Teachers to Visit Lowell Industries In 4th Business-Industry-Education Day

Lowell teachers will visit four local industries Thursday, November 5, while school will be closed to allow the educators of the community to become better acquainted with the manufacturers of the town. This is the fourth local Business-Industry-Education day, the first having been in 1952.

All Day Program
The program for the day will begin at 9 a. m., and the first visit will be to the Lowell Engineering Company operated by George Day, where tools and dies in manufacturing plants throughout the state are built. The second visit

of the morning will be to the Propane Storage Plant of the City Service Company. The tour will be conducted by John Paxton, local manager. This million dollar plant receives propane gas by pipe line from the oil fields of the southwest and processes it and then reships the liquid petroleum product by rail and truck to all sections of the state.

Lunch will be served at noon at the high school where the teachers and representatives from all the industries of the community will meet in a discussion, question and answer program.

In the afternoon the teachers group will go to the Newell Manufacturing Company where door hardware is produced and be conducted through the plant by the manager, Wallace Hook. The last visit of the day will be to the Lowell Municipal Plant. Roger Westbroek will show the teachers the operation of Lowell's generating plant both the diesel in town; and the hydro operation on Flat River north of town.

William Jones, of the C. H. Ranciman Company is chairman of the day, and a well rounded tour will give the teachers a better picture of Lowell's industries and this in turn will promote the mutual understanding of each others problems.

Village Treasurer Collects 98% of Tax

Esther M. Fahmi, village treasurer reported to the Village Council last week that she has collected all the 1958 village taxes except \$874.28. This is less than 2 percent of the total tax billed.

Total taxes billed for 1958 in the village was \$53,652.77; real estate amounted to \$42,356.17; and personal property, \$11,296.60. Collected to date is \$41,683.96 in real estate tax; and \$11,094.53 in personal property taxes.

Kirby Evans Speaks Sunday to Congregationalists

Kirby Evans, a congregational layman from Grand Rapids, will preach at the 11 a. m. worship service of the Congregational church this Sunday. Mr. Evans is a successful businessman in his own right. As a service to the Christian church he spends his spare time helping various congregations in fund raising programs. On his own time and at his own expense Mr. Evans has attended a number of schools concerning church finances, in particular the Wells program in Chicago. It is appropriate that a man who has given so much of himself to the church should speak to the congregation on Stewardship Sunday.

Congregational Churches are related to each other in a voluntary, free association in which each church has the right to withdraw at any time. The churches unite together to do those things which can not be done separately such as mission projects, printing religious education material etc. The churches are also united to serve each other. In the past weeks persons have been coming to Lowell for the counseling service which the Congregational Church offers, for they find here what they do not find in their own church. In like manner we depend on other churches to help us develop a more adequate program. In this free exchange of talent we welcome Mr. Evans to the Congregational pulpit as an expert, but more important as a layman concerned with the developing of the greater Christian Church and through the church bringing about the Kingdom of God here on earth.

Expressway-Type Highways Offer Opportunity for Michigan Communities

Expressway-type highways and bypasses will provide Michigan residents and communities with gains far in excess of any losses they will accrue. Dr. Frank Suggitt reported today, Suggitt, head of the Department of Resource Development of Michigan State University, made his observation as a result of a study to determine the effects of bypasses and expressways for the Michigan Good Roads Federation.

During the study, Suggitt said, reports of serious business depression "not here but somewhere else" proved 99 percent groundless. In personal investigation, in the numerous communities visited, he said, he did not observe a single business that closed solely because of the diversion of through traffic to a bypass. The few businesses which were abandoned, he said, were due to normal causes as death of the proprietor, lack of capital, poor management, fire and the like.

Suggitt said he also found several proprietors who blamed the bypass for a decrease in business rather than the recent recession or themselves for failing to meet the change by advertising, and new business methods.

Arrows to Play Sparta Here Friday Night; 7:30

This Friday, October 31, the Red Arrow gridders open a season-ending three game home stand as they take on the Sparta eleven at 7:30. Both teams are sporting four-game losing streaks and would enjoy a taste of victory. This non-league encounter will be the first gridiron meeting of the two schools in several years.

Last Friday the Arrows were downed 19-0 by an upstart Kelloggville squad in its homecoming game. A long afternoon rain left the field with several inches of mud which severely hampered the sharp pivoting and cutting maneuvers of Arrow halfback Ken Spooner and end Steve DeVries and played into the hands of the opponents' hard line plungers.

The victors took the opening kickoff 65 yards in 13 plays to score, and added the point on a line plunge. The Arrows failed to get their offense rolling and were forced to punt. Kelloggville required 15 plays to score after receiving the punt on their own 27. A fumble in the second quarter gave Kelloggville the ball on the Lowell 22-yard line. Two plays later an 18 yard dash over tackle resulted in the final score.

Both teams battled to a stalemate in the third period, with neither team able to get a drive started. In the fourth quarter the Arrows drove from their own 38 to Kelloggville's four-yard line, but couldn't score.

There are two main differences between American school systems and many other school systems in the world. First most of the major foreign systems separate students at about the sixth or seventh grade levels. Most of them do this through mental testing. The students are either channeled into vocational schools or college preparatory schools. This latter group of which contains only the upper approximate 10 percent. This college preparatory group usually moves at a very fast pace while the pace of American schools is set according to the ratio of students per teacher (this is so because of the wide range of abilities that is contained in the American classroom).

The other major difference lies in the form of curriculum. In Russia the curriculum is dictated by the Communist party. In European countries, it is dictated by appointed bureaus; while in America our curriculum is largely decided by the people who elect and make their wishes known to the school boards. They in turn define most of the curriculum in our nation's schools.

We respect the rights of citizens to believe in the segregation of our schools providing they do not profess to be Christians 2, believers in democracy.
