Robert Steward Wins Award From Health Department

Robert Steward of Lowell Municipal Utility was among eighty-nine men who work in water treatment plants in various parts of Michigan who have been awarded certificates of achievement by the state health department after passing written examinations and meeting certain other requirements.

State law requires every water treatment plant in Michigan to be supervised by an operator who is certified by the Michigan Department of Health. Each plant is classified by the state health department according to the degree of treatment and the population served. The plant's chief operator must hold a certificate equal to or above the plant's classification. To win certification, an operator must meet education and experience standards set by the state health department and must possess good moral character. In addition, he must pass a written examination given annually by the state health department.

"Certificate winners deserve the thanks and congratulations of everyone in their community," said Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner, as he signed the certificates. "The awards represent considerable initiative and a lot of hard work. A safe water supply is important to all of us, and the water treatment plant operators are performing important jobs that help protect the public health."

Rockford Here Friday Night For Final Conference Game

A rugged Rockford High football team, seeking its first Valley title since 1944, invades the Lowell gridiron this Friday, November 7. The Rams have only one conference loss, that being 6-0 to Grandville. The Arrows have managed only one league win, but were dourly defeated by Grandville by a scant 14-13 margin. Last year the Rams were favored to win, but the Arrows mauled them 26-0 in a blinding snowstorm. Two years ago the Rams were the victims of a 46-12 Lowell deluge. If the Arrows can continue to show the powerful offensive attack which humbled Sparta, 26-18, a close game will ensue. Game time is 7:30.

It was Ken Spooner Night last Friday, as the tiny senior speedster tallied 19 points and amassed 225 yards in 13 carries for a 17.3 yard average per carry to lead his team to a 26-18 decision over Sparta. He tallied in the first period on a 6-yard pitchout play, and again in the second period on a one-yard drive after returning a punt 49 yards in a dazzling sideline stepping run. After Charles Rydler took a 10-yard Fred Wis-

dom pass and turned on his blazing speed for a 54-yard scoring run, Spooner added the point on a pitchout. In his best run of the night, in the fourth quarter, Spooner again on a pitchout, showed his brilliant broken-field running ability as he side-stepped and sped his way on a 58-yard jaunt to paydirt. A key block by guard Jim Williams removed the last Spartan defender from Spooner's path. Rydler tallied the point after touch-down.

The Arrows racked up 11 first downs and 448 yards rushing and passing in their greatest offensive spurge of the season. Sparta managed 7 first downs and 233 yards in total offense.

Record Vote Turn-out in This Area Dems Win State, Republicans County

There was a record vote turnout in the six townships in this area of Kent County Tuesday for an off presidential year election. There were 499 more votes cast than in 1954, all townships having an increase; but Cascade Township's was largest with a 293 increase.

The average for the townships was 75 percent of the registered voters. Bowne Township had 85 percent of the voters out.

Governor Williams was re-elected for his 6th term by a good majority. Philip Hart defeated Senator Potter. In the state there were 7 out of 11 Republicans elected to

Congress. In the 5th District, Gerald R. Ford defeated Richard VanderVeen by a comfortable margin. Ford in the surrounding area ran ahead of the Republican ticket.

Cascade Township Fire Vote
In Cascade Township, the vote for a 1 mill tax for 3 years to raise \$15,000 to buy a new fire truck passed by: Yes 728, No 351, a fine vote of approval for the good work of the volunteer firemen who worked hard to pass this proposal.

Bowne Vote For Zoning
In Bowne Township the citizens voted: Yes 213, and No 143, in favor of the township board setting up a zoning and building ordinance for the township.

Ada Voters Have Trouble
In the midst of a record turnout of voters in Ada Township, at 7 p. m. a lightning fixture shorted out and blew fuses in the Township Building, leaving the building without lights for some time. Fortunately the Cub Scout Troop had a ceremony board with many candles.

These were put to good use to see to vote. Local electricians and garage men helped to get the lights on after several minutes of confusion.

Pattison Drain Commissioner
Bowne Township Supervisor Fred Pattison was successful in his bid for the post of Drain Commissioner, all other county offices being held by Republicans. The only surprise in the county came when Kent County Prosecutor Dale Stoppe beat out incumbent Probate Judge John Dalton.

Unmarked Cars To Be Replaced

Semimarked State Police patrol cars will replace unmarked cars on highway patrol to increase the hours of effective traffic law enforcement and reduce nighttime accidents.
For a number of years unmarked cars have been used to supplement the regular blue and gold marked cars, but their operation was restricted to daytime operation as the only identification was that of the uniformed officer.
The semimarked car has proved very successful in checking the willful type of violator who observes the law only when a marked patrol car is in sight. The semimarked car is equipped with a portable oscillating red light with a magnetic base to place on the top when stopped for an accident or other emergency.
The cars are standard colors and have regular license plates. Regular patrol cars have State Police gold and blue plates.
They were first used on an experimental basis in high nighttime accident areas such as Flint, Lansing, Flat Rock and Pontiac and are now being gradually extended to other areas and will replace the unmarked fleet.
