lowell's program; Elke and Jens who came here, Jean Bishop who went to Germany last summer and Martha Stiff, who is now in Hamelinina, Finland, this summer.

Board Endorses 'Yes' Vote

Realizing that a defeat on August 5 of the one and one-half mills to be levied for Relief and Welfare for one year would undoubtedly mean a lesser amount for the appropriation of the local schools, the Lowell Board of Education took action on Monday of this week in support of the measure.

If the proposal is defeated it is likely the County Allocation Board, in distributing the fifteen mills to the County, Townships and Schools, would find it necessary to cut both the township and school in order to assign a greater millage to the County for Welfare and Relief. The Schools are already hard pressed to meet budgetary requirements due to the larger enrollments and increased costs.

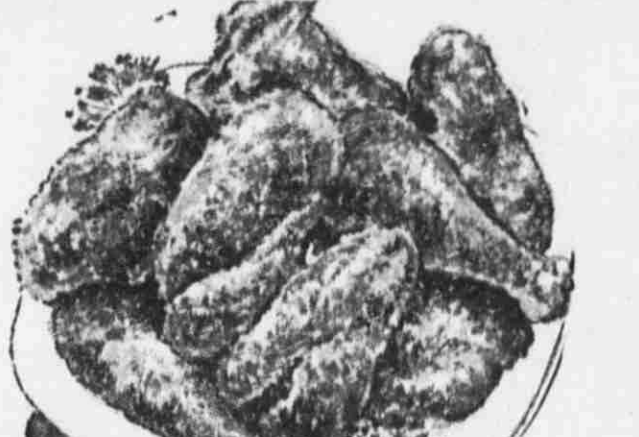

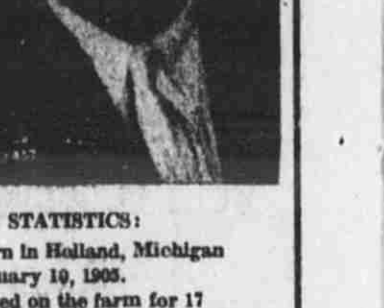

Letter to Editor

The unemployment situation in Kent County has placed our county, schools and townships in a grave and serious position. The tragic increase in welfare cases requires an extraordinary amount of money that would normally go to our schools, townships and county.

Faced with a constitutional tax limitation, we are in a position where either we must let thousands of families of unemployed people suffer privation or we must drastically reduce the amount of money available for education and normal governmental operations.

I do not believe that any person today would advocate letting innocent people suffer because of economic conditions over which they have no control, nor do I believe that any sane person wishes at this hour of history to reduce school services.

Fortunately, the Board of Supervisors of Kent County has foreseen this problem, and has placed on the ballot for the August 5th election the question of raising one and one-half mills (\$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation) for one year of direct welfare purposes only. This will solve the problem at least for the coming year.

A "Yes" vote on the two proposals of the August 5th election will insure proper care for the families of the less fortunate and proper education for our children. I strongly urge that each voter in Lowell vote "Yes" on both proposals at election day, Tuesday, August 5th.

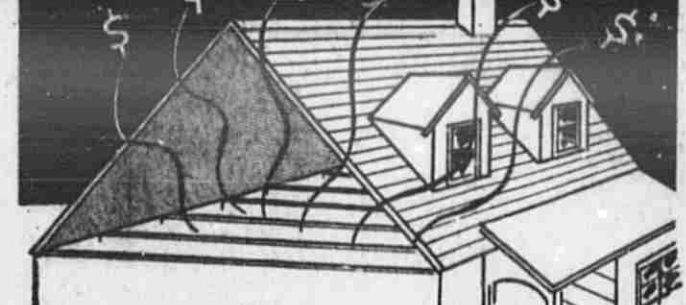
