

Council Acts to Safe-Guard Children; One-Way St., Two-Way Stop Approved

The village council, on Tuesday night, ordered that High Street between Monroe and Washington be made one-way going East. This will be in front of the new Runciman Elementary Building, and will bring cars deliv ring children or picking them up on the right side of the street. The action was requested by Dr. Thomas Hill, Secretary of the School Board, after action by the board at their morning meeting on Tuesday. The council also voted to prohibit all parking in that block as an additional safety precaution.

Two-Way Stop for School Buses
The council in further resolution, extended the state law into the village that requires all drivers to stop from both directions, when a school bus is loading or unloading passengers. This is a continuation of the newly enacted state law in effect on all highways in the state. School buses in the village pick up and deliver kindergartners, and these five-year-olds need the additional protection of stopping all traffic until they are off the street.

Vacate King Street

In a unanimous vote, the village council ordered the vacating of King Street from Jackson to Division. This is a street that was never opened, and goes directly up the embankment of a former gravel pit. Members of the council stated that notwithstanding the neighborhood dispute on their action, it was in the public interest to vacate this street.

Check River for Pollution

At the request of the village health officer, the Kent County Health Department has taken samples of Flat River water, both at the dam and further up stream, and they report that the water is safe for swimming. Br-r-r!

'Tourist Screening' Theme of Second Development Adv.

Some Michigan communities may have new industries before another summer vacation period rolls around because a visiting manufacturer enjoys its recreation facilities and some local resident is alert to the possibility.
In its program to bring more industry and jobs to Michigan, the state's Economic Development Department is expanding its "tourist screening" project.

Started several years ago as a summer program, the Economic Development Department now urges communities to continue the "screening" program throughout the year as Michigan increases in popularity as an all-year recreation area.

Chambers of Commerce and industrial development groups are being asked to mobilize service station attendants, hotel, motel and restaurant employees and all persons associated with the resort trade to "talk up" their areas as good locations for industry.

The Economic Development Department has some specific examples to back up its program. Charlevoix has an industry because a South Bend, Indiana, manufacturer was forced into port there during a Chicago-Mackinac race a few years ago. He liked the town well enough to buy a cottage. The more time he spent there, the more he liked the community. Eventually, at the suggestion of a Chamber of Commerce official he located his manufacturing operation there.

Reed City has a growing industry that developed into an international business because a Niles industrial official liked the Osceola County community on a visit there.

Up in Leelanau County an industry was added some years ago because a long-time vacationer was watching a baseball game. When the victorious home-town team walked off the field, the visitor commented "If you boys can work as hard as you play ball, I'll open a branch of my company here."

They proved they were as good workers as they were ball players. Some of those ball players still work in the company's plant there.

To assist in this "tourist screening" program, the Economic Development Department has prepared a manual with suggestions on how to make the program most effective.
A White Cloud restaurant carries on its menu some of the area's advantages to industry. In a number of other localities, cards carrying invitations to industry to locate there are on display.

One of the important features of such a program, the department stresses, is to have everyone in the community familiar with the sources which can provide definite information on industrial locations and advantages. These include the Chamber of Commerce, industrial development groups, public officials and representatives of railroads and public utilities.

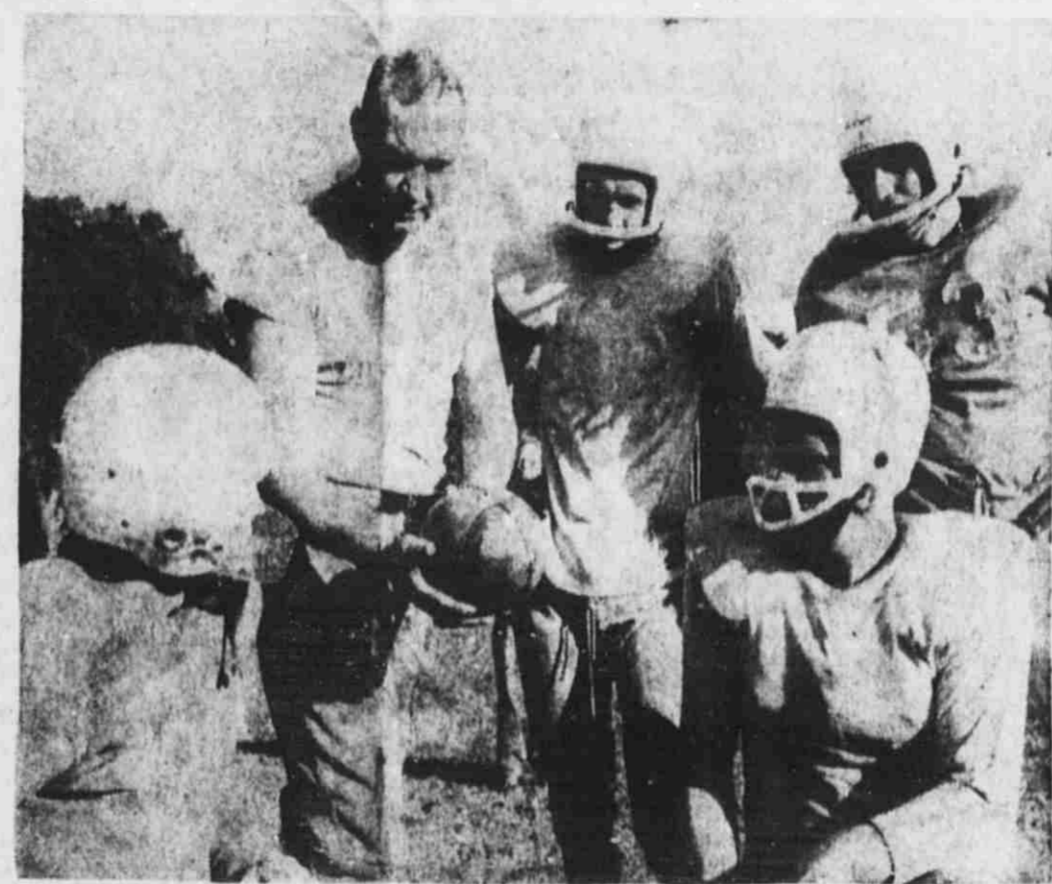

It's Peach Time For Michigan

Three millions bushels of peaches start their August march from Michigan orchards into your fruit markets. Now is the time for you to think about the varieties that best suit your taste and fit the special uses for your family.

Redhaves herald the peach march to market, followed by Fairhaven and Halehaven. Kahlhaves come the last of August, with Red Skins and Elbertas expected to be ready about September 1st and extending on through the month. The consecutive ripening dates stretch the season for fine peach flavor. Let's meet the "Haven" family of peaches.

Redhaves: brilliant red skin, firm flesh, fine grained texture, "peachful" juicy flavor, resistant to browning when exposed to air. Excellent for fresh use, freezing and canning.

Fairhaven: smooth, tough skin that makes this peach that ships to market exceptionally well. Color is bright golden with bright red cheeks. Flesh is medium yellow, moderately fine textured, resistant to browning. Good for freezing.

Halehaven: an excellent shipper means it gets to market in good condition. High flavor, good for fresh use, home canning, freezing.

Kahlhaves: one of the newer "Haven" varieties. Fruit is well colored with about an equal amount of bright red and clear yellow. Firm, fine grained flesh, fine flavored and resistant to browning.

It's a matter of planning when it comes to using peaches for canning and freezing. Plan your time to match the ripening time of the variety you prefer.

For fresh use, it should be peaches every day. To help with planning, two pounds of peaches will make four half-cup servings for slicing and one eight-inch square upside-down cake. Or two pounds of peaches will make one eight- or nine-inch pie.

Fire Hazards Exist in Michigan Wildlands

Michigan wildlands, particularly in northern portions of the state, are tinder dry and critical fire hazard conditions exist.
During the week ending August 17, fire damaged some 146 acres of state and private forests and grasslands—boosting the loss total for the year to 9,706 acres.

M. M. Bergman, in charge of the Conservation Department's fire control section, urges full cooperation from campers, fishermen and others using the outdoors to prevent additional damage.

"These dry months create a particularly difficult situation," Bergman said. "A small fire can get out of control and spread quickly over a large area—destroying valuable wildlife, forests and property."

The northern lower peninsula again was hardest hit during the week ending August 17, with 35 fires damaging approximately 109 acres. Six fires burned 12 acres in the upper peninsula and two fires damaged 25 acres in the southern lower peninsula.
