

other atmospheric physicists, it has been found that the type of snowflake that you see falling is a dead givenway of the temperature an moisture conditions over your head For instance, beautiful large fluffy flakes are caused when the original flakes fall through a layer of air that is unusually high in moisture content and just below freezing. Small-flaked dry snow, on the other hand, shows a history of having fallen through much drir and much colder air aloft. Sometimes, the snowflake fall into a layer of air that is above freezing and the flake begins melt. Then, if the layer of air jus above the ground is below freez ing, the partially melted flake re freezes and we have sleet. If the layer of below freezing air that is in contact with the ground is too thin and the falling drops do not have a chance to freeze en route, they will freeze on striking telephone lines, grass blades, tree limbs and a "forest" of ice is
